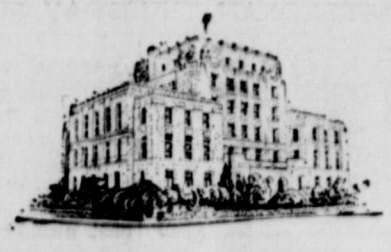

Go-Kart Races At 570 Speedway Saturday Night

Winners in the feature races were: Woman's class, Barbara Glase of Abilene, Boys feature race Mike Boase of Breckenridge and the men's feature race, Don Simpson of Abilene. Consolation race was won by Dave Cahill of Breckenridge.

Cars were also entered from Graham, Albany and Brownwood. A spokesman for the speedway stated that cars were expected from Fort Worth and Midland for this week's races.

Trophies will be given winners in all divisions of the races. Bill Potts of Eastland has been elected chairman of the newly organized 570 Go-Kart Speedway Club. Membership in the club is growing rapidly and permanent organization of the club and election of officers will be held in the near future. The club members are invited to use the 570 Speedway track for racing their private cars on any day that the track is not being used for rental. One hour each Thursday night has also been set aside for club members to race at the track.

Go-Kart races will be held at the 570 Speedway every other Saturday night.

Mavs Take On Indians In Opening Game Friday

Eastland kids of the 1960 high school football program Friday night, playing host to the Comanche Indians, in a non-district game. Kick-off time is 8 p.m. at Municipal Stadium.

The Mavs' odds are a big question mark this year and the opening game should tell a lot about Coach Carroll Shelton's charges. The first 20 men eligible to play, the Mavs are expected to face a big problem in lack of reserves.

Patent's first unit may be fairly strong, however. The Mavs are having some trouble trying to shape up at the end positions, but tackle to tackle things look fairly well. Bill Jones, a 170-pound starting guard, may miss the first game, though. He is having his troubles with an infected elbow, and the doctor hasn't given him the green light as yet. Motor Vehicle Inspection Period Begins Today

The Texas Public Safety Commission has designated Sept. 1 as the beginning of the 1961 Motor Vehicle Inspection period in Texas. The period ends on April 15, 1961.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that 4,700 inspection stations will be ready on Thursday, Sept. 1 to attach the new 1961 inspection stickers to the windshields of more than four and one-half million vehicles coming under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act. All such vehicles must display the new sticker on April 16, 1961.

Garrison said, "We feel that the vehicle inspection program in Texas has proved a deterrent to vehicle accidents on our streets and highways." He urged all motorists to get their vehicles inspected before the bad weather of winter begins.

"It takes just a few minutes to have a vehicle safety checked," Garrison said. "Yet those few minutes spent today could mean the saving of someone's life tomorrow."

Garrison noted that the per cent of accidents in which vehicle defects were causative factors has been cut approximately in half since the program was started in Texas.

The fee for each inspection is \$1.00 plus any repair or adjustment necessary. The average cost for inspection in 1960, including the \$1.00 fee, was \$2.00 per vehicle.

There are many misconceptions about wood and its use. Most of these fallacies are with specific support and can be readily disproved. The use of wooden fence posts is one example.

Fence posts should properly be placed in the ground with the butt, or large end, in the ground. However, some fences are built with the small end of posts in the ground. It has been claimed that they will render better service in that position. Actually, posts placed in the ground up-side-down will not last as long as those set upright. First, the small end of a post is not as large as the butt end. Consequently, it is physically weak-

er at the ground line, like a fishing pole grasped at the small end. Secondly, the top end of the post has a higher proportion of sapwood than the lower end. Sapwood is less resistant to decay than heartwood. The butt end of the post usually has a higher proportion of heartwood. Heartwood is relatively more decay resistant than sapwood. Hence, the butt, or large end of the post should always be put in the ground.

The pleasure of newly painted property is sometimes marred by early paint failure. Frequently this is neither the cause of the paint, nor the painter. Several simple rules applicable to the painting on wooden surfaces will usually assure satisfactory results.

1. The proper type of quality of paint should be used for the specific job.
2. Manufacturers instructions relating to preparing the painting surface, mixing the paint, prime coats, and methods of application should be carefully followed.
3. Painting is undesirable during temperatures under 40 degrees or over 90 degrees. A wrinkled surface generally occurs.
4. Repainting should be done before the old paint has worn sufficiently to expose the wood surface.
5. Do not repaint too frequently. The paint film becomes excessively thick and brittle, and cracks and peels easily. A good paint job should give satisfactory service for 4 to 6 years.
6. If paint is applied scantily by brushing on too thin a film or by using excessive paint thinner, the paint will chalk or wear off early.
7. If paint is applied too generously, it will present a wrinkled wavy appearance.
8. The surface to be painted should be smooth and free of dust, dirt, mildew and loose flaky paint.
9. Do not paint moist surfaces, nor dry surfaces in damp weather. Dew, frost or other moisture under a paint film causes blistering and eventual peeling.

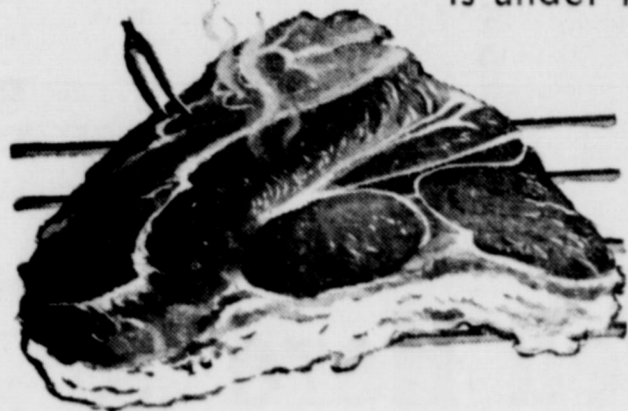

State Safety Department Plans Extensive Labor Day Campaign

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official prediction that 29 persons will be killed next weekend in Labor Day holiday traffic in Texas. Garrison said some 125 extra patrolmen from the department's other uniformed services will join the regular Highway Patrol force in attempting to halt traffic law violations — which figure in most fatal accidents. "We hope the driving public will help this Labor Day weekend to prove that we have over-estimated the number of traffic fatalities that will occur in the three-day period," he said. "Department patrolmen and all other law enforcement officers in our state will do everything possible to make the streets and high-

ways safer by removing lawless drivers — but the statistics prove the main job is up to the individual behind the wheel."

"It is significant to note that in each of the 14 fatal accidents which occurred outside city limits last Labor Day weekend, at least one law violation was involved."

N. K. Woerner, manager of the department's statistical services, reported that excessive speed over the posted limits was involved in 10 of the 14 rural fatal accidents during the holiday last year and that drinking was involved in seven of the 14.

In recent years, the highest statewide traffic toll for the three-day Labor Day holiday was 43 killed in 32 accidents in 1955. Thirty died in 1958, and 27 motor-vehicles occurred during the Labor Day holiday of 1959.

"Labor Day is a yearly turning point in our lives—a time of year when activities, dress and behavior of Texans make a definite change. It is a time for many of us to take that last big outing before settling down to the routine of fall and the school season," Garrison said.
