In 135 A.D. the Roman Emper-
or built a temple to obliterate the
site where Jesus was crucified on
Mt. Calvary. Now the Church of
the Holy Sepulchre stands on this
site. The Church of Condemnation
and the Holy Sepulchre are both
beautiful Catholic Churches. The
Greek Orthodox also holds their
services there. There are two sepa-
rate tombs believed to be the
burial place of Christ. The Catholic
Church believes it is inside the
Holy Sepulchre. The Protestants
believe it is in the Garden Tomb,
which was discovered by General
Gordon.

Inside the Holy Sepulchre there
is a statue of the Virgin Mary. It
cost \$5,000,000 to build. It con-
tains the actual diamonds, rubies,
amethysts, pearls and emeralds
given to her by the people of Jeru-
salem. They were very pretty.

We drove to Bethlehem. On the
way we saw the shepherds field,
where the shepherds saw the star
pointing to Bethlehem when Jesus
was born. We visited the Church
of the Nativity in Bethlehem and
saw the place where Jesus was
born in the manger, which is un-
derneath the Church. I had my pic-
ture taken standing by the spot
where Christ was born. The original
stable was destroyed in 527 by
the Samaritans. The Church of the
Nativity is also a Catholic and a
Greek Orthodox Church.

We saw the cave of St. Jerome
where he translated the Bible. He
came from Rome and translated
the Bible from Hebrew to Greek
and then into Latin. St. Jerome
died in Bethlehem.

We visited the Cave of the
Babies in St. Catherines Church,
where the skulls of babies were
found who had been killed on or-
ders of Herod trying to find
Christ.

We visited the Church of St.
Anne which is located over the site
of the home of St. Anne and St.
Joachim, the parents of the Virgin
Mary. The Church of St. Anne
was built near the Pool of Beth-
esda in the 4th Century. Mary was
born in this place. Mary's parents
lived in a cave and part of the ori-
ginal rock is still in existence in

the Church of St. Anne.
Solomon built his Temple in
1,000 B.C. In 20 B.C. Herod re-
built Solomon's Temple. It was de-
stroyed again in 70 A.D. by Titus.
It has a vast courtyard today. It
was in this temple where Jesus was
found after having been lost for
three days.

We visited Jericho, a distance
of 27 miles along winding moun-
tainous roads. Our first stop was in
Bethany, at the site of the home
of Mary and Martha. Bethany is
2 miles from Jerusalem. We vis-
ited Lazarus' Tomb where Jesus
raised him from the dead. In Beth-
any we saw the site of the home of
Simon the leper who invited Jesus
to dinner. On the way to Jericho
we stopped at the Good Samaritan
Inn which has a well out back that
is 2,000 years old.

We drove over roads that were
2,000 feet above sea level. When
we got to the Dead Sea we were
1,300 feet below sea level. It is
the lowest place on earth. Jericho
is a very beautiful city with large
orchards. It has a population of
130,000.

We also visited the river Jeru-
salem, where Jesus was baptized.
Some of us bought bottles of wa-
ter taken from the Jordan. From
Jericho we saw the Mount of Tem-
ptation where Jesus was tempted
three times by the Devil. We saw
Mt. Nebo from the Dead Sea
where God buried Moses.

There were several places we
could not see because they were
in the Jewish Sector.

There is a lot more to say but
I will have to wait till I come home.
The food we had was different
from anything else I have ever
eaten.

While I was in Jerusalem I went
to Catholic Mass in the Church of
the Holy Sepulchre, about 15 feet
from Jesus Tomb. I bought some
rosaries and Bibles and had them
blessed at the Church of the
Holy Sepulchre. The rosaries are
made of olive wood taken from the
Mt. of Olives.

I took about 90 color slides
while I was in Jerusalem and they
turned out real nice considering it
rained every day we were there.
I will be more than glad to show
them to anyone in Cisco or East-
land who wants to see them.
I am going to close for now.

There is a lot more to tell but I
guess it will wait until I return.
Jerusalem is a wonderful and
beautiful place. The people are
sure nice. You can feel the Hol-
iness in the air. It was a wonder-
ful feeling to visit the place where
Jesus once lived.

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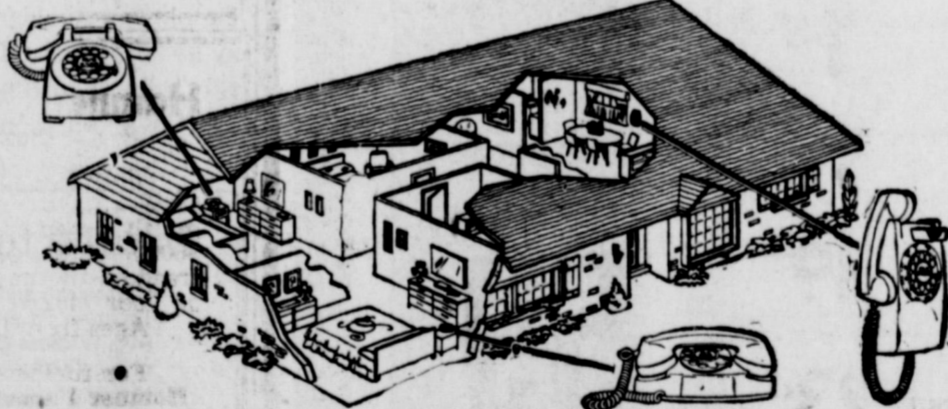

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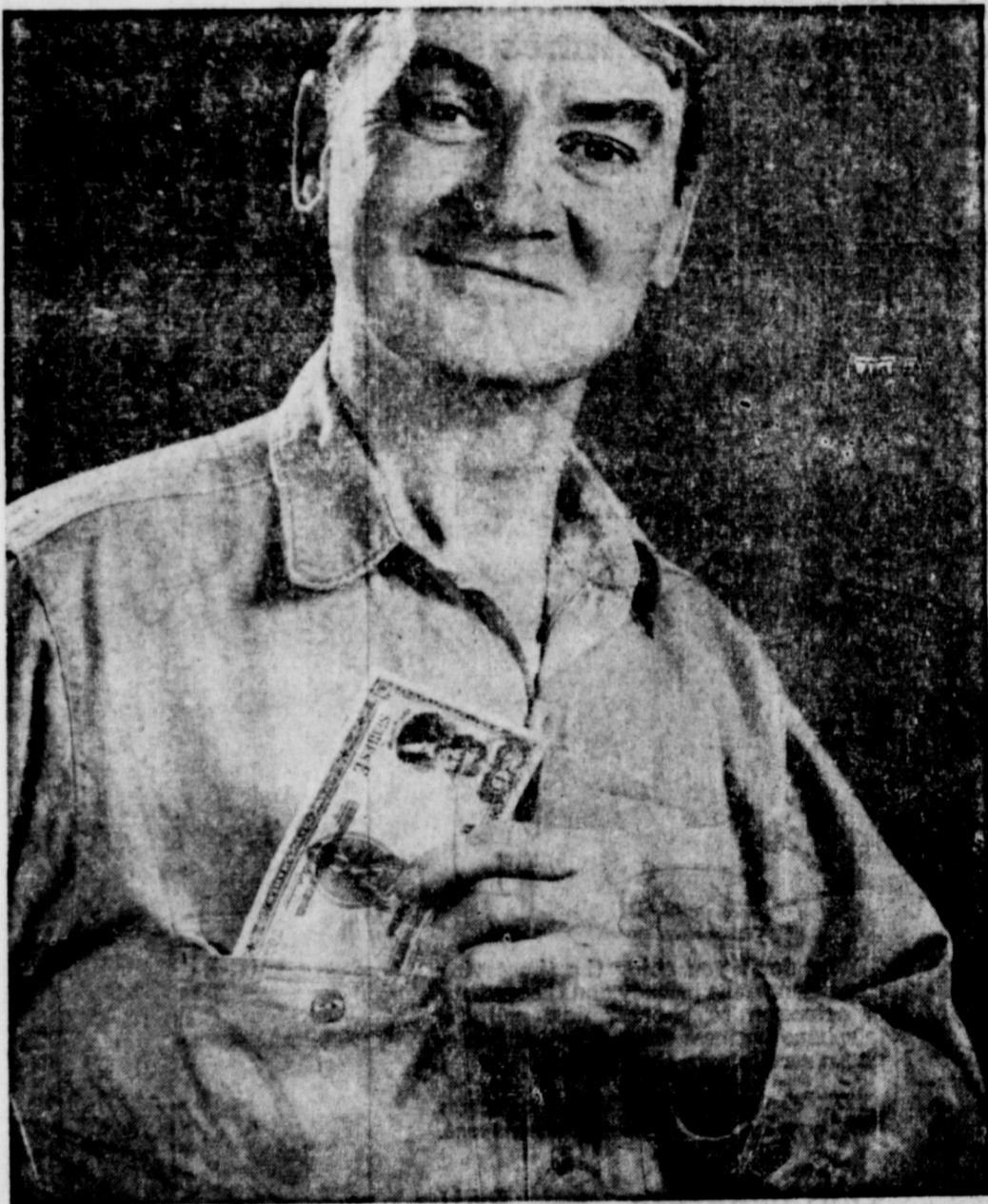

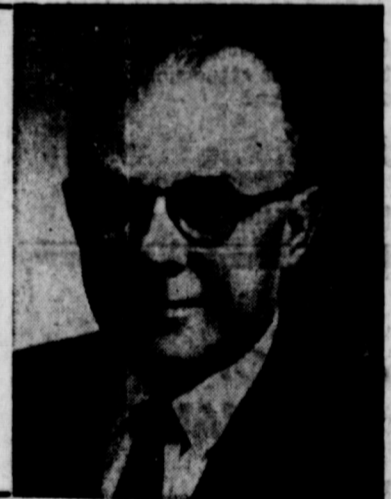
