Hughes Issues Statement

There is no justification for waste in any government function, but particularly in the field of education we should make sure that for every dollar spent some youth will receive a dollar's worth of benefit.

My entire campaign is based on the belief that the Office of County Supt. can be valuable to education in Eastland County. In my opinion, the office can offer the following services to public school education:

1. Be active in the field of state legislation that will effect education in this county, and keep the people informed as to the results that can be expected from such legislation.
2. Act as a source of information for school officials by being interested in school administration.
3. Plan county wide meetings for school administrators so that they may come together and discuss education.
4. Provide a training program for school personnel who need training in the various operations.
5. Organize and administer a county wide summer school program if the need exists.
6. Act as an employment agency for those students who need summer employment.
7. Hire an assistant who is familiar with Bulletin 679 Bookkeeping so that help can be offered to schools if needed.
8. Collect and prepare courses of study in the various fields so that they will be available to school personnel.
9. Provide aid to a school when an emergency exists.
10. Help the schools to organize and conduct Interscholastic League contests.
11. Act as a coordinator in the field of adult education.
12. Aid the schools in securing health services.
13. Provide personnel to have an adequate standardized testing program.
14. Offer assistance to the County tax office in preparing the necessary forms for the local fund assignment.

If the schools do not desire to use enough of the above services to keep the County Superintendent busy eight hours a day, then I believe that he should serve as the third supervisor, performing any function that he is assigned within the schools.

Pinewood 30 Monday

You've heard of the Indy 500, the Riverside 300, and the Daytona 500, but perhaps you're not familiar with the Eastland Pinewood 30.

If not, you are obviously not the parent of an Eastland Cub or Webelo Scout because the "Pinewood" has been the number one topic of conversation among these future designers, mechanics, and race car drivers for several weeks. Race day is Monday, March 25. Tension and excitement increase steadily as the big day approaches. The high speed machines are being readied in garages all over town. This reporter has learned that some radical new race car designs will take the track for the first time at the Pinewood.

For the benefit of those few who may not be familiar with the Pinewood Derby vehicles, the rules specify that they be no longer than 7 3/4 inches, a maximum of 2 3/4 inches wide and weight no more than 5 ounces. These monsters race down an inclined track slightly more than thirty feet long. Hence the name Pinewood "30." Prime contractor on the construction of the track is Mr. Dick Johnson who, we understand, subcontracted some of the work to Mr. Ralph Collins.

Judges will be Mr. Bob (infallible) Potter and Mr. Johnnie (Eagle eye) Morren. Mrs. Sandy Alsop has obtained some mighty nice trophies and ribbons for the winners. Brownwood Contractor Low Bid For Plant

A bid of \$293,940 by a Brownwood contractor was apparent low for Eastland's new sewer plant, and contract will be let contingent on receiving additional grant money.

Last of ten bids opened at a Friday afternoon opening at City Hall, the Environmental Resources Controls, Inc., the Brownwood firm was lowest read - but still above the city's financing due to inflationary trends upwards.

Engineer Billy Jacobs of the city's engineering firm said that this is normal and the Environmental Protective Agency is sympathetic to the increases and generally increases grants to cover the hiked costs.

The Brownwood firm is highly regarded in this area, and is in the process of finishing a similar plant at Coleman right now. The same firm principals were involved in paving work in Eastland a few years ago in the Valley View Addition.

John Brocksch is president of the firm. Construction is expected to begin in approximately three weeks, according to Brocksch.

The firm's contract with the city calls for construction to be completed in 300 calendar days. The new plant will replace a 55 year old facility build during the oil boom years. When completed, it will handle 400,000 gallons of waste daily as compared to about half that amount being handled by the present plant.

Voters approved a bond issue in September, 1971, for \$92,000 which was the city's share of an expected outlay of \$198,700 with the federal government providing the balance in the form of a grant of \$106,000. Friday's low bid exceeded the proposed total cost by \$95,240. Jacobs, representing Yeatts & Decker, said this was to have been expected with the increase in construction costs since the original estimate was made nearly three years ago, and consequently would present no problems in financing.

Bids ranged from a high of \$480,089 to the low Brownwood firm bid. The city took alternate deduction bids on a riding law mower and - or loader, and all the companies' bids include these figures, which could be removed if the city elects not to secure these items.

Little Damage Done To Fruit And Vegetables

Fruits and vegetables received little or no damage from the cold temperatures in Eastland County last week according to De Gordon, County Extension Agent. The temperature dropped below freezing Wednesday night, but frost did not occur.

Most home gardeners covered their young tender plants that were likely to freeze such as tomatoes and pepper. However, several reported that they did not cover their plants and had no freeze damage.

Owners of fruit orchards and back yard fruit trees were most

concerned about the freeze. There was no freeze damage reported. Normally it will take four or five hours of temperatures below 29 degrees to kill the fruit Gordon says.

Temperatures in the mid - twenties were forecast for Thursday night, but the mercury dropped only to 37 degrees. No freeze damage was found on Friday morning.

The agent warns that the danger of a freeze is not gone. Remember last year - the temperature was below freezing on April 8, 9, and 10th. It got down to 26 degrees on April 10th.

When plants are covered with plastic, be sure to remove the plastic cover when the sun comes up, or make a hole in the side of the plastic cover.

One more county livestock show has come and gone. It takes a lot of people and a lot of support to have a stock show. And thanks to the people of Eastland County, we have those good workers and those good supporters.

I believe we had the largest number of ads in the stock show catalogue that we have ever had. Many of the merchants also purchased animals at the stock show sale. We hope you will read the list of buyers and thank them for their support of the youth in Eastland County.

I cannot say enough for the men who are directors and of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. They are the ones who hear all the complaints. Many of them take leave from their jobs or leave their farm work to help conduct the show. This work includes much more than three days of the show too. They worked many evenings repairing buildings, cleaning the show grounds, selling ads, talking with prospective buyers, assembling catalogues, ordering supplies, mailing bills, contacting judges and setting up classes. Many others work behind the scenes too, like the Chamber of Commerce in each town who are responsible for collecting money for the sale animals.

We also appreciate Lloyd Coan for furnishing the sale facilities and James Wright who was our auctioneer. So a big thank you to all who gave support, who worked and who exhibited in a manner that makes us all proud.

We have word that the imported fire ant is moving closer to Eastland County each year. If this ant ever invades Eastland County we want to know about it so everything possible can be done to prevent its spread.

The imported fire ant is a serious pest of animals, crops and people. Although it resembles the two native species of fire ants, the imported fire ant is a vicious, aggressive pest.

It was brought to this country over 30 years ago from South America through the port at Mobile, Alabama. It has since spread over the south and into the eastern half of Texas.

The native species closely resemble the imported fire ant; however, their mounds are small compared to those built by the imported species.

Dr. Akey Chang - Fu Hung is presently working on the distribution of native and imported fire ants in Texas at Texas A&M University. If you find ants that you suspect being imported fire ants please get several and bring to the County Extension Office. We will send them to this person who is a specialist in ant identification.

Feeding garden vegetables is important, and the quickest and most efficient way is by adding a commercial fertilizer to the soil. But before using fertilizer, be sure you are familiar with the material you plan to apply.

Commercial fertilizers are labeled to show the percentage of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium in that order. Common fertilizer labels are 5 - 10 - 10, 12 - 12 - 12, and 12 - 24 - 12.

It's always best to have the soil tested before applying fertilizer. But, in lieu of a soil test recommendation apply two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 12 - 12 - 12 per 100 square feet of area. Then mix it thoroughly with the soil before planting.

HD NEWS

With the cost of clothing continually rising, it is necessary to take care of the clothes we have to reduce the need for replacement.

One of the biggest problems in clothing care is the removal of stubborn spots and stains. A new extension publication is available at no charge on stain removal and common stains. Because of the folder-type design, the chart can be conveniently mounted near the laundry area as a ready reference.

The chart gives basic principles for removing stains and identification of unknown stains. It gives suggestions for using stain removers, including bleaches, detergents, and solvents.

By 1975, food processors must put nutrition information on labels of all food products with added nutrients -- and products making a nutrition claim. With nutrition labeling, consumers will be able to compare nutritional value of various brands -- to get more nutrition for the family food dollar. In addition, it will simplify counting calories and selecting foods for special diets. Nutrition labels will list and give amounts of calories, proteins, carbohydrates, fats, vitamin A, vitamin C, thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, calcium and iron -- besides the usual name, net weight and ingredients.

Optional listing may include cholesterol, fat and sodium. Since nutrition information is on a per-serving basis, labels must give serving size -- such as one cup or two ounces -- and number of servings the package contains.

Congressman Omar Burleson Announces For Re-election

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 4, 1974, and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 33 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 466,500 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense", gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world", he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions", he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the

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Comments From Austin

Rep. Joe Hanna Technical - Vocational Education is coming of age and assuming its rightful place - a place of dignity and equality - both in the public school system and the "higher education" system. As Chairman of the Technical - Vocational Committee, I have been privileged to be in a position to see what is taking place in this regard in Texas. Texas ranks fourth in the 50 states in total enrollment in

vocational education, third in program completions, third in receipt of federal funds and sixth in total expenditures for vocational education.

The total amount of funds spent in Texas in 1973, from both state and federal sources was 194 million dollars. This is spent in many different areas such as rehabilitation for veterans, youth corps, Job Corps, adult programs as well as disadvantaged and handicapped and in high schools, junior colleges, and Texas State Technical Institution.

One of the main problems that has to be overcome is the idea that to be educated one has to have a college degree. Industry has been partly at fault in demanding that all applicants for a job have a college degree. Headway is being made in this direction. In this area, the day is gone when one could take baling wire and

pliers and repair his automobile. Air conditioning and television sets need experts in that line to repair them. Also, the income of these technicians is very lucrative.

The basic need is to spread these vocational programs over the state to make them available to all of the people not just those located in the large cities.

There is a need to have planning and coordination to see that the needs of a local area are met; that we are providing those skills that meet the needs of industry, so that when one has finished a program they will have a job available.

"When you are deaf", she said, "writing letters and getting them is like talking to someone."
