Just One Hour Is Needed to Mobilize Guard

Responding to a division wide practice alert of the 49th Armored Division, the Sev. Btry. 3rd. RKT/How BN 132nd ARTY. mobilized its man power in just 1 hr. 15 minutes and was ready for action.

Lt. Walker B. Ragsdale said the unit received the alert call from Battalion Headquarters in San Angelo, Texas at 6:40 a.m. February 21, 1960 by use of telephone, radio and messenger. The guardsmen were informed of the practice alert. Rushing to their duty stations in uniform the Ranger guardsmen checked out their individual weapons and reported to their superior officer.

"This was a true test of how fast our unit can be ready for action," said Lt. Walker B. Ragsdale. "Our men were quick in reporting and orderly in carrying out their instructions."

When the local unit was doing its part in "Lone Star", the other Texas units of the 10,000 member 49th Armored Division were doing the same.

There was no prior rehearsal for the alert. Only key officers in Division Headquarters knew the exact A-hour of "Lone Star". Each unit was checked for its speed and precision in getting ready to meet any emergency, a requirement of every National Guard Division in the United States. The alert was the first division wide exercise for the 49th Armored Division since "Operation Minuteman" in 1955.

City Will Celebrate Public Schools Week

Texas' 10th annual Public Schools Week is scheduled to begin Sunday and the Eastland Masonic Lodge will sponsor the observance here.

J. B. (Tip) Arther is chairman of the Masonic committee. He will work with High School and Junior High School administrators and teachers in planning the week. Howard Upchurch will serve as South Ward chairman and Johnson Smith will be West Ward chairman.

Dates for the observance are Feb. 28 through March 4. Parents and other interested citizens will be urged to visit schools during the week.

"Our forefathers in their wisdom, recognizing the importance of education in the function and operation of democracy, established the public school to make education available to all," Arther said. "The people of Texas declared, by the expressed terms of the State Constitution, a general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the

liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools." The 1854 School Law provided for the first Public School System in Texas.

"As the years passed our laws were strengthened to make sure that all children of a school age shared in this opportunity for public education. Today the importance of education is not a debatable subject. Our job is to see that children of this generation get the best possible education we can give them. By visiting the schools and familiarizing ourselves with the problems of teachers and students, we become more competent to safeguard and advance the institution that is so American—the public school," Arther concluded.

Support Price On Peanuts Increased

According to D. E. Warren, member of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association Board of Directors, the United States Department of Agriculture has announced that Price Support on 1960 crop peanuts will be \$201.24 per ton (national average) as compared with \$193.50 per ton (national average) in 1959.

This support price is the minimum price at which 1960 crop peanuts will be supported on a national basis and will not be decreased but may be adjusted upward at the beginning of the marketing year, August 1, if at that time, an increased support price is required under existing legislation.

Gray Matter

The other day I was sitting in the living room of Mr. and Mrs. Richard R. Smith, of Smith Sound Service, in the Methodist parsonage in Georgetown when the conversation turned to the problems confronting fathers and bachelors.

Reverend and Mrs. Smith took the position that married men who had fathered several children lived a more hectic and demanding life than bachelors like Jim Golden, Lowell Snyder, or James Reid.

I can't say that I agree with the preacher because the problems confronting single men are never broadcast over the community and most bachelors don't talk about the things that confront them as they go about their daily living, while married men seem to make a sort of "holy crusade" of broadcasting the things they're confronted with all over the community.

But before I go any further with this I guess it might be well for me to explain the "Smith Sound Service" mentioned in the first sentence.

While Brother Smith was pastoring the Methodist Church in Eastland he and Frank Castleberry became very good friends. At the time of Mr. Castleberry's passing Mrs. Castleberry and other members of the family asked that friends of the family not send flowers for the funeral but that they put aside some money to be used as a living memorial to the Memory of Frank Castleberry.

It was Mr. Castleberry's wish that a good amplifying system be installed in the church, so the money arising from the fund created by this wish of the pastor's friend was used to buy the equipment.

The preacher never was one to be bashful around a pair of pliers and screwdriver, so he decided he would install the equipment himself.

An amplifying system consisting of three amplifying speakers on each side of the church sanctuary together with 15 or 20 individual outlets for the hard of hearing or those who needed to wear hearing aids in their daily living.

This installation took a little time and effort. But Richard Smith was equal to the task and put it in almost single-handedly. He did call on Guy Harrell and Homer Latham for some professional help and advice, but most of the work itself, he did himself. The night he finished the job he worked on it till 2 a.m. getting the task completed.

Now that it is installed I think I can be safe in saying that no church anywhere has better amplifying system now than the Eastland Methodist Church. The real pity of it all is that we didn't have it back in the days when we had pastors who didn't have to strong voices and whose message was lost to much of the audience who couldn't hear too well in the back of the sanctuary. But those days are gone now. The Smith-installed system is so powerful that we have to keep it turned down a little or it'll knock you right out of the pew.

Since going to Georgetown, Richard has installed amplifying systems in two churches and a drive in. When he mentioned installing the equipment in the "drive in," I said, "You've got them upping in that beer joint, huh?" "Doesn't sell beer," he gusted. "Georgetown is as dry as Eastland."

His latest installation was in the church in Georgetown and there is now a new tax on sound and electronic equipment that has to be reported to the state controller, the pastor took out a license as Smith Sound Service for reporting the tax on the equipment he used in amplifying the church.

That explains the business firm of Smith Sound System. It's Richard R. Smith, III, pastor of the

Fifty-Two Uniforms Have Been Pledged

Pledges have now been secured for enough money to purchase 52 band uniforms by the Band Boosters Club. That means just 18 more uniforms are needed to suit out the 70-piece Eastland High band in 1960.

In announcing the sale of 10 more uniforms, James Wright, Band Boosters' president urged persons wishing to give smaller contributions to send the checks immediately to post office box 29.

"We still need enough money to buy 18 more uniforms he said, and we feel that it will take the help of almost all Eastland citizens to put the drive to the top. A n y amount will help, so if you can give \$100 or \$1 we urge you to send in your share today."

Warren explained that the increased support price in 1960 will raise the minimum market price on peanuts sold by farmers, since the government support price basically establishes the floor under the market price. Generally speaking, therefore, the 1960 price as established by the support figure should be expected to be \$7 to \$8 per ton more than in 1959. This would amount to approximately 12c per bushel increase over the 1959 support price.

Warren stated that the announced price increase resulted in part from a hearing held by the agriculture department on Feb. 10, 1960. Warren and other members of the board of directors of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association appeared at the hearing and presented evidence of the need for a peanut price increase. Grower representatives from the Eastern and Southwestern United States also participated in the Feb. 10 hearing.

Warren also said that the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will again aid peanut growers of the area in the marketing of their 1960 crop peanuts.

Inspection Service personnel will demonstrate its newly developed pre-sizer, splitter and sheller. All interested growers are given a cordial invitation to attend this demonstration.

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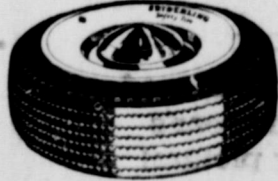
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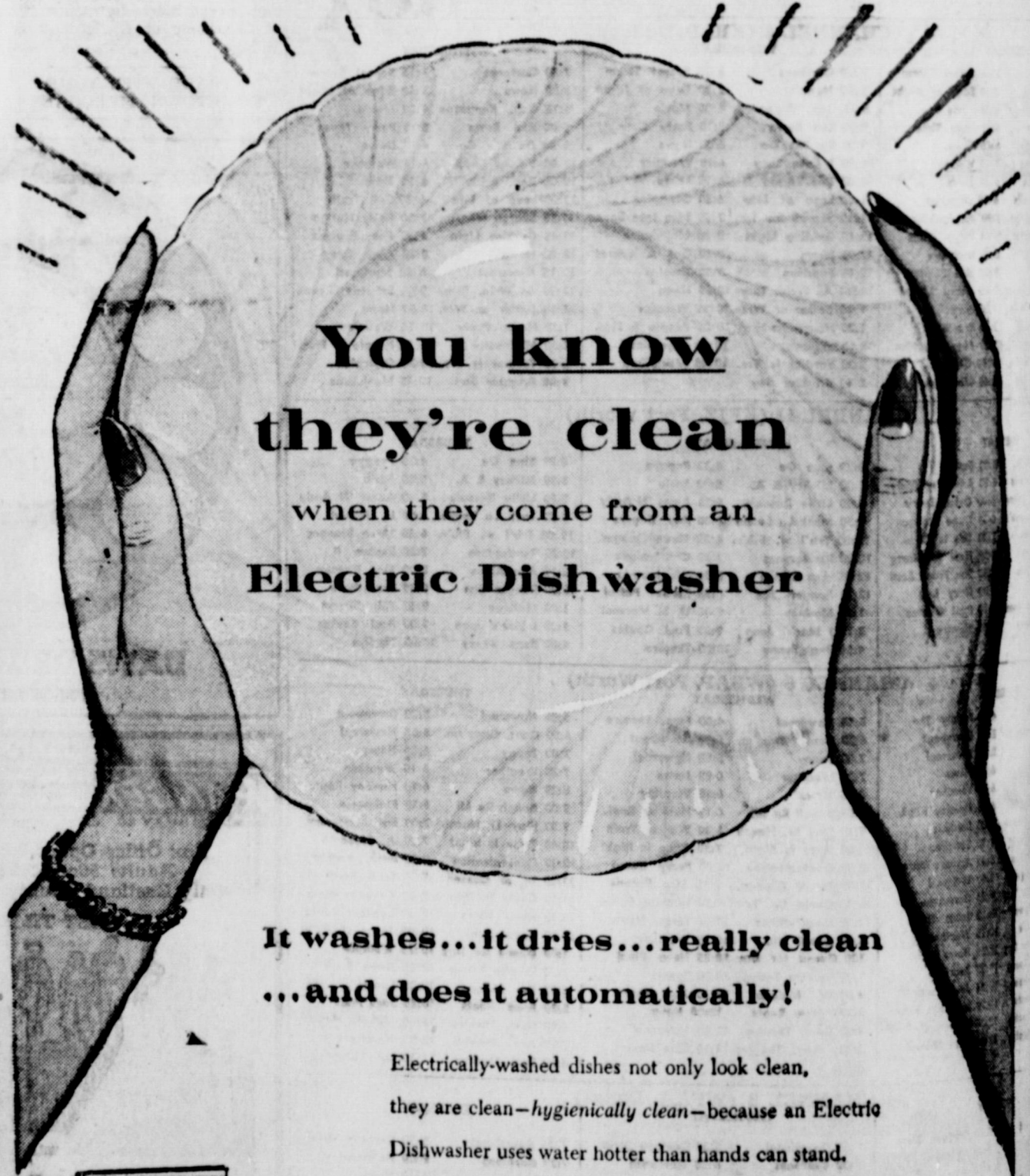
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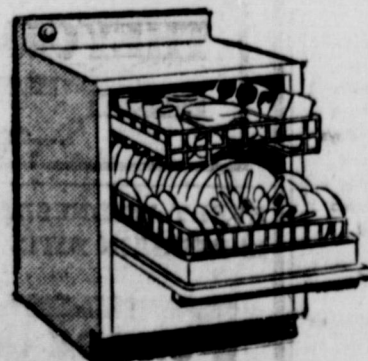
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
