General Robert E. Lee gives vivid descriptions, in his letters, of experiences in Texas a few years before the Civil War, when he commanded the string of forts which guarded the frontier from the Indians.

Writing to his wife from Camp Cooper concerning the Fourth of July, 1856, he said, "Mine was spent, after a march of thirty miles on one of the branches of the Brazos, under my blanket, elevated on four sticks driven in the ground as a sun-shade. The sun was very hot, the atmosphere was like the blast from a hot-air furnace, the water salt, still my

feelings for my country were as ardent, my faith in her future as true, and my hopes for her advancement as unabated as they would have been under better circumstances."

He traveled from Camp Cooper to Fort Ringgold on the Rio Grande, giving this account in a letter to his wife on Oct. 3, 1856: "I arrived here on the 28th after 27 consecutive days of travel. The distance was greater than I had anticipated, being 730 miles. I was detained one day on the road by high water—had to swim my mules and get the wagon over by hand. My mare took me very comfortably, but all my wardrobe, from my socks up to my plume, was immersed in the muddy water—epaulets, sash, etc. . . .

"I am writing with much inconvenience from a stiff finger, caused by a puncture from a Spanish bayonet, while pitching my tent on the road, which struck the joint. Every branch and leaf in this country nearly are armed with a point, and some seem to poison

the flesh." Writing from Fort Brown, he told of visiting Matamoros, Mexico, for the first time, "The town looked neat, though much out at the elbow, and nothing apparently going on of interest. The plaza or square was enclosed and the trees and grass flourishing, for which I am told the city is indebted to Major William Chapman of the quartermaster's department, who made the improvement while it was in the occupation of the American army. The most attractive thing to me in town were the orange trees loaded with unripe fruit. The oleander was in full bloom, and there were some large date, fig and palm trees."

The letter was written near Christmas, 1856, and he said, "The time is approaching when I trust many of you will be assembled around the family hearth at dear Arlington another Christmas. Though absent, my heart will be in the midst of you, and I shall enjoy in imagination and memory all that is going on. May nothing occur to mar or cloud the family fireside, and may each be able to look back with pride and pleasure at their deeds of the past year, and with confidence and hope to that in prospect."

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Highway Dept. Plans Tourist Attraction Job

The Texas tourist industry continued its headlong decline during 1960.

The Lone Star State lost a million out-of-state visitors last year, according to the 1960 Texas Tourist Industry Report released today by the Texas Highway Department.

The total number of tourists visiting Texas last year dwindled to 8.6 million, as compared with 9.6 million in 1959. Tourists spent a total of \$457 million in Texas during 1960, a figure well below the State's peak tourist year, 1957.

Herbert C. Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs, Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, said he is "deeply disturbed" at the consistently downward trend of the Texas tourist industry in recent years.

"Tourism is a vital factor in the economy of our State," Petry said. "Tourists pay \$17 million annually in direct State taxes. The decrease in our tourist trade means a loss of millions of new dollars to our economy and a rain on our tax resources." He said the sharp year-to-year decline in tourism since 1957 is the direct result of aggressive competition from our States.

"We are engaged in a 'war between the States' for the tourist dollar," he said.

However, Petry said he sees a "silver lining" to the tourist situation. He pointed out that the current session of the Texas Legislature is now studying a budget request for \$300,000 a year for the next biennium to be used for tourist advertising. When appropriated by the Legislature, this money would be administered by the Highway Department, which is the State's official tourist agency.

"Texas needs this tourist advertising budget to get back in the competition for the tourist dollar," Petry said. "When the Legislature approves our media advertising budget, for the first time in history we will be able to compete with other States by advertising Texas' tourist resources."

"When Texas enters this field Petry said, "the experience of other States indicates that a handsome profit could be reaped." He said New Mexico gets back \$34 in State taxes for every dollar spent for tourist advertising and that Arkansas gets back \$40 in taxes for each advertising dollar. "Some other States get even larger returns," he said, "since tourists generally buy those items which carry the stiffest State taxes."

The Highway Commission Chairman said the Highway Department's Travel and Information Division is now doing all possible "within the limits fixed by law" to attract tourists. The 1960 Tourist

Industry Report reflects this activity, he said. "Although the number of visitors fell off a full million, the tourists who did come stayed longer and spent more—encouraged by the travel information services offered by Highway Department Tourist Bureaus plus the cooperative efforts of local organizations."

According to the report, the average visitor stayed six days in Texas, spending at the rate of \$8.91 per day and traveling more than 1100 miles. Two out of every three out-of-state visitors were on vacation—and the same portion had been to Texas before. The Tourist Industry Report is an annual publication issued by the Highway Department.

Austin Report

On Monday the House of Representatives, in a joint session with the Senate, was honored with an address by the Chancellor of the Republic of West Germany, Konrad Adenauer. This was the culmination of his visit to Texas as the guest of Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. The sincere warmth of his reception to our state was clearly shown by the standing ovations given him in the House Chamber. To me, the applause seemed to be an expression of the American people's respect and admiration for Chancellor Adenauer's courage in leading his country's firm opposition to further Communist aggression in Europe.

Bills passed by the House last week include:

House Bill 113, setting up safety and comfort regulations over intrastate migrant farm workers; House Bill 263, to allow ten juror verdicts in Civil cases; House Bill 12, creating a Little Haver Commission; State Bills 196 and 276, tightening regulations on movement of livestock from brucellosis or fever-tick areas into clean areas; House Bill 111, to let any County provide fire protection; House Bill 645, changing North Texas State College to North Texas University.

The Senate is still considering House Bill 334, the omnibus tax bill sent them from the House last week. With each passing day time becomes more "of the essence"—you can expect an increasing volume of legislation in the coming weeks now that most of the committees have completed their studies of the bills before them. Up to this point during the 57th Session of the Legislature, there have been approximately fifteen hundred pieces of legislation introduced. It is obviously a tremendous task for each and every item to be carefully considered. This is why the committee and sub-committee system is a vital necessity in the field of legislative endeavor.

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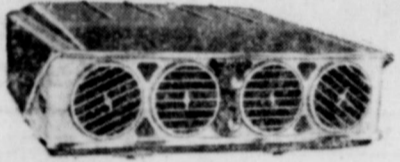
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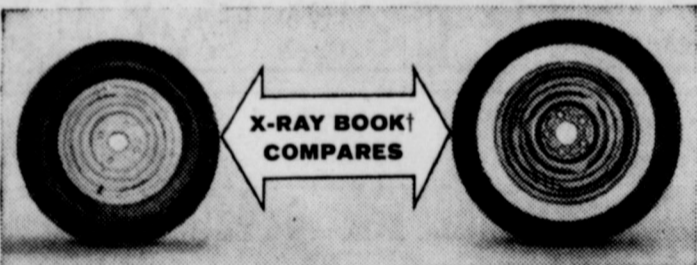

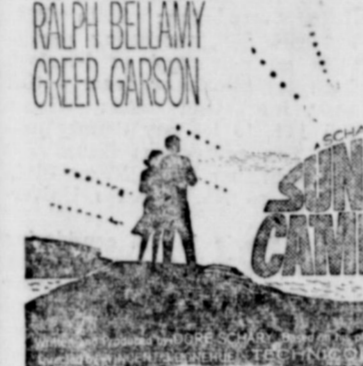
