



Maverick Band Wins 2 1's

The Eastland High School Band competed Saturday in Brownwood in UIL Class AA competition. The band took first division in concert playing and also in sight reading.

Eastland Junior High Band will compete in Cisco this weekend. Some 4000 junior high school musicians will converge on the campuses of Cisco Junior College and Cisco High School on Friday and Saturday, March 29 - 30, for the fifteenth annual Cisco Junior Music Festival for school bands, orchestras, and choirs.

Among those in attendance will be the Cisco Jr. High Band, Friday at 8:00 a.m. under direction of Lynn Low; and Cisco Jr. High Choir, Friday at 9:30 a.m. under direction of Mrs. Connie Rattan.

The festival is sponsored by the Public Relations Office of Cisco Junior College. Eris Ritchie, CJC Public Relations Director, is director of the festival, and associate directors are Lynn Low, director of the Cisco High School Band, and Douglas Fry, Director of the CJC Wrangler Band. The Cisco Band Boosters Association will be operating the concessions.

more than 60 junior high bands, orchestras, and choirs will be participants in the two day festival. They will enter concert and sight reading competition - evaluation as groups, and individuals and small groups will enter solo, ensemble, and twirling competition.

The musical organizations will be rated for their performances on a scale of I to V, with I being the highest, or "superior" rating and V being the lowest. Bands, orchestras, or choral groups receiving I ratings will be awarded trophies, with a "Sweepstakes" trophy going to any group earning a I in both concert and sight reading. Individuals and small ensemble groups will receive individual award medallions for I ratings.

All band and orchestra concert playing will be in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium, at Cisco Junior College and all choral concert performances will be at the Cisco High School Auditorium. Concerts are open to the public and there is no charge for admission, but sight reading and solo and ensemble events are not open to the public.

WHY PUBLISHERS turn grey and bark at their children: Dear Sir:

During the latter part of September last year I indicated to you that it was our intention to raise the price of our 32 lb. newsprint to \$190.00 as from 1st January 1974.

Because of the base from which we had to calculate our submission to the Cost of Living Council, we were unable to increase the price of our U.S. produced newsprint to that level on January 1, 1974, despite the cost increases we had incurred as a result of the energy crisis, etc.

We had previously suggested that you should budget for a price of at least \$200.00 on July 1st this year. In view of the fact that we were held back from increasing our price for almost two and a half months, we are compelled to bring our proposed increase to at least \$200.00, forward by two months.

We intend, therefore, to increase our price for domestic newsprint to \$200.00 (on a 32 lb. basis) with effect from 1st May which will bring our Canadian and U.S. prices into parity. Inasmuch as we are producing solely 30 lb. newsprint, this will mean a new price of \$213.25 per ton.

I would like to be able to give you some indication of price levels after 1st August, but find myself completely unable to do so in view of the continuing material shortages and consequent cost increases facing our mills.

I can only assure you that we will try to hold to our newly announced price level of \$213.25 as long as we possibly can.

EASTLAND MEMO

After reading an article relative to the Inca Dove, it appears that this diminutive dove is somewhat rare in North Texas. This prompts us to call attention to the fact that there are some Incas in the Eastland area, specifically noted around the Crestview Addition area. This Inca Dove is smaller than the classic Mourning Dove, by three or four inches and has a mottled, or scaled design on its back.

The underside of the wing shows "pinkish" when in flight, and also there is a slash of white on each side of the tip of the tail, which shows only in flight. The Inca Dove call is two syllables, and is sometimes interpreted as, "No Hope".

We have had as many as 18 Incas and Mourners mixed in our yard at one time. We have water, millet and corn available to the birds, and assume this attracts them. You may wish to try to attract these interesting birds to your yard. Jessie Maye Smith of the Fort Worth Star Telegram deserves credit for some of the data referred here.

Carl Garrett Issues Formal Statement

Dear Eastland County Voters: Due to the urging of friends in many parts of this County, I decided to run for the office of County Judge again.

I am 59 years of age, married, and reside at 813 West Plummer, Eastland. I am a native of Eastland, attended Eastland Public Schools and Hardin Simmons University in Abilene. For two years I was employed by Texas Electric Service Company, Leon Power Plant. I then secured Government employment in Washington, D.C., where I attended National University graduating in 1940 with a Bachelor of Laws Degree. National University later merged with George Washington University, Washington, D.C., and this university conferred the degree of Juris Doctor to me. While earning my degree by attending law school at night, I worked for General Accounting Office and U.S. Treasury Department. After graduation from law school I was appointed as a Special Agent with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, a position I held from 1940 to 1969, working in many states on all USDA programs. I retired after 32 years Government service including Naval service.

Service Record: During World War II I served three years, and 10 months, first as a commanding officer of an Armed Guard Crew on various merchant ships in the Pacific and Alaska. Later I served 18 months as a commanding officer of LSM 40 which participated in 10 D Day landings in the Pacific, and returning as Lt. Sr. Grade USNR.

After Government service I was employed on the staff of Ranger Junior College for one year to develop vocational programs. Whiel on this job I helped institute a vocational program known as "Peanut Production" which is the only one of its kind in the nation and also secured numerous scholarships for this program. I had an active part in making surveys of need and requesting vocational funding recently granted to RJC in the amount of \$110,000 for a new vocational building.

I am a member of the First Christian Church and serve as a Deacon and Treasurer. I have had the honor of teaching the nondenominational Men's Fellowship Bible Class in Eastland for many years. I am President of the Ex - Students Association, Director of Lions Club, member of the Eastland Masonic Lodge 467, Cross Timbers Shrine Club and Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

I know I am qualified by education as a lawyer and by experience in Government to be your next County Judge.

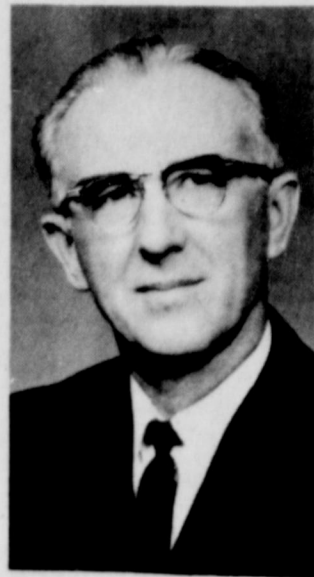

Monday Is Deadline To Register Motor Vehicles

AUSTIN - Monday, April 1st, is the last day for registering Texas motor vehicles, according to R.W. Townsley, Director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department.

Townsley noted that owners of motor vehicles must display 1974 license plates by 12:01 a.m. Tuesday, April 2, to avoid penalty.

"Unfortunately, many owners choose to wait until the last minute when the lines are longer," said Townsley. "When, in fact, county tax offices and substations have been open for registration since February 1."

Townsley encouraged vehicle owners already possessing new plates to put them on. "It's the best advertising we can get in reminding owners that the registration deadline is fast approaching."

For those not yet registered,

nothing is changed in the registration procedure from last year. The renewal form and payment are all the vehicle owner must present at the time of registration.

If the registration form has been misplaced, the owner will be required to bring his certificate of title and last year's license receipt.

Townsley reminded that beginning in 1975, Texas will change over to the five year license plate. "We're already manufacturing the '75 plates. That's how much lead time we have to give ourselves."

In 1976, instead of buying a new license plate, motorists will purchase a 1 x 2 inch adhesive type sticker that will be placed on the upper left corner of the plate," said Townsley. "In 1977, the sticker will be stuck to the upper right corner, then alternated for the following years."

"We have a new approach to program planning, Annette Reznik, State President, of Friona, pointed out. Working with our PROGRAM ACTION IMPACT kit is exciting. IMPACT was developed by youth and introduced to chapters this year by state and area officers. We analyze member concerns and then develop what we call 'in depth' projects that are related to our home economics classroom study. Most people have no idea of what is taught in home economics classes today. They think of home economics as cooking and sewing and of Future Homemakers of America as just another 'fun and games' club.

Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945, as an incorporated, non profit organization supported by membership dues. There are two types of chapters. FHA chapters place major emphasis on consumer education, homemaking and family life education combined with exploration of jobs and careers. HERO chapters, taking the name from home economics related occupations, place major emphasis on preparation for jobs and careers with recognition that workers also fill multiple roles as homemakers and community leaders.

Nationwide in membership and effort, Future Homemakers of America is co - sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education through the Division of Vocational and Technical Education and the American Home Economics Association. National Headquarters are located in Washington, D.C.

High school home economics teachers, members of the state home economics education staff and leading home

economists serve as advisors to chapter, state and national youth officers, giving guidance and counseling to the program.

The annual state meeting of the Texas Association will be April 25 - 26 in the Convention Center, Dallas. More than 5,000 members and advisors are expected to attend.

The theme of the meeting is "Today's Concern - Tomorrow's IMPACT". Programs are planned to provide delegates further information and ideas about implementation of the new IMPACT program of work, which was first introduced last July at the National Meeting of Future Homemakers of America in Dallas.

Keynote speaker for the meeting will be Roger Staubach, Dallas Cowboy quarterback and popular youth speaker. Other highlights include an address by Vonda Van Dyke, former Miss America and popular entertainer, presentation of Honorary Membership to non - members who have contributed their time and effort to the organization and a breakfast honoring members who are to

Peanut Disease Survey In Central Texas

AUSTIN - - Weather, insects and ground diseases continue to plague Central Texas peanut producers according to a recent survey, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reported.

Forty - one peanut farmers in Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Brown and Callahan Counties participated in a survey conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture to determine the amount of acreage affected by diseases and insects in the five - county area.

A total of 7,363 acres was reported, 70 percent of which was infested with diseases. Survey results for 1972 indicated that only 57 percent of the reported acreage had a disease problem that year.

Grower awareness is directly related to the reported increase in incidence of disease. Through the combined efforts of the TDA Peanut Research lab in DeLeon, the Texas A&M E Extension Service and the Texas A&M Experiment Station, farmers are becoming more aware of the disease problem and are capable of recognizing many of the ground and foliage diseases.

The Peanut Research Lab also reported that ground diseases are on the increase, in spite of what research has done to control them.

More land was treated last year for ground diseases than ever treated before. Forty - two percent of the irrigated and 35 percent of the dry land acreage were treated for ground diseases in the five - county area, White said.

Southern blight and pod rot are the most widespread diseases in the Central Texas area. S Seventy - eight percent of the farmers interviewed reported cases of southern blight, and 76 percent reported pod rot. Both increased from one to three percent over 1972 figures.

Sixty - three percent of the surveyed acreage reported insect problems.

The lesser cornstalk borer is the most damaging insect on a peanut crop. The insect is widespread, and 90 percent of the farmers surveyed reported the insect. The cornstalk borer is a problem, especially on dry land.

Spider mites and other foliage feeding insects were also problems in 1973 with 71 percent of the farmers reporting cases of these insects.

The Central Texas area is one of two major peanut producing areas in the state. The other is in South Texas.

Texas is second in the nation

in peanut production, with the Central Texas area producing almost 36 percent of the state's 471 million pounds, White reported.

Comanche County leads the state and the area in peanut production. Southwestern Peanut Growers Association estimated that farmers in Comanche County produced 81.1 million pounds of peanuts last year.

Eastland County is second with 51.7 million pounds.

White stated that with research and continued grower awareness of disease problems, the yields in the Central Texas area could be higher.

"Great strides have been made in controlling insects and diseases, however, much remains to be done. Through the cooperation of peanut farmers and various state and university agencies, peanut diseases and insects can be controlled, White said.

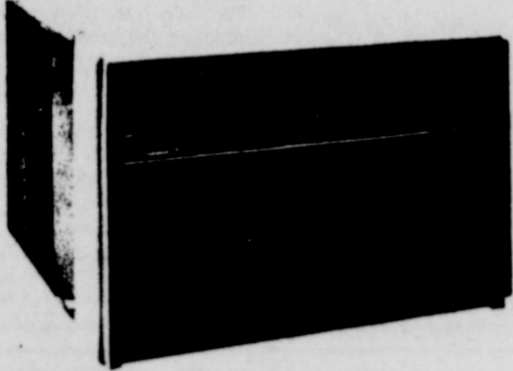

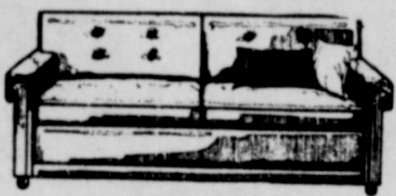

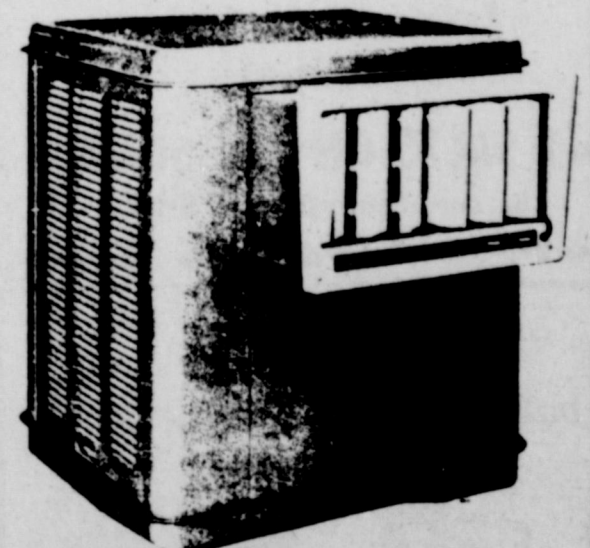

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and shareholders. If such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
