## Farm Bureau Stages County Political Rally

Glenn Justice, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, this week reminded eligible rural voters that they are invited to attend a "Meet the Candidates" meeting Thursday at the Junior High School in Cisco.

The meeting, which will begin at 8 p.m., is sponsored by the Eastland County Farm Bureau for the purpose of giving voters an opportunity to learn more about all candidates before election time. The Farm Bureau does not endorse any candidate for any political office.

All of the local and area candidates for the Texas Legislature have been invited to the meeting to state their positions on various state-level issues of interest to agriculture. This information will be made public after the meeting, the county Farm Bureau leader said.

According to Justice, strict rules will govern the conduct of the meeting. After each candidate has been given from three to five minutes to present his qualifications, the moderator, a field representative from the Texas Farm Bureau, will read Farm Bureau policies on a few selected issues. The candidates will then be asked to state their positions on these matters, if any.

Tally clerks or secretaries appointed by the county organization will record the answers for release to the general public.

Candidates for state senator are: Floyd Bradshaw and Tom Creighton. Candidates for State Representative are Don Knead, Paul Brashear and Scott Bailey.

Among the issues on which candidates will be asked to state their positions are: (1) taxes (general sales and income), (2) farm-to-market road building program, (3) car registration (4) casualty insurance competitive rating (5) relocating utility lines on state highways and (6) gasoline tax refund.

After all of the specified issues have been considered, the meeting will be opened for a brief question-and-answer session. At this time, members of the audience may direct questions on any campaign issues to the candidates.



## Paul Brashear Issues Statement On His Campaign

Paul Brashear, present State Representative for the 76th Legislative District, in a formal statement this week in connection with his bid for reelection to that office, promised to continue his efforts to obtain for the people of his district and the State of Texas the maximum in good government for a minimum outlay of tax dollars.

The veteran legislator has served as chairman and as a member of many important committees during his tenure of office. During his three terms in the Texas House of Representatives he has served on the Committees on Agriculture; Commerce and Manufacturing; Congressional and Legislative Districts; Penitentiaries; State Hospitals and Special Schools; Liquor Regulations and Oil, Gas and Mining. He has also served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Affairs Committee. Through diligent service on these many committees, Brashear has gained a wide knowledge of the affairs of State Government and an understanding of the problems involved.

A native of the 76th District, Brashear was born at Atwell in Callahan County in 1917. He is married to the former Lena Helen Ray of the Scranton Community. They have two daughters—Ann Etta, who is married and lives in Abilene, and Sarah, who attends the Cisco Schools. Mr. and Mrs. Brashear have one granddaughter and one grandson.

Representative Brashear, in private life an insurance man and farmer, has an extensive knowledge of farm and soil conservation activities. Currently owner of a farm in Callahan County, he began farming as a boy and has owned and operated farms in Eastland and Callahan Counties all of his life. In addition, Mr. Brashear served for several years with the U. S. Department of Agriculture soil conservation service units in Eastland and adjoining counties.

Brashear is a veteran of U. S. Army duty in World War II and is an active member of the American Legion. He has served as chairman of the American Legion's Legislative Committee, a statewide body.

As an assistant Sergeant-at-Arms of the Texas Senate and as secretary in the House of Representatives prior to his election as a State representative, Brashear gained valuable experience in legislative procedure. He also was manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for three years, a post he resigned in order to devote more time to his legislative business.

Brashear's education includes graduation from high school at Cross Plains, attended Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin. He is a Mason, a Legionnaire and a Baptist.

In reviewing some of the major programs of State government, Brashear said: "I have supported measures for better state employee salaries, realistic benefits for the aged, improved water programs, better education and teacher pay, equitable treatment for veterans and farm groups and other legislation beneficial to my district and in the best interest of the state as a whole. I always have and always will work to provide for the people of Texas and honest and efficient system of state government.

"During my service in the State Legislature I have been aware of the needs of our system of public free education and am deeply interested in seeing that system strengthened in every possible way. An education program of the finest quality is essential to this State and to the nation and I will not fail nor refuse to accept my responsibility as a member of the Legislature in financing any reasonable program dedicated to this end.

## Two Districts Agree to Proposed School Study

Two of the three school districts which have been asked to appoint representatives on a committee to study the possibility of a central high school for Eastland, Ranger and Olden have agreed to the three month study proposed by Dr. James C. Whittington.

Olden and Eastland districts have agreed to the plan. Dr. Whittington has not yet heard from the Ranger School Board.

Here is the letter Eastland Board President M. H. Perry sent to Dr. Whittington:

This will acknowledge your letter of March 21, 1960 inviting our local school board to appoint three representatives to a three months study for the purpose of exploring the possibilities of a central high school for Ranger, Olden, Eastland, and other schools in the county who might show an interest.

"Our board has no objection to entering into an open-minded study of the problem after the Ranger and Olden School Boards have given like consent, but we are most anxious to make it clear that at this time we are taking a neutral position and are neither condemning nor approving the consolidated high school as you propose.

"At the present time we feel that we have tangible evidence among our school records that indicate the present academic standards in Eastland High School are in the top percentile, but we do not choose to close our eyes to examining a proposition that might improve our school system.

"We realize that under the present State laws such a consolidation is impossible, and that there are a number of additional

## Age Old Castle Is Good Resting Place

(Editors Note: Joseph M. Perkins, Eastland geologist who is touring Europe, writes from Paris. His letter was dated April 9.)

This is being written from my room at a small hotel, either on the right bank or the left bank of the River Seine. Every time I cross the river I look to see which way it is flowing but not being able to tell I cannot determine on which bank I am domiciled!

After about ten days in beautiful Spain I went to Lisbon and spent two days there. I found the Portuguese language entirely impossible to understand but Lisbon was worth the trip. Among the places I visited, including my excellent Hotel Florida, was the so-called greenhouse in the public park. It was really not a greenhouse at all but a very beautiful tropical garden covering several acres, with a slat covered roof supported by steel columns. The roof let in the rain and possibly a third of the sun. There were trees, shrubs, plants, ivies, from many tropical parts of the world and all neatly labeled.

There were streams of running water and lovely pools but it was too dark to take pictures in color. Before leaving Lisbon I took the train to Estoril, a famous beach resort about twelve miles away. There I found many beautiful homes and a crowd of happy folks sunning themselves on the beach. No swimmers, however, testified to the fact that the Atlantic Ocean was still too cold for bathing. Walking up hill in the hot sunshine I found the Casino, a lovely circular structure surrounded by flowering geraniums. All the doors were locked and the only activity in the area was an old gardener watering plants and a tom cat taking a thorough bath as he sprawled on the marble step.

Leaving Lisbon on an afternoon train I arrived at the small village of Obidos, about supper time. There I telephoned for a taxi, or rather had it done for me and was soon driven up a steep road to the Pousado Do Castelo, an old castle built originally 900 years ago and added to since. It is now owned and operated by the Portuguese government as a pousada, or inn. There are several such in Portugal. The castle is built of stone with a high wall around it, and within the outer wall is a village of shops, houses, churches and streets. It was my first visit to an authentic castle and I was thrilled. In spite of the fact that the castle is quite large and several stories high there are only six guest rooms. At dinner that night in a large dining hall, which I was told had not been changed materially in hundreds of years, I met a charming couple of

Americans from Massachusetts and her sister. After eating a four course dinner we strolled around the castle walls, up atop the tower, and then through the narrow winding streets. The next day was beautiful and I explored the castle, the churches, and the village and took pictures. The Massachusetts people climbed into a Volkswagen to explore the country and invited me but upon observing the limited space in the rented car I politely declined.

Late that afternoon the weather became cloudy and cooler. The Volkswagen returned and we all had tea together. He is with Ginn and Co., Publishers, of Boston and they have a summer home in Newfane, Vt. I am meeting some very fine people in Europe. Next morning it was raining and I decided to start for Paris. I had stayed two nights in a castle and shaved in cold water, and longed for a change of scene. I left in the mid-forenoon and changed trains in mid afternoon, taking the Sud Express, one of the fast trains between Portugal and France. Soon I was riding through central and northern Portugal in a heavy rain. The country was mostly a pine forest with green cultivated valleys, and some low mountains, all in granite. I have never before seen so many granite rocks so beautifully covered with green moss and ferns. It made me think of New England! Rushing streams added their animation to the scene. I saw water wheels for elevating the water for irrigation.

There was an occasional flock of sheep and even olive trees, thriving in granite soil. Haystacks were built around poles with a strange looking top knot. All through Portugal I noticed that the doorways were exceptionally wide, often approaching the proportions of the old Roman doorway which I understand are half as wide as the height.

On the Sud express I was in a compartment for six and my companions were a family from Argentina. They could speak English. He told me he was born in the Basque country of Portugal near the Pyrenees Mts. but had spent most of his life in travel and in the Argentine. He was a retired banker and very well informed on world affairs and we talked until very late in the evening.

Yesterday was sunny again and at the French border there were the usual immigration and custom officials. One source of revenge from the tourists comes from the fact that at such currency exchanges they refuse to change coins but exchange only the paper money which leaves the tourist with small change which is of no value.

Last evening here in Paris I was bold enough to try the Metro or subway. I found it to be quite easy (Continued on page three)

## Pecan Budding School Is Just One Week Away

The third annual pecan budding school set for Cisco next Monday, April 25 will get underway at 9:30 a.m. in the Chamber of Commerce conference room according to Sam Kimmell, president.

Kimmell, Cisco rancher, is expected to give a word of welcome to the group to get the all day affair underway it was explained.

"Because of the interest in pecan growing over the county and because so few people know how to patch bud we decided to train those interested in coming and attending," said J. M. Cooper Eastland County Agricultural Agent who taught similar schools in 1958 and 1959 and who will teach the one next week. Both previous schools were held in Eastland.

Both men and women are welcome to attend. There is no charge.

A supply of dormant budwood of the Burkett, Western Schley and Comanche varieties will be available at the school.

The morning session will be devoted to demonstrations on budding and a lecture of kinds and type of budwood, when to bud, forcing and the after care of the young bud.

Those attending will get some actual practice on budding live pecan trees at the afternoon session planned to be held in a native pecan grove on some nearby farm or ranch.

large spending program, no matter how strong I personally might feel concerning its merit, necessarily must involve consideration of the source of money to pay for the program. I propose to do everything possible to assure our State's continued progress and prosperity without additional tax burdens, but I assure you I will not shirk my responsibility in seeking a solution to the financial aspects of our State.  
"As an insurance man specializing in casualty insurance, I am well aware of the impact upon the insurance-buying public of the merit rating plan recently adopted by the Texas Insurance Commission. As a legislator, I want to assure you that this plan was not conceived nor enacted by the Legislature of Texas. Article 5.01 of the Texas Insurance Code provides that the Board of Insurance Commissions shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority, and it shall be its duty, to fix premium rates and to promulgate rating plans designed to encourage the prevention of accidents. If the plan conceived by the Board of Insurance Commissioners is unfair to the people of my district and to the people of Texas, I feel that the Legislature of Texas should devote maximum effort toward seeking a solution to the problem.  
"As in the past, each vote that I am called upon to cast for the people of my district shall be made only after due consideration of the welfare of my constituents. I shall continue to measure legislation by sound business principles in order to effect a financially stable government for our people.  
"My record of service as your representative for three terms appears in the journals of the Legislature. I have always done my best to represent the people of the 76 District to the fullest extent of my ability and feel that the experience I have gained will enable me to continue working in the best interest of my district. Any constituent has a most cordial invitation to discuss any part of my legislative record with me at any time.  
"I will be very grateful to each of you for your consideration in the May 7th election, and I sincerely appreciate the confidence placed in me by your votes in the past three elections."

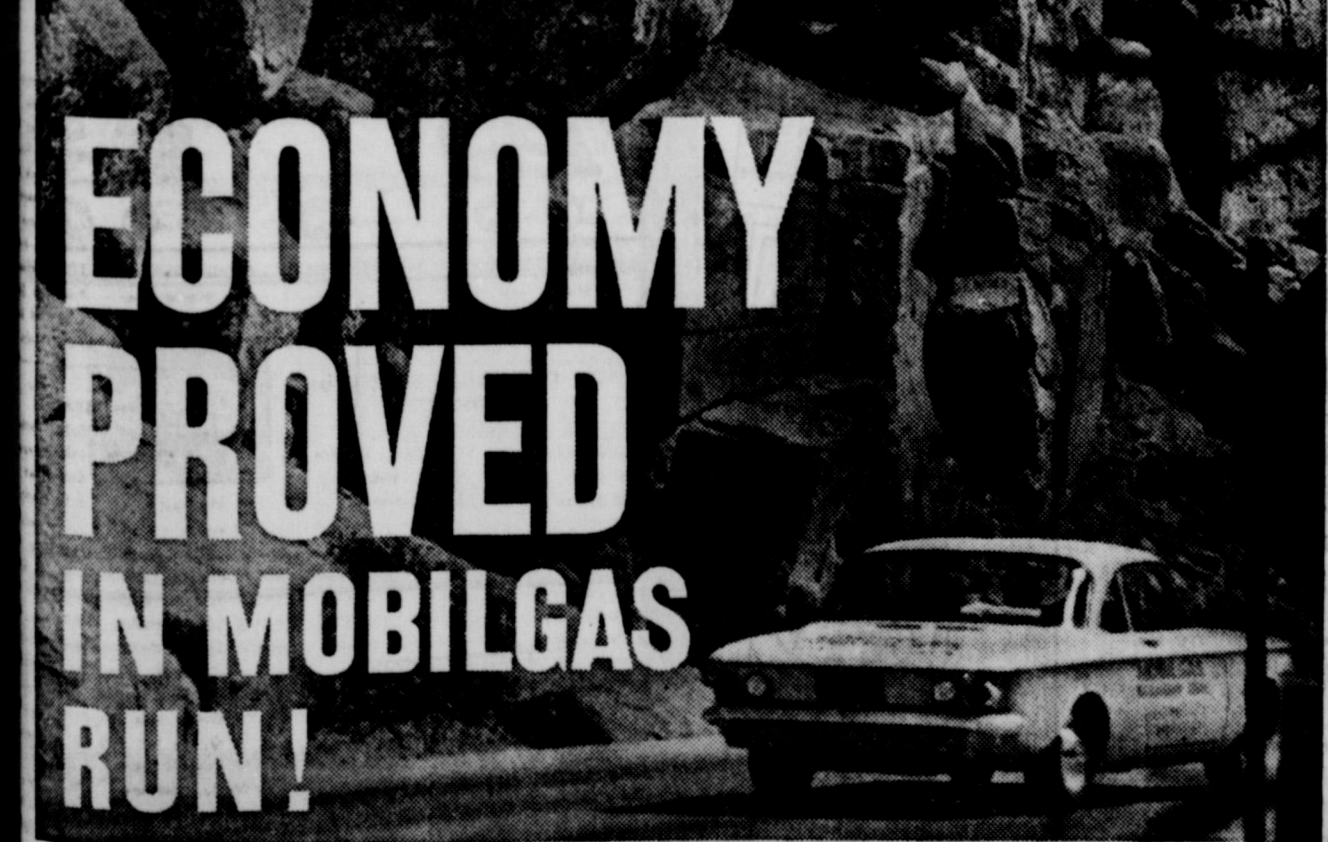

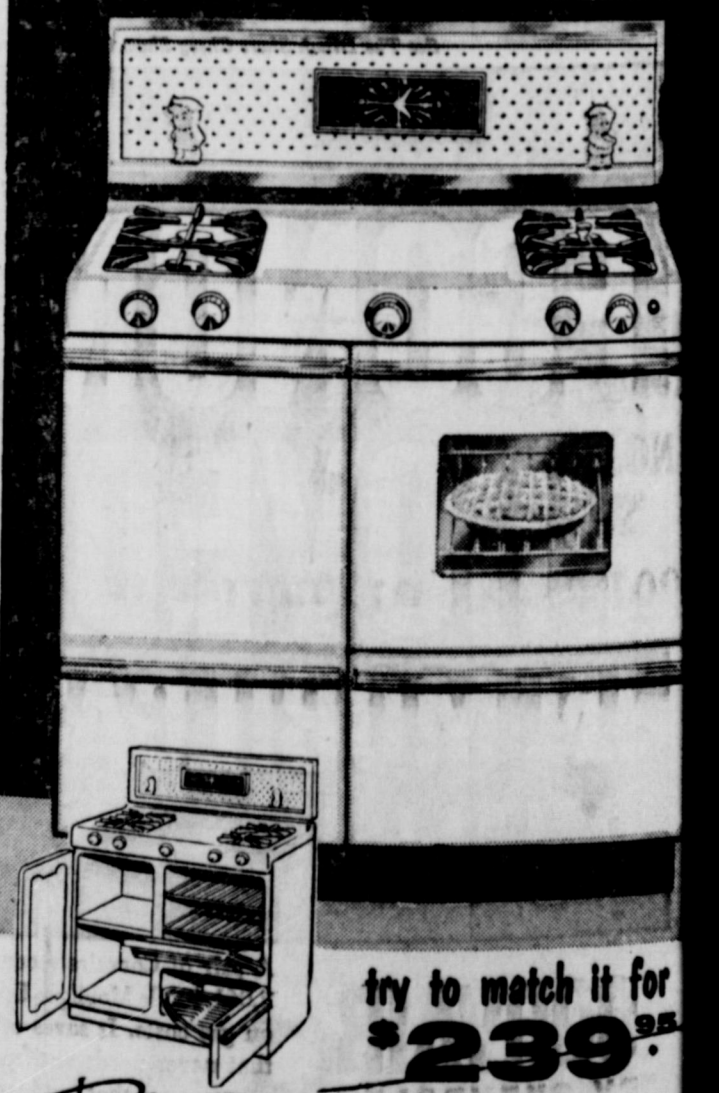
