



Farm-Ranch Income Tax School Slated

A farm and ranch income tax and social security school has been slated on January 15 for Eastland, according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper, who has planned the program.

The all-day meeting scheduled to begin at 9 a. m. will be held in the county courtroom on the third floor of the courthouse, Cooper said. The morning session will be devoted to farm and ranch income tax problems, situations and the forms. Sidney Jenkins, farm management specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service, will be in charge of this part of the affair. The afternoon session, scheduled to begin at 2 p. m., will be devoted to Social Security as it applies to farmers and ranchers. A meeting on this subject last winter filled the courtroom to overflowing.

R. R. Tuley of Abilene, district manager of the Social Security Administration, has advised that either he or someone from his office will be here for this part of the school.

All Eastland County farmers and ranchers who have questions on either income tax or social security are cordially invited to attend either one or both meetings scheduled for that day. There is no charge for attending.

Federal Income Tax Requirements For Coming Year Are Announced

Requirements for filing Federal income tax returns for 1959 were announced here today by Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., of the Internal Revenue Service.

To sum it up—"most people with \$600 or more of gross income for 1959 must file a return with Uncle Sam," Fogle said. Every citizen or resident of the U. S. A. — whether adult or minor — who had \$600 or more gross income must file; if 65 or over, \$1,200 or more.

"However," Fogle continued, "if you're self-employed, you file a return if your self-employment income was \$400 or more, even though your gross income was less than \$600."

The Revenue representative added these potent points: A person with income of less than these amounts should file a '59 return to get a refund if tax was withheld. . . . A married person with income less than her or his own personal exemption should file a joint return with husband or wife to get the smaller tax or larger refund for the couple. . . . Members of Armed Forces should give name, service serial number, and permanent home address.

Area taxpayers are urged to file their returns for '59 with their IRS District Director as soon after January 1, 1960, as possible. "Although the filing deadline is April 15, folks who wait until the last minute find it more difficult to get technical help the nearer the final day approaches."

"Also," Fogle said, "last minute filers make more costly errors in their returns." Checks or money orders for any tax due should be clipped, not stapled, to the return and should be made payable to the "Internal Revenue Service."

Area taxpayers are urged to file their Federal income tax returns, according to Fogle.

Gray Matter

The annual big-time bowl football games have now all been played and the Southwest almost took a complete cleaning in all of them. Syracuse didn't run over Texas as some of the experts predicted the Orangemen would, but the Easterners did whip the Longhorns pretty soundly.

About the only consolation followers of Southwest Conference football got out of bowl games this year was Arkansas's upset of Georgia Tech. Perhaps some fans did appreciate the fact that the Dallas Cotton Bowl was about the best game of them all. It was a real football game from the first kickoff till the last whistle was blown. Once or twice there appeared to be some sort of flare up between players on opposing teams, but they were settled before any harm was done.

Perhaps the most surprising of all the bowl games was Washington's upset of mighty Wisconsin of the Big Ten. Since the West Coast and the Big Ten have tied themselves up in the present arrangement of having a Big Ten team play in the Rose Bowl each New Year's Day, the Big Ten entry has pretty well man-handled the Pacific Coast representative. This hasn't set too well with fans, especially sports writers, on the West Coast. If my memory serves me right, the only other time a Big Ten entry lost was the other time Wisconsin represented the Midwest conference.

Although the Pacific Coast Conference has been falling apart the past few years with a new organization growing out of the ashes of the original conference, Washington this New Year's Day played as if their own conference was the toughest football league in the world. Washington absolutely took no pity on the Badgers, and in so doing didn't hurt the prestige of West Coast football a bit.

The smart sports writers had picked the East team to win the annual Shrine All-Star game but some boys from Texas wouldn't let them get away with that. Don Meredith of S. M. U. wasn't picked on many all-American teams this year, but he was picked the outstanding player of the Shrine game. I guess he just about did everything with a football as quarterback is supposed to do with one during that game. The boys in the press box got to see some ball control, same ball handling, and some passing they didn't know possible. Meredith led his team to a one-touchdown victory over the larger Eastern boys.

Listening to the games this past week and makes one appreciate Kern Tipps' announcing more than ever. The CBS-Radio announcer who broadcast the Cotton Bowl game was one of the most excitable characters I've heard in a long time. He acted like a rooster lost in the hen house, and announced every play as if the fate of the world was hanging in balance. I don't know where the large broadcasting companies like CBS and NBC get some of their sports announcers, but it would be all right with me if they'd send some of them back to the place they got them.

Kern Tipps, on the other hand, broadcast the El Paso Sun Bowl game the day before New Year's. That also was a game a Texas school took a licking. North Texas as State ran into a whirlwind when they ran into the New Mexico Aggies and the Aggies didn't let go until the game was over.

Listening to Tipps' account of the game was just about as clear as reading about it. He told what type of offense each side used on each play, which is something the CBS and NBC boys sometimes forget to mention in their excitement. If Kern Tipps broadcast over a nationwide network, radio listeners would know more about what was going on on the playing field, but I doubt if there is a network in America that could hire him away from the Humble Company.

Some years ago Mr. Tipps used to be a sports writer for the Houston Chronicle. The newspaper profession lost a good man when they let him get away to Humble. For 25 or so years he has been doing football for the

Humble Company over a network of stations in the area where Humble does retail business.

I remember full well his broadcasting the famous games that TCU and SMU played in Fort Worth the Saturday following Thanksgiving of 1935. That was the game both teams entered riding a 3-0 winning streak for the season.

The winner of that game was expected to gain an invitation on to the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. SMU pulled that famous pass that has been talked about so much since, winning the game by 19-14, or something like that. The Mustangs went on to the Rose Bowl, losing there to Stanford 7-0. Sammy Baugh and the Horned Frogs played in the Sugar Bowl that same day, winning by what sounding like the score of a baseball game.

Their opponent then was LUS and if I remember correctly they beat the LSU boys by a field goal. As a matter of fact, I seem to remember the score as 3-2. That's certainly an odd score for the final result of a football game, but it is possible.

It's not always the big boys who do the best job of broadcasting or programming. Eastland's own KERC made the big-time networks look sick with its programming for Christmas Day this year. I don't know how much planning for this one day Dick Spalding and his associates at KERC did getting ready for Christmas broadcasting, but the National Broadcasting Company, the American Broadcasting Company and the Columbia Broadcasting System could certainly have taken lessons from KERC.

The boys on the south side of the square can certainly feel proud of their Christmas Day Broadcasting.

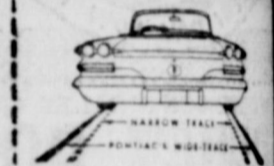
