



## Construction On Lake Road Due to Begin

Contract for construction of the two-mile road which will complete the paved highway on Lake Leon was let this week in Austin. Low bidder was Bros. Inc. of San Antonio. The low bid was \$102,469.

London Smith, Eastland County engineer, said that construction on the 5.4 mile highway would probably begin in May. Work will involve construction of the intersection of Farm Road 570 and FM Road 2214.

When the road is completed it will give area citizens a paved road around 8,000 acre foot lake will complete a dream of land and Ranger planners.

The work was approved earlier

by the State Highway Department and it was announced that the project would probably get underway in about June. The month earlier starting date was welcomed by local officials.

## Cyclist Pedals 200 Miles To Visit Eastland Friend

The weatherman lost another friend Saturday. David Senechalle, 19-year-old University of Texas student from Chicago, joined the anti-weathermen club after pedaling his bicycle 200 miles from Austin to Eastland to visit a fellow student who was home for the holidays.

Senechalle's reason for being unhappy with the weatherman was a 40 mile-per-hour north wind

which he faced for all but 30 miles of his unused trip. The day before he left on his trip he checked with the Weather Bureau and found he would have a favorable gentle wind from the south. Thirty miles out of Austin he hit the strong north wind which made his trip the "hardest ever."

David decided to make the trip on his road racing bicycle after his friend, Janis Little, announced she would be in Eastland during the Easter holidays. Senechalle is training in hopes of competing in the Olympic Games this year for the United States and thought the Eastland trip would be good training.

The young cyclist left Austin at 2 a.m. Saturday and arrived in Eastland some 18 hours later, at about 8:30 p.m.

"He didn't look as tired as I thought he would," Janis admitted. In fact, Janis said she thought David would turn back after the "norther" blew in.

Senechalle, who says his last name hasn't ever been spelled cor-

rectly in a newspaper (we hope it is this time), made just five stops during his long trip. His first stop was at Lampasas to eat eggs. His second stop was at Goltswite where he replaced four broken spokes. He stopped again at Brownwood to eat a thick steak, then halted between Brownwood and Rising Star to fix a flat. His last stop was at Rising Star where he ate some fruit.

His bike was made in Germany, and his complete equipment cost about \$170. It has eight forward gears, but the wind was so strong Saturday that David was forced to stay in low gear all the way.

The young cyclist, who is studying graduate mathematics although he is just a sophomore at Texas U., has been riding a bike every since "I could stand up."

He has been riding a racing bicycle for about six years.

David will compete in the Olympic trials in New York July 21-26 and hopes to win a trip to Rome for the Olympics. He will have to pedal just 120 miles in the trials, and that should be a breeze after his 200 mile trip. He is a member of the South Chicago Wheelmen.

What does the unusual young man remember best about his trip? Having to pedal down hill because of the strong wind and making a wrong turn just out of Austin which cost him four precious miles.

Does he recommend cycling for others? Indeed, David says that nothing is so good for the body. It builds up the riders legs, back, arms, hands, and entire body.

The Telegram reporter who interviewed Senechalle just couldn't pass up one last question: "Do you plan to ride the bicycle back?"

David gave him a sour look and replied, "No sir, I wouldn't ride that bike back for anything."

## Johnson Resigns As Chief

City commissioners had themselves a busy night when they held their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night. Commissioners faced the resignation of Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson along with a full agenda of other problems.

Chief Johnson, who has served as head of the Eastland Fire Department for five years, resigned to accept the position as chief at Dumas. He gave commissioners two weeks notice. The resignation was accepted "with regrets," and Johnson was praised for his work as chief here.

To get the business meeting underway, city councilmen elected officers for the coming year. Cyrus Frost was re-elected mayor, Tom Wilson is assistant chairman, Jack Germany is treasurer and Bob Perkins is assistant treasurer.

City Manager Jimmy Young reported that response to this year's clean-up campaign was good this year. He said a "tremendous amount" of trash was hauled off by city workmen.

Young estimated that 50 percent of the trash consisted of brush, leaves, etc. He praised residents of the Negro section of Eastland for an "exceptional job."

Young also reported that Texas Electric Service Co. has started installation of a number of new street lights in the city. And he reported some 40 to 50 stray dogs have been destroyed since the stray dog drive began.

Commissioners inspected City Hall and found it to be in bad condition. Young reported new cracks in the walls, and commissioners noted sagging walls, loose marble and large cracks in the floors.

Commissioners voted to set up parallel parking on Plummer Street from Lamar to Seaman at the request of officials of the First Baptist Church. The street was termed too narrow.

A plumbing ordinance was studied, but no action was taken. It is to be considered again at the next commission meeting.

Ending the three hour meeting, commissioners voted to accept the low bid of Pipkin Olds-Cadillac for a new Rambler to be used as a police car.

## Penny-A-Day Is Estimated Cost

Lone Star Gas Co. Tuesday night asked Eastland City Commissioners to grant the company a rate increase for both residential and commercial users in the city.

The move, which has been expected since the Railroad Commission of Texas issued an order revising the city gate charge to be paid to the Transmission Division of Lone Star by the Distribution Division, would increase the amount paid by the average residential customer by "slightly more" than one cent per day, according to Gordon Goldston, district manager.

Lone Star is asking rate hikes in all Texas cities which they serve.

Eastland commissioners heard the proposed ordinance on first reading. They will vote on the rate increase at their next scheduled meeting, May 16, Mayor Cyrus Frost stated.

Goldston told commissioners that competition for Texas gas by out-of-state users has increased the cost of purchasing gas in the fields.

"Within recent years numerous large gas pipe lines have been constructed from the gas producing areas of Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma to virtually every section of the United States, and these new lines have vigorously competed for all available supplies of gas," Goldston declared.

"Progressively higher wellhead prices have been offered by these new buyers, and Lone Star has, of necessity, had to meet these higher competitive prices for both existing gas supplies and for the new reserves required to protect the present and future requirements of our customers."

Minimum monthly bill would remain \$1 if the new ordinance is approved. The first 600 cubic feet of gas would cost \$1.760 per CCF gross and \$1.584 per CCF net. All over 600 cu. feet would cost \$8.433 per CCF gross and \$7.990 per CCF net.

## Perkins Makes Friends Easily In Switzerland

(Editor's Note: The following article was written April 11 in Geneva, Switzerland.)

A cablegram from Eastland friends and many letters awaited me here today and made me very happy. Several commented on the articles in the paper and I hope you who read my travel experiences know how much I appreciate your thanks. I think I should be the one to say the thanks to the Eastland Telegram and its editor for the generous space.

In Paris the wonderful city, I enjoyed my stay and the highlight was the Louvre. The "Marriage Feast at Cana" appealed to me especially. It was about 16 feet by 24 feet in size and nearly covered one end of the room. The details in it were wonderful. I can say that scene was one of great splendor, in an outdoors court, with a mosaic tile floor, stately stone columns and balconies, and great activity around the large feast table. I counted 36 guests, 22 entertainers and waiters, 42 spectators on balconies, or in the way of the servant waiters, five dogs, one of which was standing on the feast table, three doves, a parrot or hawk, I couldn't tell which, two violins, a cello with six strings, many dishes, much cutlery, with the food—also rich looking red wine, being poured from jugs. Two heads were slightly illuminated with radiant gold backgrounds. Guests were portrayed as if they were Asian and European nobility and were very richly apparelled. Such radiant joy in the picture made me happy too. Artists use backgrounds of the country where they live, not the exact scene where the event takes place, historically.

Yesterday I took a fast train from Paris to Geneva and came through Southeastern France with its fine looking green fields and country houses. No billboards along the highway and everything looked very neat. Railroad stations were decorated with shrubs, flower gardens and roses.

This forenoon I called on the Swiss from whom I had purchased from Eastland my Turkish railroad conductor's watch. I found him to be a very high class gentleman who owns a part interest in a small watch factory and operates his own watch sales business here in Geneva. He hopes to expand his business and sell to people in the U. S. I have given him some ideas and tried to be helpful in rewriting some of his advertising circulars. He has a reproduction of one of the earliest European clocks in use during the 14th century.

It is a wall clock and would make a desirable and interesting addition to an office or a home. He plans to make these reproductions in quantity for sale in Europe and the U. S. He insisted that I go home with him for lunch. He lives just across the French border and I noticed that the immigration officers all knew him and as we drove by they did not ask to see my passport. He has a nice young wife and three little

## Bob Wagstaff for Congress

### OLD AGE PENSIONS

With all their wild spending, our Career Congressmen have overlooked a place where a moderate amount of spending would do a great deal of good.

A person on Old Age Assistance in Texas, draws an average of \$52.99 per month, with a maximum of \$67.00 per month. These amounts are inadequate.

Old age assistance in Texas can and should be raised to \$100.00 maximum and \$75.00 average. This can be done without unbalancing the budget. By changing the Federal Government's participation from 70% to 75% and increasing the appropriation by \$300,000,000.00 (an amount equal to only 1.266ths of the annual budget), the amounts can be raised, matched by state funds, to \$75.00 per month average and \$100.00 per month maximum.

The reason why this additional payment can be made at such low expense to the government is three fold. First; the old age pension rolls are going down rapidly, there being now only 2,300,000 on the rolls as against the peak of 2,700,000 in 1952. Most of the older people who now reach retirement age now go on Social Security. The cost to the government becomes less and less as the number on the rolls is reduced each year. Second; a number of other states are unable or unwilling to match the federal grant, which leaves more money available for states which do. And, Third; Texas at the last election voted an additional \$7,000,000.00 per year and when the legislature makes this additional appropriation, Texas can meet the additional federal grant.

### SOCIAL SECURITY

Social Security is entirely different from Old Age Assistance. It is not a government grant, but is an insurance system, the premiums for which are paid by the employer and employee. To be sound, and to effect its purpose, the Social Security System must be based upon sound insurance principles. Congress should quit playing politics with the Social Security Law.

The so-called "liberalizing" amendments of the Social Security law are just another tax. Already the rates are going up more rapidly than planned, and the wage base has been greatly increased. The Social Security tax will soon be a 9% gross income tax with no deductions. Only by adhering to rigid insurance principles in the administration of this Act can the insured be certain of receiving his full benefits when the time comes to retire.

"Liberalizing" amendments, such as the Forand Bill, are an additional burden on the one who pays for Social Security. Medical help for the aged should be based upon State and Federal help in connection with a voluntary plan for private insurance. It should not be tied on to Social Security as another tax.

Congress is playing politics with Social Security. The funds, as they come into the treasury, are immediately spent. Instead of investing the funds in government bonds, purchased in the open market, the government issues new bonds and places them in the trust fund, thus adding to the amount of the national debt. The trust fund contains nothing more than the promises of the government that, in the future, it will levy additional taxes to pay the benefits. This system of administering the Social Security fund, if indulged in by a private insurance company, would result in all the officers of the insurance company going to the penitentiary. Here is what a great newspaper, the Houston Chronicle, (the second largest newspaper in Texas), says Congress is doing to the trust fund: "Over the two decades or more since social security became the law of the land, the treasury has collected uncounted billions in social security taxes. In theory, these taxes go into a fund to meet obligations which become due when claimants file application for the benefit payments guaranteed by social security. But there exists no such fund. The social security moneys do not exist. Taxes collected in the name of social security go into the general fund of the treasury and are spent to meet current liabilities... The man approaching retirement age and looking forward to receipt of social security payments may believe he is collecting from funds he helped to set up over the years. He is not. A prodigal government has thrown that money away a long time ago and will add to the tax burden of that man's son to pay his social security claims."

The Houston Chronicle further says editorially: "When social security was conceived and put into effect, the payments made by employees and employers were placed in a special fund. This fund began to grow to huge proportions. It was mighty tempting to the spendthrifts in Washington. They shifted the fund to the general treasury. Then the spenders began using the social security money in the spending orgy that the nation has been suffering from for 25 years. "Fiscal experts have been viewing the expenditure of social security funds, which are replaced with I.O.U.'s, with considerable alarm. Many of them have prophesied the social security program either will collapse or have to be financed by general tax revenues by 1975."

People who are expecting to benefit from social security payments after they retire had better investigate and find out what these Career Congressmen are doing with their social security payments. To make social security sound actuarially, the law must be changed—

(a) To require the fund to be invested in U. S. Government bonds already issued, purchased in the open market; or, (b) Put the fund on a "pay-as-you-go basis", limiting the tax to the amount actually needed each year; and, (c) Quit "liberalizing" the program every election year.

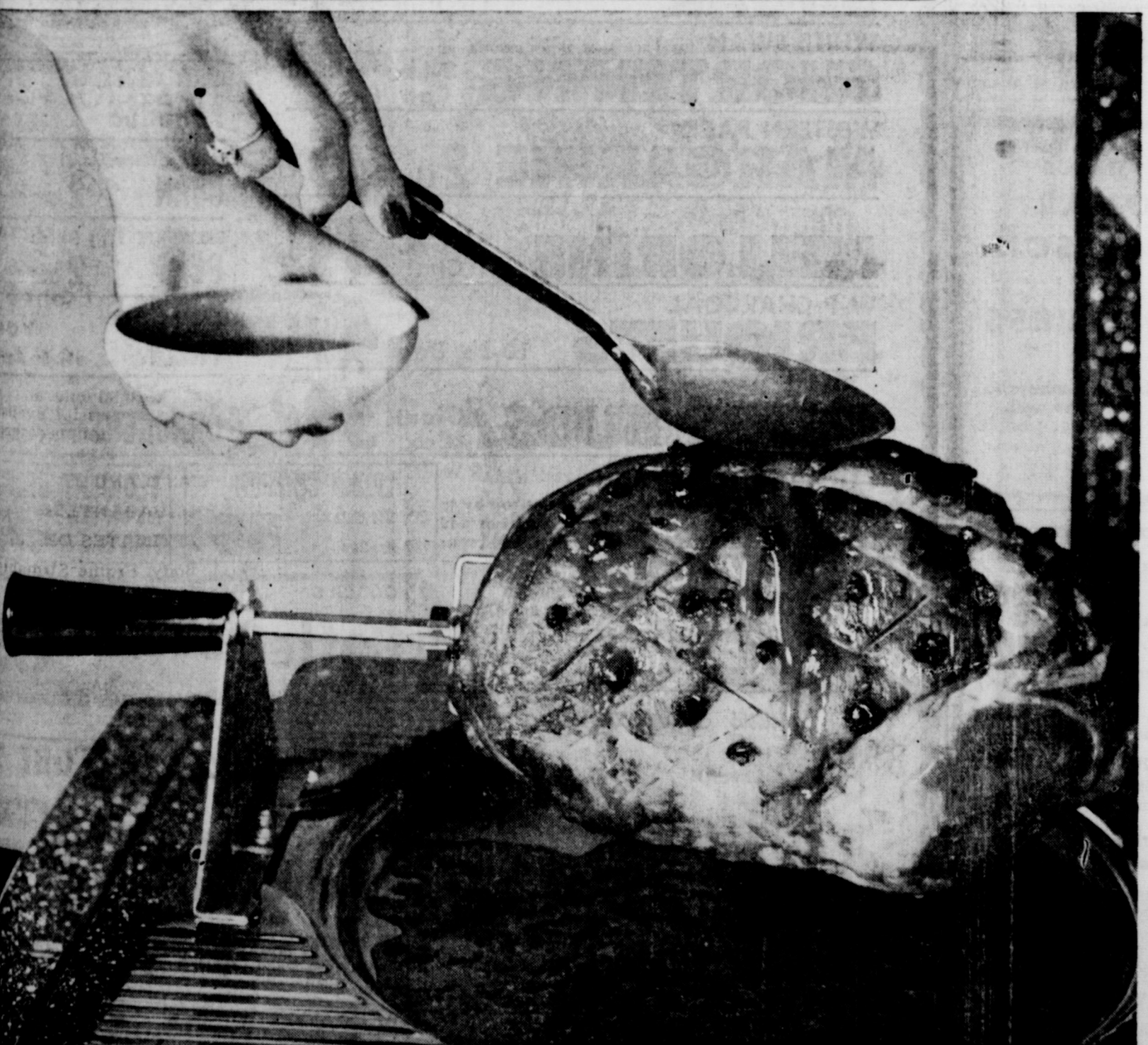
