Major Lions Lead; Minor Comets Advance

The Major League leaders won big Monday night and give signs of going to the wire in the final stanzas of the Little League season.

Hawks Lose Close Game To Eastland

It was truly a disappointed group of Ranger Hawks that returned to Ranger Monday night after a close 10-8 loss to the Eastland Blue Sox.

Eastland jumped off to an early lead by scoring two runs in the first inning and followed with three in the second, but Ranger, not to be outdone, stormed back with one run in the second inning, two in the third and five in the fourth to tie the score up at eight all in the bottom of the fourth. Eastland picked up two more runs but Ranger failed to come up with the needed points and the game ended 10-8 in Eastland's favor.

It was a close hard-fought ballgame right up until the end and both teams are showing improvements since the beginning of the season.

1-20 \$5 Million Contract Let For Eastland-Ranger Completion

Contract has been let for the last remaining segment of Int. 20 highway development in Eastland County, according to an announcement Wednesday by Resident Engineer R.P. (Buddy) Haun.

Bids were opened Tuesday in Austin and T.B. Brown Co. of Abilene is apparent low bidder at \$5,798,498.69, for the development to Interstate standards of the 4.8 miles between Eastland and Ranger.

The project will include one split-diamond interchange, a railroad overpass over the T & P spur near Olden and three bridges over the Colony Creek streams, Mr. Haun said.

The company will probably begin setting barricades in the next few weeks with actual construction to begin within about four to six weeks.

The project is expected to take about two years.

Then the firm will build the north access road, over which westbound traffic will be routed, one-way, when it is completed. Then construction

of the two center main arteries will be undertaken while the highway traffic is routed on the access roads.

Greatest danger will be that of persons getting onto the

one-way access roads in the wrong directions by mistake even though they will be carefully marked.

Second low bid was from the Dahestrum Co. of Dallas, which

turned in a bid of \$5,935,956.66.

Two other highway projects, much smaller in scope, for which bids were recently let, will probably begin about the same time, Mr. Haun said.

Accent on Health

A disaster is unpredictable. Tornadoes may strike with little or no warning and the path of a hurricane often changes erratically with little advance warning.

Texas and the nation this year have felt the brunt of Mother Nature's violence, and tornadoes have roamed the skies. With summer, the hurricane season lies ahead, reminds the State Health Department.

Both natural disasters are capable of causing unforeseen numbers of victims requiring immediate medical attention, plus the threats of disease brought on by unsanitary conditions, disabling of public utilities, contamination of water supplies and disruption of medical service. Floods also may produce rapid buildups in mosquito populations, a nuisance as well as a health threat.

When a disaster strikes, the Health Department joins with other state and local agencies and organizations to fight back with efforts to restore affected areas to normalcy. State disaster headquarters is in a sub-basement at the Department of Public Safety in Austin, where a core of public officials coordinate disaster activities.

In the State Health Department, the Disaster Health Services Program of the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety provides additional resources at the point of need. This is a part of the Texas plan for disaster health and medical care.

Seventeen disaster relief districts, each with a physician directing disaster medical care, are tied into a district Civil Defense Council which coordinates activities of state agencies with disaster functions. In case of disaster or severe threat—such as an impending hurricane along the coast, the Civil Defense Council is mobilized. Within each district are zones from which supplies and personnel requests emanate.

The State Health Department sends representatives of the Disaster Health Services Program to each disaster area to help coordinate activities of other health department personnel. In the case of hurricane, program personnel are pre-positioned in cities along the Texas coast to await and plan for the storm.

Always quick to arrive on the scene are engineers of the Sanitary Engineering Division whose primary function is checking water supplies. Investigators from the Food and Drugs Division check damaged food and drug products, and Communicable Disease Services Section personnel may be called in to provide vaccines and serums if needed. Other state personnel may be assigned, and local health departments put physicians, nurses, sanitarians and others on duty immediately.

Within minutes after a tornado dipped down into the heart of Lubbock the night of May 11, 1970, nurses and others picked their way through the rubble to check and salvage vaccines and get them to pre-planned emergency headquarters. A disaster health representative of the State Health Department was on the scene of the tragedy within two hours even though the city telephones and electricity were knocked out and transportation disrupted.

The Corpus Christi-Nueces County Health Department had its personnel on duty when Celia slammed into that city on August 3 of the same year. The State Health Department was also there. The personal automobiles of two representatives of the Disaster Health Service Program who were in Corpus Christi awaiting the storm, were severely damaged. In addition, district engineers and personnel from state headquarters were on the scene.

Packaged Disaster Hospital was set up in a church at Aransas Pass to provide needed medical equipment after Celia.

Just recently the Health Department took over the medical inventory of a hundred 200-bed Packaged Disaster Hospitals, similar to the one from which equipment was used during Celia.

A major disaster isn't the responsibility of one agency but demands the coordinated efforts of many to snap back after tragedy. During spring tornadoes which hit Burnet and Hubbard on March 10, for instance, the Texas National Guard responded quickly with trucks, personnel and helicopters. Representatives of the State Health Department were on the scene within an hour of notification, coordinating disaster health relief.

Once a hurricane or tornado has struck, there's little one can do.

In a hurricane situation, there normally is enough warning to allow residents to leave the area or take shelter in solidly-constructed buildings.

If the possibility of tornadoes exist, individuals should listen to radios and television stations for latest advisories. Some cities and towns have sirens and other devices warning residents to take cover. It's possible to move out of the path of a tornado if sighted in time.

The State Health Department and its local and regional units have responded quickly and effectively in past disasters.

With the resources and personnel at its command, it stands ready always to meet the future emergency needs of the citizens of Texas.

History Of Hospital Schools Of Nursing

After a day of cleaning the chimney, fetching coal, trimming candlewicks and bathing a typhoid patient, Elizabeth Wilcox Beckwith might have been granted an evening off for "courting purposes." If, that is, she never smoked, never had her hair done at a beauty parlor or otherwise gave her superiors good reason to suspect her moral character.

Elizabeth Wilcox Beckwith was one of the earliest graduates of a hospital school of nursing. Since that time — she and millions of other girls (and an increasing number of men) have graduated from hospital-based schools of nursing, ready in the words of Florence Nightingale, to "carry out medical and surgical orders."

"The American Hospital Association joins in the national celebration of the 100th anniversary of hospital schools of nursing," said John Alexander McMahon, AHA president. "Through their early and continuing efforts at preparing women and men to care for the sick they have contributed immensely to the health care field. We are proud to have many of them as members of the AHA."

Based on Florence Nightingale's successful school in England, the early U. S. schools required students to be "sober, truthful, honest, punctual, quiet, orderly, clean, neat, patient, kind and cheerful," according to a description from the 1878 Boston (Mass.) City Hospital Training School.

Similarly, New York's Bellevue Hospital Training School, one of the first schools founded but no longer in existence, suggested the best students might be found among "the daughters and widows of clergymen, professional men, and farmers who have received the good education of our common schools and academies."

Today, competing with baccalaureate and associate degree programs, hospital schools continue to turn out nearly half of all the nation's

nurses. There are about 600 hospital schools in more than 40 states in the nation. Of the three original nursing schools founded in 1873 — at Bellevue, at the Connecticut Training School in New Haven, and at Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston — the latter one is the sole survivor.

Other early schools still in existence include those at Portland, Oregon's Good Samaritan Hospital (1890); Indianapolis, Indiana's Marion County General Hospital (1883); Omaha, Nebraska's Bishop Clarkson Memorial Hospital (1888); and New York's Buffalo General Hospital (1887).

In 1890 there were 35 hospital-based schools; by 1900 there were 432. Ten years later the number had tripled. At their peak in the early thirties there were 1,844 hospital schools of nursing throughout the country. For one short period, there was even a school especially for men. Founded in 1888, the Mills School of Nursing for Men later consolidated with Bellevue Hospital's School of Nursing (1873-1969).

Hospital-based nursing schools had proved themselves. From the beginning, it became clear that hospitals and the delivery of health care would never be the same.

One Arizona doctor, complaining in 1897 that there were no graduate nurses in private work in his city, summed up the feeling of the medical profession when he lamented that he had no one to assist with operations, instruments, dressings, and anesthesia. "The result of no nurses was that the nurse's work fell upon me," he said.

As hospital schools of nursing enter their second century, graduating nurses are prepared to work with kidney dialysis units, intensive care patients and heart-lung machines. They are trained in subjects ranging from psychology to microbiology — a far cry from cleaning chimneys and trimming candlewicks.

Thirteen of the 108 attorneys in my department, and about one fourth of our 91 clerical personnel work on this problem in the Taxation Division.

It is a problem. And I believe it one which directly affects the consumer, since you (and me and my family, and every Texan) are the ones who pay this tax, and you should be the ones to reap the benefits of the revenues it produces.

Many of us resisted the idea of the sales tax when it was first introduced in Texas 12 years ago. And when the one-percent city sales tax was added and when the State tax went up to four per cent, we fussed a lot more.

But there is no way around the fact that our sales taxes do pay for a large part of the public services which are available. In 1972, net State revenues from sales taxes paid into the treasury provided \$818,172,597 — nearly one billion dollars — for education, public health, agricultural programs, oil and gas regulation, judicial, and legal and regulatory services.

In addition to that, the revenue-hungry city governments which levy one cent of every five sales-tax pennies paid received some \$178 million in sales tax shares to provide local services.

While the great majority — at least 95 per cent — of businessmen who have the responsibility of collecting sales taxes from the consumer have been passing them on to the State of Texas every three months as required, there has been a small, but significant, number of sales tax permittees who have not.

The State Comptroller attempts to collect from them, and if that does not produce payment, he certifies the tax as "Delinquent," so the Attorney General's office can take action.

Last year, more than \$12 millionworth of unpaid sales taxes was certified to our office — and, almost half of that amount was due from sales tax permittees who already were delinquent from a previous three-month period!

The Senate committee which studied the delinquent sales tax situation estimated that the loss of these revenues through failure to pass them on to the State actually passed the \$20-million mark, and may have been as high as \$80 million.

Although my Taxation Division makes every effort to recover these dollars so they can be put to public purposes, sometimes, it is impossible. For instance, if a firm already has gone out of business by the time we can file suit, there is no legal way to reach the permittee.

The irony of this situation is that the laws which created other state taxes which effect less people and do not produce as large a proportion of revenue for public benefit carry a mandatory security requirement, so the State can be assured of collection.

Thankfully, the Legislature recently passed a bill sponsored by Representatives Terry Doyle and Camm Lary and Senator Ike Harris to correct that problem by requiring security such as bond, from sales tax licensees with unproven or poor payment records.

After that bill becomes law on January 1, Texas consumers really will be able to expect their sales tax dollars' worth of services.

And, in the meantime, you can be certain that the Attorney General's Sales Tax Division still will be working diligently on your behalf.

THE BIG HE-LION COMMANDED GREAT RESPECT until he opened his mouth to roar and revealed he was toothless. To assume he had also lost his claws and that all lions had no teeth would be a grievous mistake.

THIS IS SOMETHING LIKE THE NATIONAL LAND-USE LEGISLATION now pending in subcommittees of both the House and the Senate. At places and times it could scratch and bite a lot of people. THE PURPOSE OF THE

LEGISLATION, ACCORDING TO ITS SPONSORS, is to establish a national policy in recognition of the fact that land-use management decisions of wide public concern are often factors contradictory to sound environmental, economic, and social land-use considerations.

BASICALLY THE LEGISLATION PROVIDES THAT EACH STATE inventory and identify areas of critical environmental concern. The areas defined are coastal wet lands, marshes, other lands inundated by tides, beaches, dunes, estuaries, flood plains of rivers, lakes, and streams, areas of unstable soil, undeveloped agricultural land, grazing, watershed lands, and in fact just about any real estate could be included.

THE LEGISLATION TELLS THE STATES TO ESTABLISH A LAND USE planning process which would submit their findings to a newly created department called Land-Use Policy Administration in the Department of the Interior. The estimated initial cost is somewhere between \$220 and \$850 million. This is the "carrot" to the States. The "stick" is a provision to withhold Federal money from this program and programs already in effect, such as airports and roads if States failed to comply.

THE PLAN WOULD PRESUMABLY PROTECT CERTAIN AREAS from the

location of highways, water impoundment, and other uses of land found to be related and affecting the environment.

IF ALL THIS SOUNDS RATHER VAGUE, IT IS BECAUSE IT IS intended to be that way. No doubt it would have far-reaching effects on many communities if the law was enacted as now proposed. It could effect of controlling the use of much of our land as to the location of any facility or development since everything would have to comply with standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency, the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, and the Clean Air Law already on the books.

INCIDENTALLY, IT IS CONTENTED BY SOME THAT THERE IS ALREADY AUTHORITY under these several Acts to control the use of land.

NO DOUBT SOME SERIOUS MISTAKES HAVE BEEN MADE IN THE DEVELOPMENT of suburbs around many cities. Across the river from Washington in Virginia, suburbs have developed which can not be accommodated by present water and sewage facilities. It has created serious problems and, of course, the developers and local officials should have been aware of such a situation beforehand.

THE NATION'S CAPITAL IS NOT PARTICULARLY UNIQUE IN ITS OWN PROBLEMS of what to do with its sewage. Its main sewage treatment plant is busy processing effluent at maximum capacity, creating a huge pile of sludge as a by-product of inefficient treatment. There are few takers who will haul away the sludge, and burning it adds to air pollution. So it piles up.

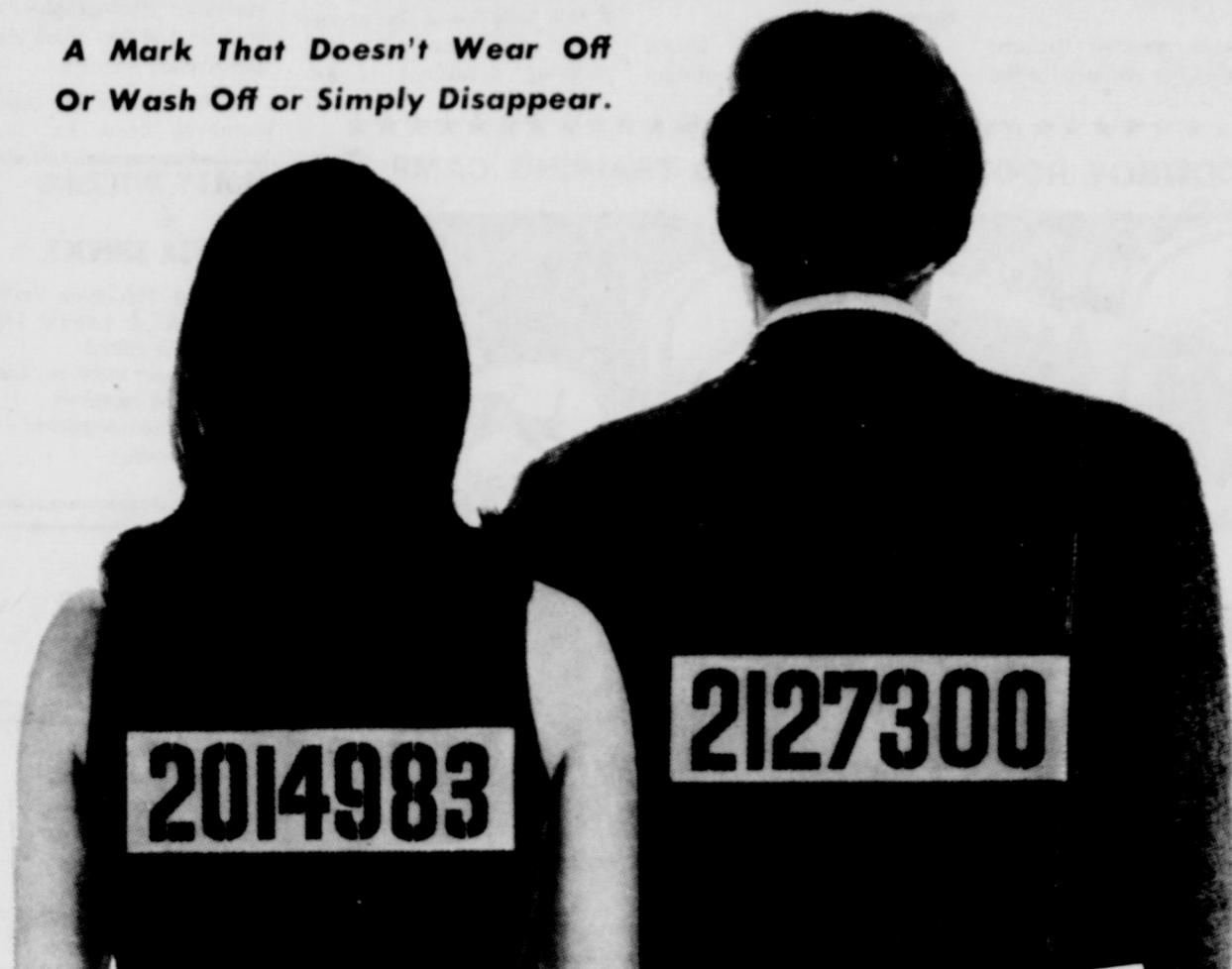
Strawn Homecoming June 29

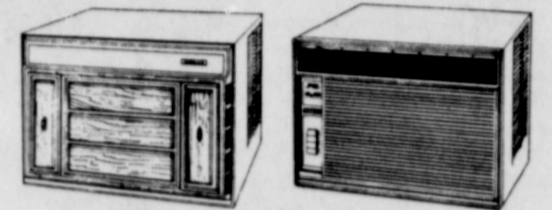

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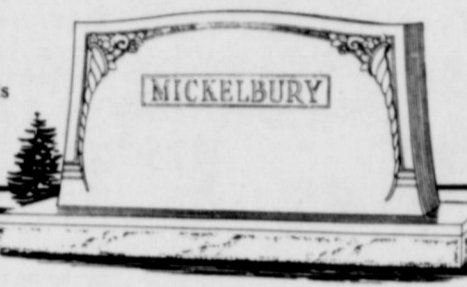
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
