6. If paint is applied scantily by brushing on too thin a film or by ising excessive paint thinner, the paint wil chalk or wear off early. 7. If paint is applied too generously, it will present a wrinkled \$17,000 to the fund. wavy appearance.

8. The surface to be painted hould be smooth and free of dust, firt, mildew and loose flaky paint. 9. Do not paint moist surfaces, or dry surfaces in damp weather. Dew, frost or other moisture under a paint film causes blistering and eventual peeling.


