Scholarship In Journalism Is Offered by WTP

Joe Pickle, Big Spring, chairman of the scholarship committee, has sent notices to the principals of high schools in the WTPA territory asking that they inform seniors of the chance for a journalism scholarship in any of ten West Texas colleges.

TOTAL OF 3,045 ACRES

Area Growers Turn In Peanut Acreage

According to Emmitt Powell, Eastland County ASC office manager, some 3,045 peanut acres have been voluntarily released to the county ASC Committee for re-apportionment in 1960 to other farmers in Eastland County who have asked for acreage in addition to their normal allotments. Powell credits the cooperative effort of D. B. Warren, local director of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association who was instrumental in calling a series of meetings of growers throughout the county to discuss this problem. It was pointed out to growers that some 7,000 to 8,000 acres were not planted in the county last year. A large portion of this total would have been planted provided growers who failed to plant had released their acreage to the County Committee for subsequent temporary re-apportionment. Last month grower meetings were held in Gorman, Rising Star and Nimrod. Warren stated that the Nimrod meeting was sponsored cooperatively with the Eastland County Farm Bureau. Glen Justice, Farm Bureau president, presided at the meeting. Following the meeting a series of letters were sent by Powell's office to all peanut growers in the county requesting that growers release acres they did not intend to plant. It is estimated that as a result of this campaign a net total of 2,500 acres will be planted to peanuts which otherwise would not have been planted. This would mean a gain financially to the county of approximately \$500,000.

### Get Ready for Those Baby Chicks

Before those baby chicks come the successful poultryman has several things to do. The performance of these chicks, when mature as broilers or layers, will depend on the care they receive during brooding.

The most important thing is to have the brooder house prepared, says Ed Kosarek, poultry supervisor, Texas A & M Poultry Science Department. Several steps should be followed carefully. Kosarek explains them as follows:

Clean out all old litter and disinfect the house and equipment before putting down new litter. This is a good way to stop disease outbreaks before they occur.

Turn on the brooders a day or so in advance of the chicks' arrival to check for needed repairs and then adjust the hover temperature to 95 degrees. Thereafter cut the heat down 5 degrees each week until it reaches 70 degrees or until heat is no longer required. Also, set chick guards up about 3 feet from the brooder edge so chicks can spread out.

After the chicks come use paper plates or filler flats to provide one and one-half inches of feeding space per chick for the first

few days. A high quality mash is recommended for debeaked chicks for the first few days. It is easy to eat and should be plentiful.

Provide plenty of fresh, clean water, Kosarek emphasizes. In winter, warm water should be used. Two one-gallon waterers per 100 chicks is sufficient.

Keep the chicks warm but be sure there is enough fresh air in the house, Kosarek points out. And last but not least, a good disease preventative measure is to keep chicks at least 300 feet away from older birds.

If more information is desired, see your local county agent.
