



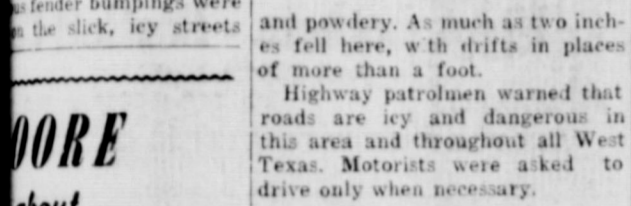
## DOORS CLOSE

### Now Covers Entire Area

Whipped by cold wind, Eastland County Wednesday was under a blizzard this morning. Temperature readings dropped 10 degrees last night, ending at 8 a.m. was just below zero.

Eastland schools let out today, and Supt. Wendell H. Jones said there will be no school tomorrow because of weather conditions. The snow which fell was fine and powdery. As much as two inches fell here, with drifts in places of more than a foot.

Highway patrolmen warned that roads are icy and dangerous in this area and throughout all West Texas. Motorists were asked to drive only when necessary.



### Green, Wilson On All-District Second Team

Cisco, winner of District 7-AA basketball, dominated the all-district selections by placing all five of their starters on the 17-man squad.

Two Cisco boys were named on the first team, senior Delbert Shaefer 5-11 and senior Charles Lipsy 5-9. The other three rounding out the first team were Dean Richey 6-2 junior from Ranger, Billy Jones 5-10 junior from Ballinger and Charles Mayo, 6-1 senior from Coleman.

Eastland topped the list on the second team with two berths, John Wilson, senior and Otis Green, senior. Green who is likely the best college prospect in the district was unable to play the last five district games due to a bout with the flu. Others making the second team were, William Grissom, junior from Winters, Homer Smith, senior from Cisco and John Bibbey, a senior from Ballinger.

Eastland landed two men on the honorable mention list. They were Don Wilson and David Whitten.

Cisco and Coleman each took double positions on the honorable mention team. Juniors Martin Green and Chip Drumwright of Cisco, and seniors Ward Lane and Charles Graves of Coleman were named on this team. James Henry, junior from Ranger, Stephen Brown, junior from Ballinger and Jimmy Smith, senior from Winters, completed the eight man list.

### Texas Public Schools Week Begins Sunday

Texas' 10th annual Public Schools Week is scheduled to begin Sunday and Eastland Public Schools invite the citizens of Eastland to join them in observance of the occasion.

This is the tenth year that Texas observed Public Schools week. It was originated by the Texas Citizens' Committee on Public Schools Week for the purpose of acquainting all of our people with programs and accomplishments of our public education system.

The committee states that legislative guarantees of educational opportunity for every child in Texas elementary and secondary schools are valid only to the extent that the educational program of each school district meets or exceeds the minimum guarantees of the State.

Standards for teacher education which were established pursuant to the Certification Law of 1955 required Texas colleges and universities to offer a well-balanced program of preparation. About 40 per cent of the program is devoted to basic education (arts and sciences), 40 per cent to the subject to be taught, and 20 per cent to the professional preparation.

The ever increasing school population of Texas points to and emphasizes the growing need for public school instructional facilities as well as qualified teachers. It also suggests that maximum utilization should be made of buildings and teachers already available. It is economically sound to utilize as fully as possible every available space and facility.

The Public Schools should provide all children with a knowledge of the traditional accepted "fundamentals". These fundamentals were defined in the early elementary schools as reading, writing and arithmetic. As the pupil advances in school, these three R's should be accompanied by a study of such courses as higher mathematics, science, history, and English.

### Eastland National Bank "On The Square"

Plans were announced today to completely remodel the Eastland National Bank.

H. T. Wilson, president, announced that the bank's board of directors have given final approval to a wholesale remodeling plan for the bank building, which is located on the east side of the square.

"We will completely re-decorate the bank without making any structural changes," Wilson announced. He said the bank will be remodeled both inside and out.

"We hope to make the bank more attractive and pleasing without being overly plush," the bank executive explained. Architects have drawn up plans re-designing the building "to fit the operational needs of the Eastland area so that we can better serve our customers."

Work on the interior of the building will begin Monday, March 7. Wilson estimated it would take three months to complete the remodeling work inside the bank, and during that time all banking facilities will be moved to the building next door to Texas Electric Service Co., which formerly housed the Hollywood-Maxwell plant.

Banking facilities will be moved March 5-6 to the temporary banking headquarters. Doors of the bank will be closed March 7 and all banking transactions will be done at the building in the 100 block of East Commerce. The only facilities which will still be in operation at the present bank building will be the night deposit box and safe deposit boxes.

One of the features of the remodeled building will be safety deposited boxes on the main floor of the bank, instead of in the cellar.

Wilson said, "We will be off the square for a while, but our customers can expect to receive the same friendly service they have learned to expect."

Once the interior of the bank is completely re-modeled, facilities of the bank will be moved back in. Then work on the building's exterior will begin.

### Scouts Selling First Aid Kits In Safety Drive

According to available statistics, every four seconds throughout the year someone is temporarily disabled by a minor accident in or around his home. More accidents occur in the home or yard than anywhere else, including the streets and highways. In spite of this record, one out of every three homes is lacking in one or more of the basic first-aid essentials. Only one out of five families owns a first-aid kit.

Commenting on this situation, Jim Horn, scoutmaster of Troop 6, stated that members of his group are meeting a gratifying response from Eastland homeowners to their current "Be Prepared for Accidents" campaign. To raise money for activities, members of the Troop are calling on every house in Eastland, offering a wide selection of first-aid kits for sale. The kits are supplied by Johnson and Johnson.

"Accident preparedness," Horn said, "should, of course, take into account both home accidents and accidents away from home. A first-aid kit in the kitchen will save a trip upstairs to the bathroom medicine cabinet when a finger is nicked by a sharp knife. It will save steps and time when children come in from play, with hurts to be cleaned and bandaged. "A first-aid kit kept in the car may prevent a serious infection if someone member of the family suffers a minor injury during a trip, when a drug store may be far away. A first-aid travel kit, tucked into the corner of a suitcase can save worry about infection if the traveler acquires a cut, scrape or scratch while on a train or bus, or in a hotel."

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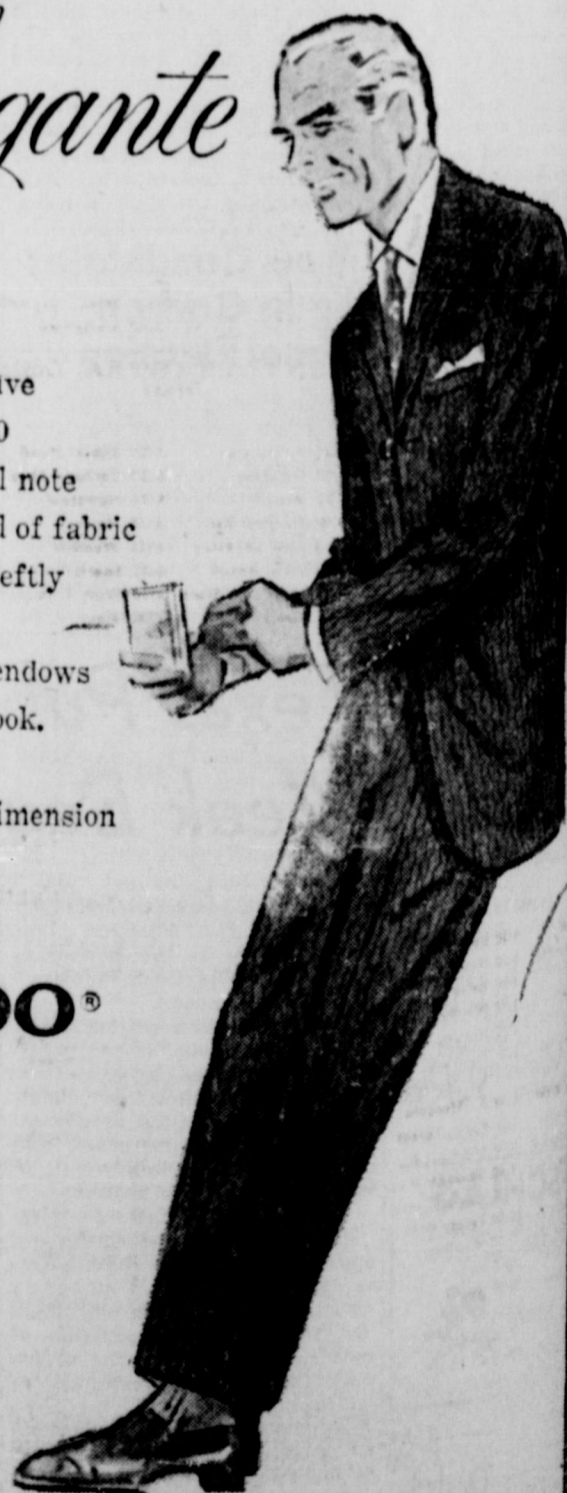

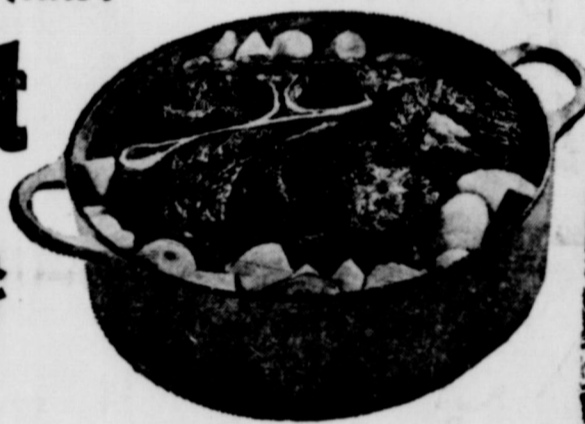

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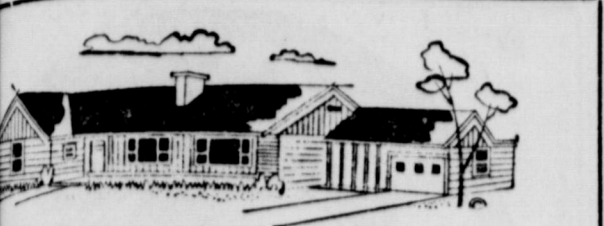

All proceeds of the dinner will be added to the fund to obtain a youth director for the church.

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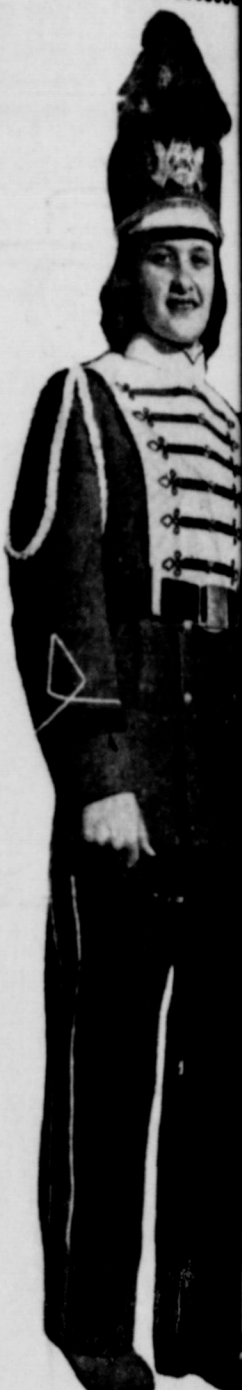
