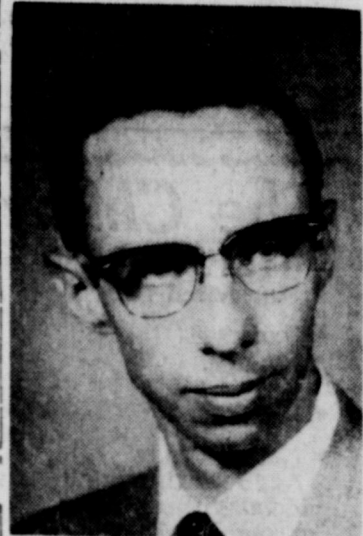

Wright Carries Eastland County

The interesting political question in Eastland County today is where will the 1,312 votes go which Jim Wright garnered in this county when the run-off senate election between Bill Blakley and John Tower is held.

Wright carried Eastland County by a sizable margin, although not a majority, in Tuesday's special senate election. Tower was second with 725 votes and Blakley a close third with 718.

Statewide Tower led with 324,465 votes. Blakley earned a run-off spot by getting 188,809 votes and Wright just barely missed the opportunity when a 168,826 vote finish.

There were 71 names on the crowded ballot to begin with, but on both the state and county level

Woman's View Given of Islands by Mrs. Perkins

On 9 a.m. we disembarked into a paradise and into a chartered bus for four and one half hours of enchantment. Mountains come down to the sea and rain is imminent for clouds are terrific in size and yet the showers are brief and not noticed. There are no windows on the bus at all. Raincoats were along and we were grateful. The sun and a very wide rainbow came suddenly as we climbed through palms and banana trees into forest vegetation and past the tiny native villages. Houses in the village were thatched roofs with bamboo spaced widely for sides.

Cattle were on lush green fields but were very thin. Geologist Joseph says there is mineral deficiency in the soil for feed.

We then saw a tiny chapel with peaked roofs of thatch and rows of benches with Sunday School in progress and little white clad youngsters jam-packed into its interior. The open walls were looking westward for breezes.

Older Fijians with umbrellas were crowding along the roads to church, each with a Bible which showed much wear and use.

We came down steep roads to Rewa River where we found about 20 Fijian girls in white with Bibles waiting for long canoes to transport them to church down river. The tourist with a Polaroid camera delayed their departure with his miracle making pictures, one after another. The girls all but upset the canoe coming back on the inadequate wharf to see themselves in pictures. I was surprised that some of the Australian tourists had never seen a Polaroid in operation.

In Suva the capital city nets 40,000 inhabitants. I saw the Epworth House, and the Methodist Book House adjoined by very creditable buildings.

Since 1880 Hindu Indian migrants to Fiji and their descendants have increased to 184,000 in the Islands making a total population of all islands 375,000. There are 9,000 Europeans, 10,000 Islanders from outside Fiji and 4,500 Chinese. Many of the latter are traders. About one third of the Europeans are Fiji-born. One thousand are New Zealanders, 1,000 Australians and 500 or so born in the United Kingdom.

The area of the hundreds of Fiji islands is 7,022 square miles spread over 100,000 square miles of South Pacific. The largest island, Viti Levu, has an area of 4,000 square miles. Some islands are only rocks, great reefs of coral are growing. The Great Sea Reef extends from the southwest corner of Viti Levu to the north-east tip of Vanuva Levu and encloses 3,000 square miles of continuous reef grounds.

The fourth annual budding school has been set for April 17 at the Cisco Junior College, it was reported by Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper who will instruct those attending the one day affair.

"We are happy again to have the peacan budding school here and are more than glad to cooperate," said A. Z. Myrick, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, who is sponsoring the school along with the Agricultural Extension Service.

The school has been moved from the Chamber of Commerce offices to the college where we will have more room for those attending", Myrick concluded.

The school will begin on the above date at 9:30 o'clock in a room at the college. Where, when and how to bud, types of bud-

wood, forcing the buds and other demonstrations and talks will be given by Cooper at the morning session. The afternoon part of the program will be on the Kent Ward farm three miles south of Cisco in the Leon River bottom where the group will get a chance to practice budding.

A limited amount of cold storage budwood will be available to those desiring it. Varieties of peacan budwood now on cold storage include the two new varieties, Comanche and Choctaw and the Western Schley.

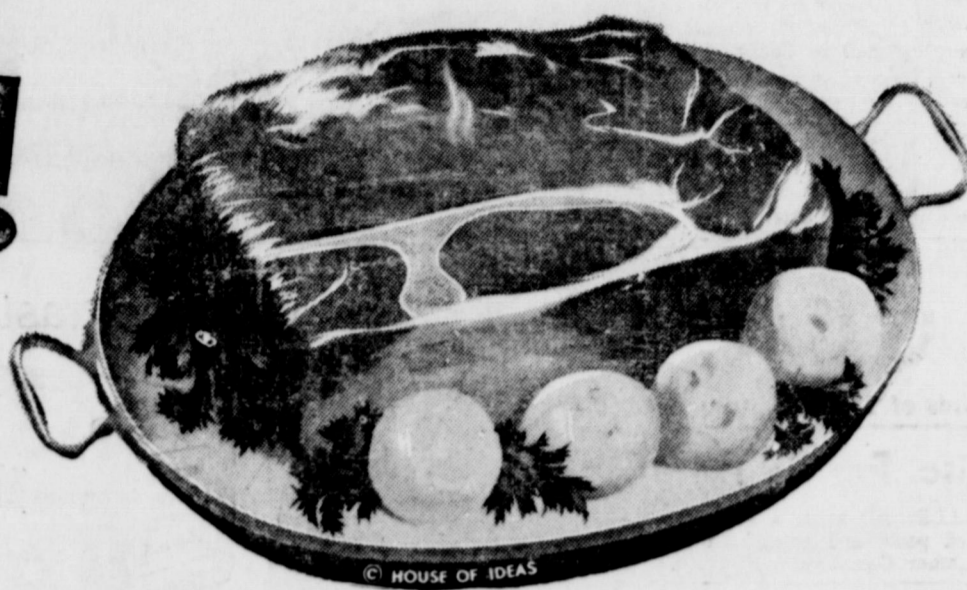

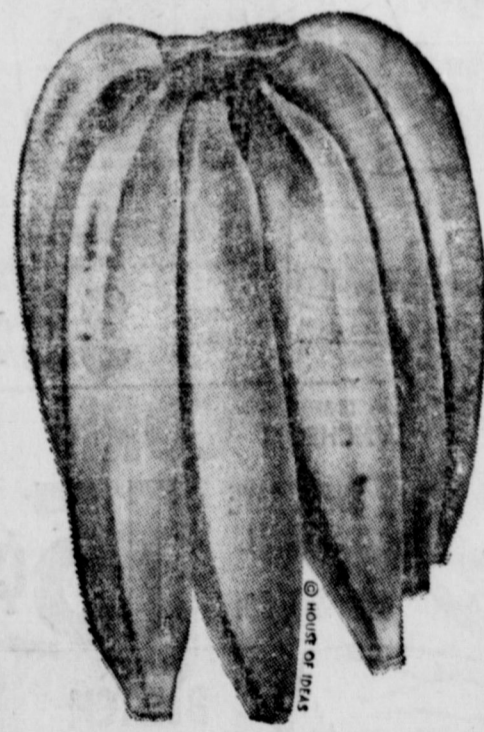

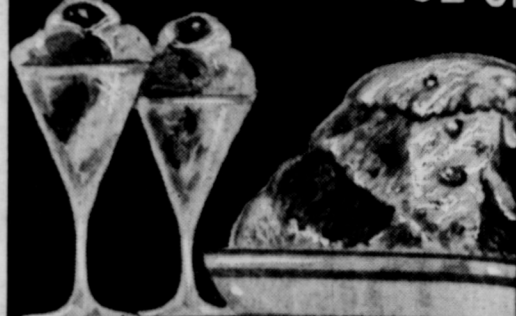

Touza to Timor chartering 39 Fijian islands in 1789.
The climax was the Quay side where we sailed at 5 p.m. and on a Sunday I can picture the very gayest saris, the children, the few Europeans in Bermuda shorts, white shirts, Fiji music playing from over the bridge sending ecstasies of joy to accompanying singing from shore.
Estimates place the crowd at 10,000 and I believe it. That sea of black headed people with some white turbaned older Hindu men, those upturned faces and smiles, no one looking shabby or hungry, was a happy contrast to ill fed Hong Kong refugees and other groups I have seen. We rode out into a sunset passing descriptions convinced God was in His heaven.
