Mrs. McAnally will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Eastland and Callahan Counties. Before assuming her post, she will go to Graham, where she will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operation of the Census of Agriculture. It i his respons bility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult inter-

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
