D. B. Warren, a member of

the Board of Directors of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, has strongly stressed the importance of all peanut producers voting in the coming marketing quota referendum.

In accordance with the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 as amended, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has set the date for voting to determine the wishes of the producers relative to marketing quotas for the 1960, 1961, and 1362 crops of peanuts.

According to Warren, if at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum favors quotas, they will be in effect in each of the three years. If more than one third of the voters oppose, quotas will not be in effect for 1960 and another referendum would be held in 1960 for the following three years.

Warren emphasized that if marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, growers who comply with their allotments will eligible for price support at full announced rate, and marketing penalties will apply to the excess peanuts produced. 



Ham With Beer Glaze

smoked or ready-to-eat half ham (6 to 8 pounds)
Whole cloves

4/2 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons prepared mustard
4/2 cup beer or ale 1 smoked or ready-to-eat

Whole cloves

Place ham, fat side up, in shallow baking pan. Bake in a slow oven (325°F.). If smoked, bake 25 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer registers 160°F. If ready-to-eat, bake 14 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer registers 130°F. Forty-five minutes before ham is done, take from oven and remove rind, if necessary. Score fat surface and stud with whole cloves. Mix together brown sugar and mustard; stir to a paste. Gradually add beer, stirring until blended. Brush part of mixture over ham. Continue baking, brushing frequently with remaining mixture.

Note: If desired, glaze may be doubled for a whole ham.

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
