

Mr. A. was a successful young business and civic leader. His life was miserable from morning until night. He went to his doctor who soon found his problem beyond the reach of medicine or surgery. He advised him to go to his pastor. "Your trouble is spiritual." Mr. A. wept as he unburdened his soul in the pastor's study. The burden of unforgiven sin was smothering his life.

Another man, Mr. B., when a child, had slipped secretly into a theater without paying for his ticket. A less sensitive person from a non-Christian house would not have given the incident a second thought, but not this Mr. B. His guilt bothered him so much that at the age of twenty-two he returned to the theater, told the manager what he had done and paid for the ticket.

Both Mr. A. and Mr. B. despised themselves for what they had done. They needed assurance of God's forgiveness to free them from their guilt of their sin. They should realize that the teachings of Jesus concerning forgiveness apply to every area of life. Peter asked Jesus, "Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I

him, "Until seventy times seven" (Matt. 18:21-22). There is no limit to the number of times we should forgive, and no limit to the number of times that God forgives.
