## Jaycees To Assist In Library Renovation

Darwin Miller will be installed as president of the Eastland Lions Club at a special installation event at Lake Leon Tuesday evening.

Mr. Miller will replace Retiring President Clint Bray as officers and directors are installed by Glyn Gilliam of Graham.

The event will begin with a fish fry supper for members, families and guests beginning at 7 p.m. at the Lake Leon Home of James Reid.

The club will not hold its regular Tuesday noon meeting at Camp Inspiration in lieu of the Tuesday evening fish fry.

Installation program, it has been announced. The club will meet one more time, on Tuesday, June 26, at Camp Inspiration and then probably will recess meetings until the opening of the Ramada Inn here.

The National Peanut Growers Crop, which is working with USDA on possible changes in the peanut program is developing an optional production concept that appears to go far toward meeting objectives of both the grower and the Department.

According to Ross Wilson, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association manager, Gorman, Texas, the USDA is now evaluating the plan that was submitted by the growers in a meeting in Washington on May 23. Word is expected soon relative to the department's position on the major provisions of the approach.

Provided agreement is reached between the growers and the USDA, legislation may be drafted and introduced in the Congress to modify the present peanut program. At this time peanuts are not included in the general farm bill that recently passed in the senate and is currently being considered by the House Agriculture Committee.

The decision regarding the combining of peanut legislation, if any, with other provisions of the general farm bill would benefit to the discretion of key peanut area Congressmen.

The approach being considered would provide each grower with the flexibility to choose an option of production that best fits his individual situation.

At the same time the concept would reduce substantially government cost, maintain net farm income at near the 1972 crop level of \$248 million, continue reasonable price protection to the grower, protect present allotment holders, allow voluntary production beyond domestic needs for the world market at prices at or near the world price, and permit new peanut growers.

Members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce have volunteered an important work contribution to the Centennial Memorial Library, Mrs. Dan Childress said Friday.

The Jaycees plan to begin work immediately. They will be given any and all items that they salvage.

It is estimated that approximately \$10,700 more will be needed to cover cost of remodeling.

## Henry G. Vermillion Of Atomic Energy Commission Retires

The Atomic Energy Commission's senior field information officer for nuclear explosive testing, Henry G. Vermillion, is retiring June 29, 1973 after serving on tests which ranged from Nevada to Mississippi and from the South Pacific to an Aleutian Island on the Bering Sea.

Mr. Vermillion's 18-year AEC career spans virtually all the more than 300 underground nuclear tests conducted at the Nevada Test Site (NTS) since 1961. It also includes more than half of the 87 atmospheric tests conducted at NTS before the treaty in 1963 that banned all nuclear tests except those underground.

His AEC role was to explain the Commission's testing program to the public directly and through the news media. Vermillion brought the AEC more than 20 years experience as a newsman. His news career began in 1932, after receiving his B.A. degree in Journalism from Baylor University, as a reporter on the El Paso World News.

He later joined the staff of the El Paso Times, became the news editor for the Bisbee (Arizona) Daily Review, and returned to the Times later and became city editor.

From 1941 to 1951, Mr. Vermillion was the owner-publisher-editor of the Winkler County News in Kermit, Texas, and the Eastland County Record. He then moved to New Mexico where he was a public relations consultant until 1954 when he became a copy editor on the Albuquerque Journal.

Mr. Vermillion joined the Atomic Energy Commission on March 2, 1955 as an information specialist for the Albuquerque Operations Office and was assigned to duty at NTS the following day. There, he participated in all the Nevada test series and also the 1956 atmospheric tests in the South Pacific.

Shortly after the moratorium on nuclear testing, which lasted from 1958-1961, testing in Nevada was transferred from the Albuquerque Operations Office to the newly formed Nevada Operations Office (NV) and Mr. Vermillion became the Director of Public Information.

Now Director of the NV Office of Information Services, Mr. Vermillion has been responsible for the information programs for all the nuclear tests conducted by NV. These have included the three largest tests ever conducted underground in Nevada, each of which was more than a megaton.

He also has been responsible for public information on NV-conducted tests at other locations, including two underground tests at Amchitka Island in the Aleutians. One was the largest test ever conducted underground by the United States. Called Cannikin, it was less than five megatons.

Public information on Plowshare tests - a program to develop peaceful uses for nuclear explosives - also has been Mr. Vermillion's responsibility. These tests included a 100-kiloton earthmoving experiment at NTS in which 6.5 million tons of earth was displaced, and three natural gas stimulation experiments, one in New Mexico and two in Colorado.

Information on tests for the Department of Defense to develop improved methods for detecting, identifying and locating underground nuclear tests also was Mr. Vermillion's.

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## 'HILF' Bug Going Around

There seems to be an epidemic going around. It's not harmful, but it is contagious, at least to some of the ranchers in Shackleford, Stephens and surrounding counties. Recently two Eastland county ranchers, ranching in the Palo Pinto Soil and Water Conservation District, Fambro brothers and Don Crawford have caught the "bug". This "bug" is called High

Intensity Low Frequency or commonly referred to as "HILF". This is a relative new type of rotation grazing system. It was first started on the Lucky ranch near Albany in 1969. So far the results have been outstanding. The Lucky ranch consists of 2000 acres of rangeland seeded to K.R. Bluestem and Sideoats grama. It was originally stocked with 100 animal units, which would be one animal unit

per 9 acres. The grass still wasn't harvested, so it will be stocked even heavier this year. High intensity low frequency grazing simply means concentrating livestock in one pasture so all the grass can be uniformly grazed to a given height in a short period of time. Cattle are then rotated to another pasture and the grazed pasture receives a long rest period. The Lucky ranch is composed of six pastures. Each pasture is grazed for 30 to 45 days depending on the size of the pasture or the amount of grass available. Then its rested from

grazing 7 to 8 months. By this, grasses are allowed to regain their growth and vigor. Concentrating livestock in a small area allows all the grasses to be grazed, even grass and low grade perennials not normally grazed. This allows the better grasses to increase. Not only does the grass benefit but it takes less time and money to see after one herd. Wildlife have also benefitted from this system of grazing. Their populations have increased and more food is available to them. Although the Lucky ranch is mostly rangeland, this system

can be applied to almost any type of farming or ranching operations. Harold Price, a local Eastland stockfarmer operating in the Upper Leon District, has been operating a HILF grazing system for some time. His place is composed of rangeland and tame pasture, consisting of weeping lovegrass, kleingrass, bermuda and Tam wintergreen. Each variety of tame pasture is fenced separately and subdivided to allow rotation grazing during their growing season. By this, you can have a short time rotation within a grazing system.

Cattle are grazed and rotated as one herd except during the winter months. Then they are split into two herds the cow-calf herd is rotated between Tam wintergreen and rangeland, and the dry herd is grazed only on rangeland. The HILF grazing system is so versatile that it can be worked into almost any type of grazing program. If you are tired of running all over your farm or ranch, just to see after your livestock, or watching your better grasses disappear by constantly being grazed, and you want to increase your

production, then catch the "bug." You can see how this grazing system works by going to Albany on June 21, where the Texas Young Farmers, Texas Section of Society for Range Management and SCS are sponsoring a tour of the Lucky ranch. Members of the Counties two conservation districts plan to attend this tour and invite you to attend with them. If you have already been bitten by the bug and want to learn more about this new grazing system, your local Soil

Conservation Service is available to assist you.

# Highway Maintenance Has 'Interesting' Aspects Sometimes

Mr. O.D. Finley of Eastland is one of more than 9000 maintenance employees of the Texas Highway Department who has been saluted for their work during the worst winter and early spring in recent history.

Perhaps Mr. Finley's certificate should have an added comment regarding his "hazardous duty" service.

A stray hunter's bullet or a freak shot struck Mr. Finley last winter early one morning when he was directing the maintenance crews in this

county. This certainly should earn him an "above and beyond the call of duty" medal.

A letter of commendation from the Texas Highway Commission went to the heads of some 250 maintenance sections in Texas.

"The past few months serve to remind us of the skill, courage and dedication of you and your crews in emergency situations," the letter said.

Highway Department maintenance crews are based in almost everyone of Texas' 254 counties. Primarily, their job is to keep the highways in good condition, patching pavements, making minor repairs on

structures, picking up litter and caring for natural vegetation and landscaping along the roadside, upkeep of Texas' 1,100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and turnouts and other tasks involved in good highway housekeeping.

In the process, maintenance crews often act as Good Samaritans, coming to the aid of stalled or stranded motorists.

But in times of natural disaster, the crews put in long hours clearing snow and ice off the highways, sanding bridges and putting out warning signs and flares.

The Eastland County Maintenance Department has approximately 360 miles of roadway to take care of. There are 24 full time employees. Of these 24 there are four with over 20 years service, five with 15 years, and the rest with 10 or less. During the bad weather of last winter these men worked around the clock, sometimes 7 days a week, or at least 2 1/2 months. They kept the highways in traveling condition for this period of time, by covering and scraping the ice and snow.

The man in charge is Maintenance Chief O.D. Finley. Mr. Finley had told everyone to go home on the night of February 12 thinking that the highways would be secure for the night. Around 8:00 p.m. that night Mr. Finley received

a phone call from the Cisco P.D. that the overpass in downtown Cisco was icing over, and that it should have some gravel put on the top. Mr. Finley then called two of his maintenance men, Ben Cagle and Melvin Crabtree to assist him. When they arrived at Cisco they found that the bridge was melting off, but they decided to go ahead and put the gravel in some of the access ramps.

After finishing the work around 2:35 the next morning, they started back to the headquarters at Eastland on Interstate 20. Mr. Finley was driving his car in front of the two trucks when a bullet shattered his left door window and went into his temple. He then radioed to the men behind him he was in need of help before running off the road.

They then rushed Mr. Finley to the Hospital in Cisco where he stayed a period of time. But no trace of where the shot came from was ever uncovered.

It goes to show that the Highway Department Staff never knows what they will encounter.

Mr. Finley said he would like to express his extreme thanks to his staff, for always being ready to aid in keeping highways in safe driving condition and that the people of the state of Texas could help in one small but meaning full effort to help them with their job, and that is to "PLEASE DON NOT LITTER."

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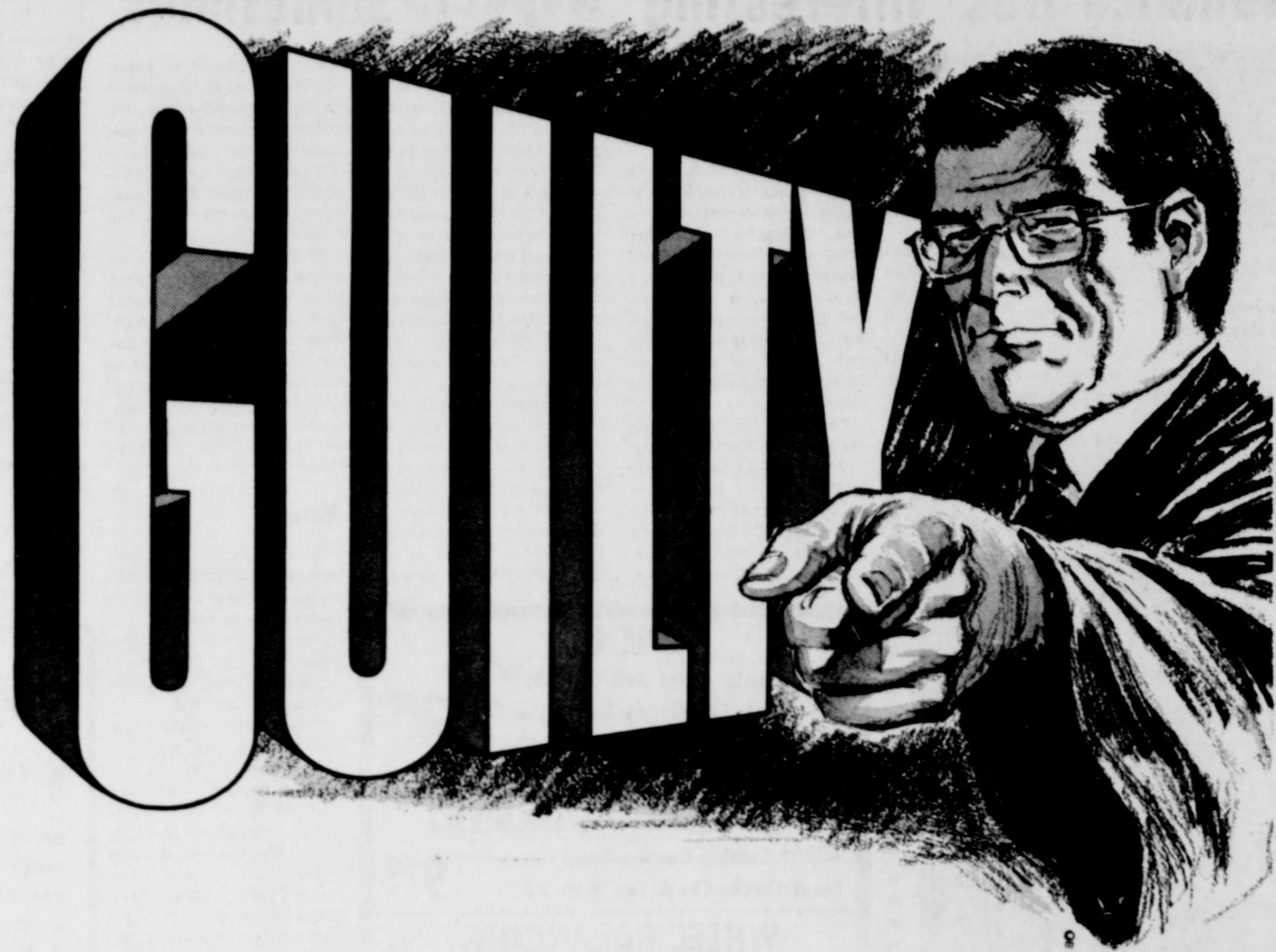

### Gordon Spot

Every dairy cow has her day, or days. In fact, the whole month of June belongs to "Old Bossy".

The dairy cow deserves special recognition because she contributes so much to our well-being. That's why June has been set aside as Dairy Month.

Throughout history the dairy cow has been close to man. She's often been referred to as the foster mother of the human race.

Greek physicians prescribed milk as a medicine 500 years before Christ. Recorded history indicates that the ancestry of modern man and the modern dairy cow "walked hand in hand."

The dairy cow has served as a source of food, drink and clothing, a beast of burden, and provider of power. She has been called nature's most efficient food factory, the number one soil conservationist and an important adjunct to the spread of prosperity and civilization.

Old Bossy's strongest suit, however, is that she produces milk, the nearest thing to a perfect food. Milk contains more than 200 nutrients, including high quality proteins, several important minerals and most of the important vitamins needed for good health. Milk and milk products provide 20 to 25 percent of the nation's essential food nutrients.

So the next time you sip a cold glass of milk, pause and think about "old Bossy". She's contributed much to the health and wealth of American and deserves a little recognition.

I've gotten several calls recently requesting methods of controlling corn earworm in sweet corn. The corn earworm often seriously damages sweet corn. The "brush method" of treatment is recommended for home gardens. Make four

applications at 1-day intervals by pressing a 1-inch brush dipped in a 10 percent carbaryl (Sevin) dust into the silks.

Begin treatment when the first ears start silking.

This dust is also effective in controlling squash bugs. However, some people get better results using Sevin Wettable powder in a spray. This will need to be repeated every week.

Have you wondered about the difference in water-bath and pressure cooker processing of foods in home canning?

The water-bath method is used for processing fruits, rhubarb, and tomatoes and is done using a pan with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker. The pan is large enough to cover the jars with one to two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded with boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat.

The acid in some fruits and vegetable helps prevent the growth of some bacteria which is the reason the water-bath process can be done.

However, low acid fruits and vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. The spores ("seeds") of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker.

What are foods processed by these methods? The water bath is used for such foods as peaches, plums and tomatoes all of which are high in acid. The pressure cooker is used for

such foods as beets, peas, corn, beans, greens and okra.

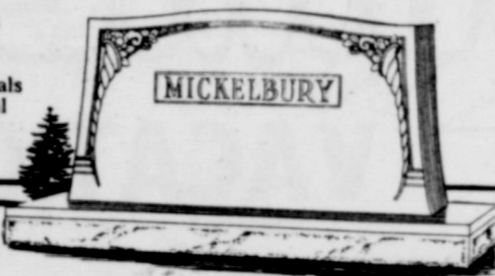
