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Scott Bailey Candidate for Representative

Scott Bailey today authorized this newspaper to announce that he would be a candidate for state representative from the 76th District in the May 7 Democratic primary.

Bailey, who is seeking his first public office, is a native of Eastland County and has been a legal resident of the county all of his life. He is 29 years old.

A graduate of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, he holds a bachelor of science degree from North Texas State College.

At North Texas his major was education and government. He entered the Army as an enlisted man following his college graduation and served two years, including 16 months of active duty in Korea. While in Korea he served with the famed Buffalo Regiment of the 17th Infantry Division.

Following his discharge from the Army, Bailey worked for Oilwell Supply Division of United States Steel Corp. He then enrolled in the University of Texas and completed a year of graduate study.

Bailey then accepted a teaching position in the field of government and United States history. He has been active in professional organizations of the teaching profession.

"After having taught government for the past two and one-half years, I have decided to offer my services as a state representative from the 76th District," he stated.

He announced he would issue his formal statement and platform at a later date.

Parker Honored for Savings Bonds Work

Increased activities will be carried on in this and the other counties of Texas for the 1960 stepped-up U. S. Savings Bonds program, Guy Parker of Eastland, county chairman of the volunteer bond organization announced today.

Parker was honored Thursday night at a bond meeting in Abilene. Eastland County was one of two counties in the entire area which exceeded its 1959 goal. David Fry and Virgil Moore also attended the meeting.

Steps for the expanded program were detailed at a district planning meeting in Abilene, Parker said, at which the increased importance of savings bonds to the sound economy of every person, each community and the nation was emphasized. County bond chairmen, civic and agricultural leaders, bank officers, newspaper

editors, radio station officials and others from the counties in the district were called to the meeting.

Bert Godfrey of Fort Worth, chairman of board and president of Bank of Commerce, was the principal speaker at the District Savings Bond Meeting in the Wooten Hotel.

More volunteers are being enlisted to push the program throughout the year in every community. Everything will be done to make the county goal of \$520,000 and thus help achieve the 1960 Texas goal of \$164.4 million. The national goal is \$4.6 billion.

The chairman urges that everyone in the county help put the 1960 Savings Bonds program over the top by buying more bonds throughout the year.

CISCO WINS DISTRICT Ballinger Edges Mavs In Finale

Eastland's hard-luck Mavericks finished out the basketball season Friday night with a 59-57 setback at the hands of the Ballinger Bearcats.

The Mavs, still not at full physical strength, thus ended in a tie for fourth place in District 7-AA with Ballinger. Cisco came through as expected, beating Winters, 54-38, to wrap up the title. The Lobos ended the year with a record of nine wins and one loss. Winters finished second with an 8-2 slate and Coleman, winner over Ranger Friday night, 82-33, was third with a 6-4 mark. Both Eastland and Ballinger had 3-7 records and Ranger ended the season with a 1-9 record.

Playing in Ballinger, the Mavericks fell behind 24-10 at the end of the first period, and fought an uphill battle the rest of the way. At halftime it was 34-27 and at the end of three periods the score was 48-41.

Eastland also lost the B team game, 42-39, in another close tilt.

Eleven members of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and four from Stamford were present to assist with the new organizations initial steps.

Tons of Area Soil Lost During Storm

We were reminded of "dust bowl" days last Tuesday, and that wind erosion remains a serious hazard for us to contend with. Many tons of soil were lost from peanut fields in our own area. We knew that damage was severe in West Texas by the dust cloud overhead without even reading our newspaper or listening to the broadcasts.

Our only weapon for combating the hazard in our vicinity is to shelter the soil from the wind. We can always expect high winds in early spring so it is essential we keep our fields covered in this period. The three weapons used and proven successful for sheltering peanut fields are winter cover crops, strip crops, and leaving peanut hay or other crop residue on the surface of the soil. These three practices should be used together in peanut farming as each supports the other in effectiveness.

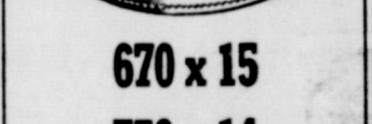

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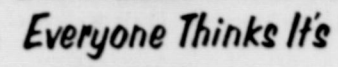
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Sally and Mary Perkins Host Scalerunners Junior Music Club

Leaving Cadiz, Mrs. Murrell went by train the 400 miles to Madrid. She said that it was a 15 hour trip. She stated that Madrid is a very beautiful city and it was designated as the capital

of Spain in the 17th century. The old picturesque part of Madrid is still there, but also there is the new part which is beautiful with wide streets and plazas and fountains. All the street and highway work is done by hand. In Madrid, she visited the Palace of Kings. The dictator does not live in it but he lives in the Summer Palace, an ornate estate.

Mrs. Murrell then visited Toledo and saw them making jewelry for which it is famous. The Crusaders went through Toledo to get their swords. Toledo steel swords were considered the best. She told of the cathedral there that is the fourth largest in the world and the largest in Spain.

She said that while in Toledo, she visited a castle not open to the public, as it is still in use. It was built in 1370 and is three stories and has a basement. The walls are four to eight feet thick with a moat around it. It was used as a fortress during the Civil War. Since no modernization is allowed in Toledo, it is a typical Spanish city.

She told of the Burial Place of Kings and that it was established by Phillip II. She stated that it is under the cathedral and is the burial place for the kings and their wives.
