IT'S THE LAW in Texas

ROBERT'S RULES

Whether it's the nomination of a presidential candidate at one of the national political conventions, or the monthly meeting of your neighborhood PTA, a set of procedural rules compiled 80 years ago by an almost-forgotten Army General usually has much to do with the way the business is conducted. You have probably heard of "Robert's Rules of Order" which was published in 1876. General Henry M. Robert ordered only 4,000 of his original edition, but since that time almost 1,500,000 copies have been printed. The rules have been modernized from time to time, but the revisions have been slight. Actually the rules for conducting a meeting go back to the early days of the English Parliament, although General Robert based his upon the rules and practice of the U. S. Congress. Robert's Rules come close to being "law of the land." They are given added legal status by the fact that the charter, constitution, or by-laws of almost every organization you can name — your wife's literary society, your labor union, or the corporation you work for (large or small)—ordinarily state somewhere that all meetings will be "conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order." Special rules may be made by any organization contrary to Robert, but if some provisions are not in the by-laws his little book — where incorporated in such by-laws — remains the "bible" to be followed strictly.

tion of the house, but you can claim a share of the rent you pay as a deduction.
Some of the expenses for your home office are fully deductible. These are expenses that relate exclusively to your business, such as supplies, postage depreciation of your office furniture, and so on.
Whether you are renting your home or using part of it as an office, remember to keep records of as many of your expenses as possible. Although you are entitled to deduct the expenses discussed in this article, the Internal Revenue Service may ask for an explanation of some of the items you deduct. It pays to have whatever information you can gather to support the expenses you claim.
You can get additional information on deductible expenses from the free instruction booklet issued each year by the Internal Revenue Service. A copy will be sent to you together with your income tax forms.

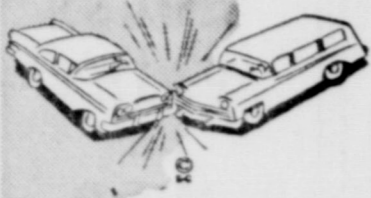

Evangelist Billy Graham Goes To Africa

Billy Graham flew non-stop to West Africa Monday night to launch a continent-spanning "Safari for Souls." The American evangelist will preach at the biggest stadiums, race tracks and cricket fields of 16 cities in nine countries. Already underway in Monrovia, Liberia, are week-long preparatory meetings led by an American Negro, Howard Jones, who is one of the associate evangelists on the world's best-known "team" of preachers. Similar advance campaigns will be held at every stop on the tour by six Graham aides. Graham's first sermon in the sprawling, uncommitted sub-continent south of Sahara will be delivered Thursday evening in the Antoinette Tubman Stadium, named for the wife of Liberia's president. Ahead of the ex-farm boy from North Carolina will be two-months of grueling air and auto travel punctuated by mass meetings and a heavy round of conferences with African churchmen, missionaries and national leaders, not to speak of black tie-and-tails dinners proffered by presidents, premiers and an emperor. The evangelist himself considers this his most ambitious and, in some ways most difficult campaign since he burst into the limelight 10 years ago and began a career that has made his name a global household word. Larry Love, seasoned pastor and student of missions who logged 200,000 miles of exploratory travel for Graham's tour, brought back a conviction that the evangelist's visit could affect decisively the course of a continent in commotion which is emerging into uncertain freedom. Billy Graham will get a hearing in Africa such as no one else has ever had," said Love. "The world is going to be astounded at the results, just as the meetings in Australia last year so far exceeded everyone's expectations." Other advance guardsmen have reported unprecedented unity in support of the campaign among Christians of various communion in spots where the sectarian spirit is stronger, even, than in America. Another factor making for huge crowds will be the fact that the voice of "The Hour of Decision" has been heard for years over millions of tiny radio sets in villages with no other means of mass communications. The Graham crusades will be attuned to the fast-running tides of freedom and nationalism. To all who will listen he will proclaim Christ as the One Who alone makes men truly free. And he will declare that only "a nation under God" can have "government of the people, by the people and for the people." A second major emphasis will be the challenging and training of

leadership in and for the new national churches that are rising and developing as foreign missionaries relinquish the driver's seat. A studied effort has been made to make the local committees as African as possible in the hope that trained "cadres" of evangelistic advance will be ready and able to undertake similar future projects. In Liberia the crusade chairman is the vice president of the country, Dr. William R. Tolbert. In Nigeria, where five cities are on the itinerary, the national chairman is Dr. J. T. Tyorinde, a pastor who is a world leader among Baptists. Also to be visited are the Rhodias, where a crucial decision is shaping up on governmental policy; Ghana, the bellwether land of independence in the west; Tanganyika and Kenya in the east; the land of the fabled Watutsis, Ruanda-Urundi, and the ancient empire of Ethiopia. Organizers of Graham's "Operation Africa" hope that it will mobilize Protestant forces for a valiant bid for the soul of Africa at an hour when the Mohammedan East and the Communist bloc are also hawking ideological wares in the equatorial market place. There is sure to be color and drama in the days and nights of crusading. And the unfolding story could well be one of the most significant and interesting developments of the new decade.
