On January 10, 1901 the Spindletop well, near Beaumont, made Texas petroleum history. The great gusher produced 94 percent of the states oil in 1902 and oil prices dropped to an all-time low of 3 cents a barrel, quite a contrast to today's prices.

Living in the heart of Eastland County, Eastland residents are well acquainted with the oil industry. Eastland County oil wells have produced over 122 million barrels of oil since 1917.

Eastland now has a population of 3,178. The new telephone directory contains 2,890 alphabetical listings, or looking at it another way - 90 percent of Eastland's population is listed in the phone book along with 52 pages of business or classified, "yellow pages."

Rate Hike Postponed

The U.S. Postal Service announced today that increases in certain postal rates, scheduled for July 6, 1973, will be postponed.

The service has decided not to seek an exception to the presidential price freeze. Increases had been scheduled for magazines, newspapers, nonprofit organization material, and books and records.

The existing postal rate schedule calls for rates for certain classes of mail to be increased on July 6 of each year over a five or a ten year period until "full" rates are achieved.

The July 6, 1972 rates for these classes of mail will remain in effect until further notice.

Socks, G'Backs Clash Here

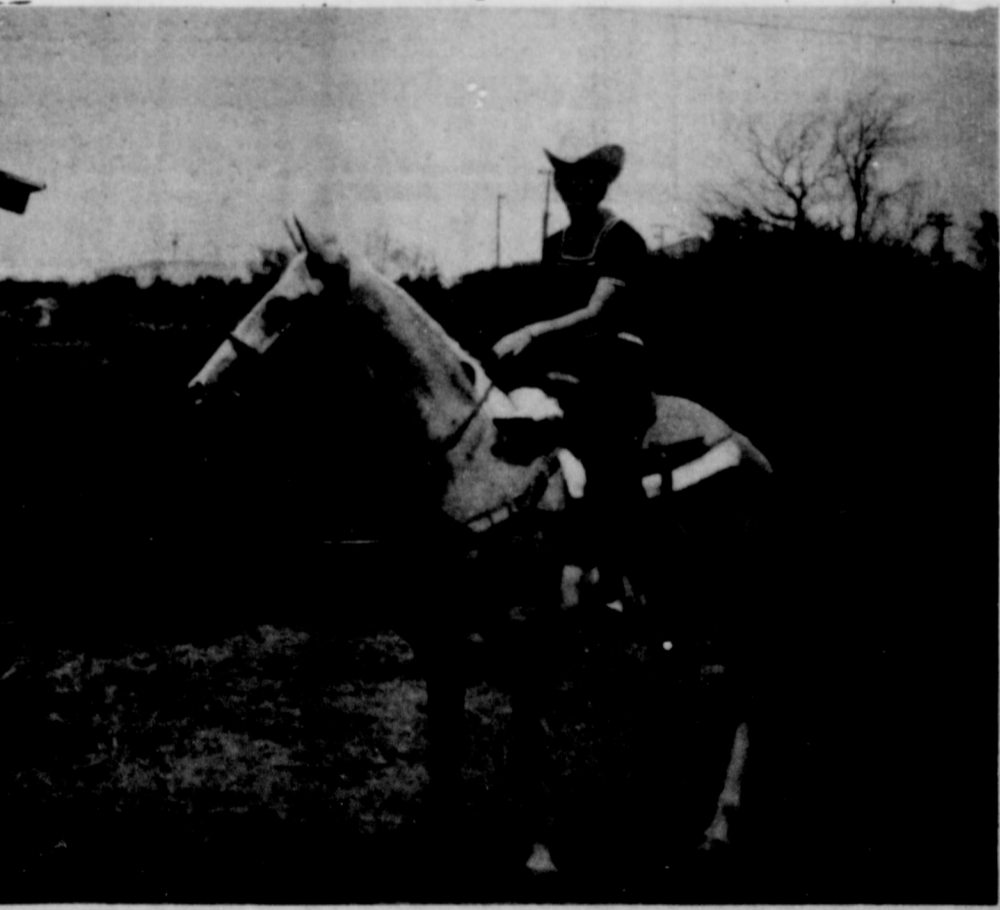

I REMEMBER

On September 20, 1919, I was called home from a revival in Mangum to greet our first baby girl, who was born that afternoon. We were pastor at Carbon. The other day my wife and I were looking at some baby pictures and records and found the account of her first birthday party. 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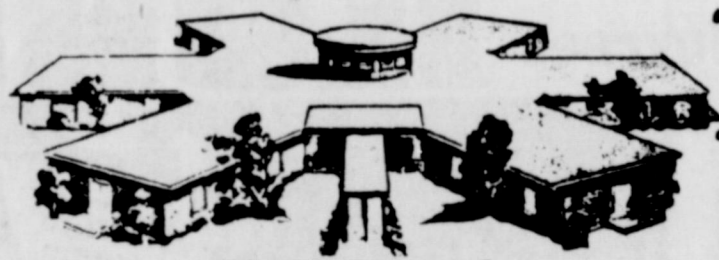

Tactical Wing To Fly Low

The world wide commitments of the 463rd Tactical Airlift Wing (TAWg) at Dyess

Air Force Base, Abilene, require that the highest possible degree of proficiency

must be maintained by all aircrews.

As a result, the Wing's C-130 Hercules aircraft are flown at low level altitudes over this area on a daily basis in order to keep the 463rd TAWg aircrews current in all modes of aerial delivery.

With good flying weather for the summer, the number of low level flights will be increased. Also, with the addition of another squadron of C-130's to the 463rd TAWg, low level training flights will become more frequent.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight, Monday, Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed route. Airspeeds will vary from 150 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by Tactical Air Command. Minimum disturbances of farms, ranches and com-

munities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries and stocker pens are avoided when planning the routes and will not be overflown under any normal circumstance.

463rd officials would like to emphasize that even though training must be conducted at low level and high airspeed in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agriculture and community activities.

These training flights occur over the following counties: Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Baylor, Garza, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Tom Green.

Although the primary mission of the 463rd TAW is a military one, its aircraft and crews are ready, able and willing to assist in a non-military role. In the past the wing has provided help in flood relief, hurricane assistance, air-evacuating burn patients

Orders Pin Tree Seedling Now Being Accepted

Orders for pine tree seedlings are being accepted now by the Texas Forest Service for the 1973-74 planting season, according to Mason C. Cloud, head, Forest Environment Department, College Station.

Seedling production has been increased about 20 percent this year, Cloud said, to provide for an expected increase in seedling demand. Texans are showing greater awareness of the important part trees play in helping to alleviate pollution problems and improve the environment and this, Cloud

claims, is creating an accelerated demand for seedlings.

Although regular pine seedlings should be plentiful, the quantity of genetically improved seedlings will be very limited this next year. Seed collections at the Service's seed orchards and seed production

areas were small, Cloud stated, and only Bastrop drought-hardy loblolly and seed production area shortleaf pine seedlings will be available. Prices of regular pine seedlings have been increased 50 cents per thousand trees due to higher shipping and labor costs this year. Regular slash,

loblolly and shortleaf pines will sell for \$6.50 per thousand seedlings plus the 4 percent state sales tax.

Look For '7th Flag' For Safety

Texans have always respected flags - there have been six of them in the history of the State. Now there is a seventh flag to look for to save lives and prevent injury - the red warning flag denoting highway construction and maintenance.

This summer crews will be on the job working with heavy equipment. Drivers should be ready to obey directions of flagmen who guide traffic through and around construction obstacles.

Being a flagman is considered the hardest job on some

crews because it is both tiring and dangerous. Motorists can make this job easier by slowing down when they first see the flagman and then by obeying his signals. The flagman generally uses the flag and hand signals to stop, slow or alert traffic, and generally uses hand signals only to instruct it to proceed.

In addition to the flagman, Highway Department signs will be posted at the approaches to all construction sites warning motorists to slow down, to avoid passing, and to be ready for restricted traffic.

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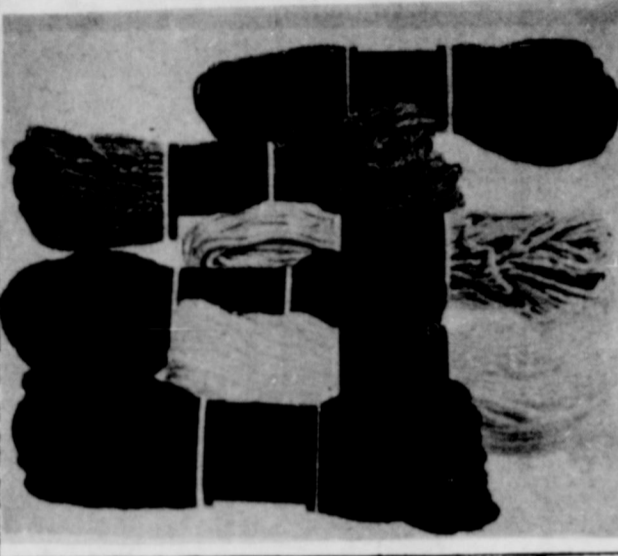
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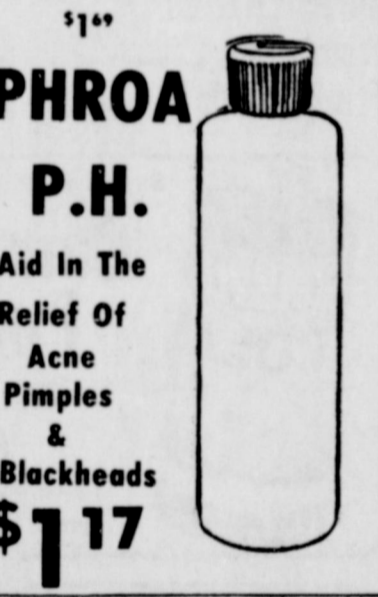

County Native Doing Research On Radiation

COLLEGE STATION - A study on the effects of radiation on skin and eyes conducted at Texas A&M University has received additional funding from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Directed by Dr. Dan Hightower, associate professor of veterinary physiology and pharmacology, the study is entering its fifth year of investigation.

The \$80,000 extension grant brings the total research funding for the project to more than \$430,000. Co-principal investigator on the project is Dr. James B. Smathers of TAMU's Nuclear Engineering Department.

Dr. Hightower says his family is buried in Eastland.

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Respiratory Association Changes Its Name

North Texas Lung Association will be the new name of the North Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, it was announced today by Hilton Crane, Association President.

Crane said the new formal name of the local Christmas Seal agency will become effective immediately. The action corresponds with the adoption of the name American Lung Association by the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association which will inaugurate its new title at its annual meeting in New York on May 20. Representatives of the local association will attend the meeting.

Crane explained that his association's board of directors approved the change to North Texas Lung Association because "the simpler and shorter name is easier for the people to recognize and remember and

they can more easily identify the organization when they need help."

"Lung association more accurately reflects our central purpose - the prevention and control of lung disease," Crane said. "At the same time it is broad enough to encompass our expanded activities in combatting air pollution and cigarette smoking, which are among the most serious dangers to healthy lungs."

The familiar trademark of the association - the double-barred cross - symbol of the early fight against tuberculosis and later against other lung diseases is being retained. It will continue to be featured in the annual Christmas Seal campaign from which the association derives the bulk of the public support for its activities.
