

# POW To Be Speaker For Law Enforcement Banquet April 19

Colonel Burer will be the guest speaker at the Annual Law Enforcement Banquet in Eastland, Texas, on April 19.

The Annual Banquet of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association will be held Friday, April 19, at 7 p.m. at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria.

Featured speaker will be Col. Art Burer, U.S. Air Force, former Prisoner of War in Vietnam.

Tickets go on sale Monday at \$3.50 from any law enforcement officer in Eastland County. The event will be catered by Vance Godby.

Lt. Col. Arthur W. Burer is a former Prisoner of War presently undergoing Pilot Instructor Training at Randolph AFB. Upon completion of training, he will be assigned to Webb AFB at Big Springs, Texas, where he will instruct Undergraduate Pilot Training.

Col. Burer was born in San Antonio Sept. 3, 1932, but traveled extensively throughout his youth as the son of a career military man. Col. Burer completed high school in Washington D.C. in 1950, and shortly thereafter enlisted in the Air Force at the height of the Korean War. Six years later he won an appointment to OCS, which led to a commission and flying training. His formal training began at George Washington University in 1954, followed by Laredo Junior College and the University of Omaha where he received his B.A. degree in 1964.

With the outbreak of hostilities in South Vietnam, Col. Burer volunteered for reconnaissance duty. His capture came during a mission over North Vietnam on March 21, 1966, when he was forced to abandon his aircraft after it was struck by enemy ground fire. Within moments after reaching the ground, Col. Burer was taken prisoner. He was released by the North Vietnamese February 12, 1973, after spending six years and 11 months as a Prisoner of War.

Col. Burer's military decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross; two Air Medals; the Purple Heart and the Air Force Commendation Medal.

Col. Burer is married to the former Nancy Dickerman of Arlington, Virginia. They have four children.

Five Eagle Scout awards will be presented and the annual Good Law Enforcement Award will be made. Announcing details of the event are program chairman committee comprised of Eastland Police Chief John Morren, D.P.S. Sgt. Jerry Mathews, Policeman Louis Hollywood of Cisco and Justice of the Peace M.D. Underwood of Ranger.

## 2 Commissioners To Be Elected Tuesday From List Of 5

The polls open at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday at City Hall when voters will choose from a list of five candidates to fill two places on the City Commission.

The terms of Mayor Durel Reid and Commissioner Jay Staggs expire. Announced as candidates are: Myrna Dabney, Mrs. Dan Childress, Bill Hoffmann, Ray Pryor and Charles Marshall.

The two polling most votes will be elected. Mrs. Marcus O'Dell is election judge. Polls close at 7:00 p.m.



Mrs. Dabney, 36, a native of Brownwood, is active in local women's organizations and is a member of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club, as well as the Eastland Civic Theatre.

She attended Abilene Christian College where she was a member of Omega Rho Alpha. She was also a member of the "W" Club, an honorary organization based on character, scholarship, leadership, and service. While living in Brownwood, she was employed by General Telephone Company as Customer Records Supervisor, for the West Texas Division.

In announcing for the City Commission, Mrs. Dabney said, "I have made the decision to announce for a place on the Eastland City Commission based on several factors, which I will discuss through the press at a later date."

"However, I would like to assure one and all that I intend to represent all citizens of Eastland, and be their personal representative on the Commission. I will welcome legitimate complaints from all citizens if I am elected and will assure them that they will be treated in an understanding and courteous manner. I promise to make notations of all complaints, and bring them to the attention of the City Manager if elected. I further promise to follow through on these complaints."

Mrs. Dabney is married to F. James Dabney and the couple are the parents of one son, John Eric, a 14 year old freshman in Eastland High School.



Mrs. Childress is a native of Albuquerque, N.M., where she graduated from high school and was a dental assistant. She later took business training and served as a counselor in the employment agency in Albuquerque.

She married Dan Childress, native Eastlander. They have two sons, Bob, a forester of Hill City, S.D., and Scott, athletic director in the public school system at Gallup, N.M., and two grandsons.

She said, "I've enjoyed working with the people of Eastland in the past and would like to continue."

Mr. and Mrs. Childress returned to Eastland a few years ago upon his retirement from the forest service.

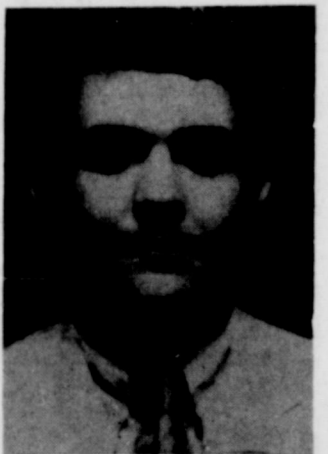

The home demonstration

 program on Furniture First Aid  
 has prompted many of the  
 women to make up these  
 homemade formulas and apply  
 to their antique furniture  
 pieces.

As you and I know, furniture  
 reaches a point where it needs  
 more than dusting and  
 polishing. Many pieces need  
 only to be cleaned to restore  
 their finish since removing the  
 finish of a valuable piece of  
 furniture can destroy its value  
 and character. The following  
 information is for those pieces  
 of furniture which simply need  
 cleaning and not refinishing.  
 Your homemade furniture  
 cleanser - conditioner will  
 restore natural grain and color  
 of wood, conceal scratches,  
 retard crazing, removes  
 cloudiness caused by smoke,  
 grease and dust, and will  
 recondition dry woods caused  
 from over heated atmosphere  
 of rooms. The Furniture

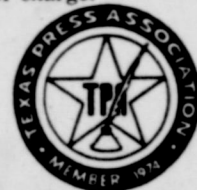
Cleanser - Conditioners should  
 be applied every six months.  
 Caution: use the cleanser  
 conditioner sparingly on  
 shellac finishes.

To make the furniture  
 Cleanser - Conditioner mix in a  
 jar 1 part of gum turpentine  
 with 3 parts of boiled linseed  
 oil. Cover tightly and shake  
 well. This mixture keeps in-  
 definitely.

To apply and use the cleanser  
 - conditioner: first, heat some  
 water and pour into dish. Set  
 dish on saucer or pie tin. Then  
 shake the solution and pour  
 enough of the cleanser -  
 conditioner into the dish to  
 cover the surface of the hot  
 water. Do not stir. Dip cloth  
 into floating oil mixture, and  
 apply to a small area. Avoid  
 getting excess moisture in  
 joints or glued areas. Rub  
 surface with oil mixture. Use  
 toothbrush on carved areas and  
 grooves. If there is a build up of  
 dirt, dip 3 - 0 steel wool into  
 mixture and rub lightly. Wring  
 out cloth with clear warm  
 water and wipe furniture  
 surface.

Furniture polish is also easy  
 to make and works beautifully.  
 Mix equal parts of: denatured  
 alcohol, fresh strained lemon  
 juice, olive oil, and gum tur-  
 pentine. This polish will keep  
 indefinitely.

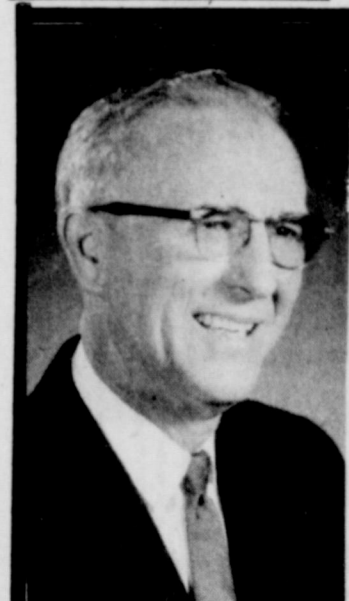

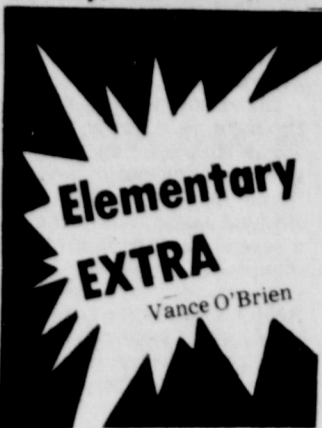

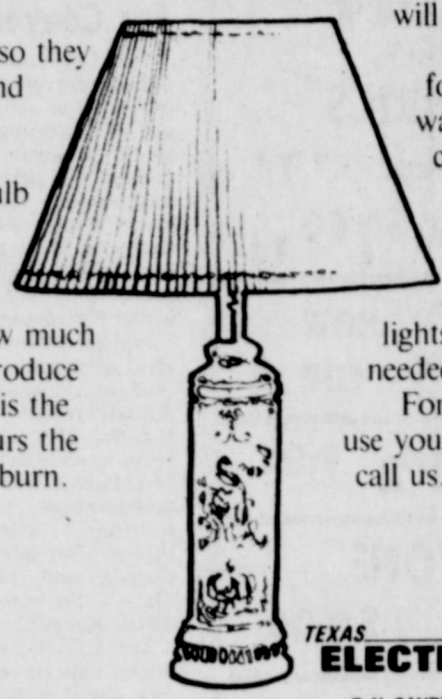
