## Taxes and Bonds Interest County

Eastland County Commissioners had money on their minds when they held their regular meeting Monday, and the talk centered around taxes and bonds.

Commissioners decided to call on owners of property around Lake Leon to meet with them Friday at 10 a.m. to discuss taxes on property in that area. In the past the property, for the main part, has been taxed as acreage. Under state law it must now be taxed as lots and personal property on the lots must also be taxed, commissioners have learned.

Commissioners also decided to have a meeting in the near future of ranchers who are not rendering their livestock for taxation. The Court was told that many ranchers in the county are running stock but not putting them on the tax roll.

At the recommendation of County Auditor Hari O'Brien, the Court voted to retire \$10,000 in road and bridge bonds which will mature in 1969. The county had that much available money in the road and bridge retirement fund. Bonds which will mature in 1967 and 1968 have already been paid off. The indebtedness will be completely paid off now in 1966.

Commissioners also voted to sell \$6000 worth of bonds they have held which were issued by the City of Cross Plains. The County was paid a bonus for selling the bonds and turned around and re-purchased approximately \$8000 in bonds.

## Teenage Baseball Meeting Thursday Termed Important

An important meeting of all adults interested in seeing that Eastland has a teenage baseball team or teams this year have been urged to attend a re-organizational meeting Thursday night.

The meeting will be held in the Texas Electric Service Co. at 7 p.m.

A spokesman said there is a strong possibility that Eastland will not have an organized team for teenage boys this year because of lack of interest by adults.

"We know that somewhere in Eastland there are persons who would be willing to help. This is our personal request to those men and women to attend this important meeting and let us know you are with us," a spokesman declared.

"Eastland needs to keep this fine program going. Surely we are not going to give our boys such a fine Little League program and then stop when they complete their play in that league. There is a place for Teenage baseball here. The boys are wanting to play, but they cannot unless more adults are willing to give of their time."

## High Winds Limits Entries In Rodeo

The largest bass caught in the tournament was one weighing five pounds, seven ounces boated by pannill, but since it was weighed in for the heaviest string trophy it was not eligible for individual honors.

## Cisco Beer Vote Dies As Petition

Eastland County dry forces have won an important battle by fulfilling their goal of stopping a proposed Cisco beer election short of the voting booth.

Monday was the deadline for supporters of the election to file their petition with 290 names with County Clerk Johnson Smith. When the county clerk's office closed at 5 p.m. Monday there was no petition filed. Smith said, however, that according to law he would accept a petition up until midnight. No petition came in.

At 5 p.m. Monday the Telegram reached one of the leaders of the group trying to call an election. By telephone he said that all efforts to get the needed number of signatures on the petition came to a halt Monday afternoon.

"We fell about 90 names short," he said. "Since we realized that we did not have enough names to legally call an election, we decided it was best not even to file the petition."

Supporters of the election had hoped to legalize off-premises sales of beer in the City of Cisco only. The Cisco effort is the only positive evidence of any work in the county to call an election after the vote.

## Brucellosis Meeting Is Slated for May 5

Dr. James B. Henderson, DVM, Texas Animal Health Commission Austin will discuss provisions of the new Brucellosis law at a livestock meeting at the Eastland Auction Co. Barn Highway 80 east, May 5, according to an announcement today by County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

The meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 o'clock on that date.

Purpose of the Texas Brucellosis law as amended is "to bring about the effective control and eventual eradication of bovine brucellosis in the State of Texas and to accomplish that purpose in the most effective, practical and expeditious manner."

In animals Brucellosis may cause abortion as the germ usually localizes in the reproductive tract. Reduction of milk production in cattle and goats and fistula of the withers of horses is caused by the Brucellosis germ.

Man may become infected by handling animals with the disease or by drinking unpasteurized milk from the infected animals. It is called undulant fever in man when caught from a cow. When from a goat it is called Malta fever.

Twenty-three states now have reached the modified certified Brucellosis status.

All nearby counties have held Brucellosis meetings or plan to do so in the near future. All livestock men in Eastland County and particularly beef cattle producers are invited to attend the meeting.

## Cemetery Work At Providence Saturday, April 30

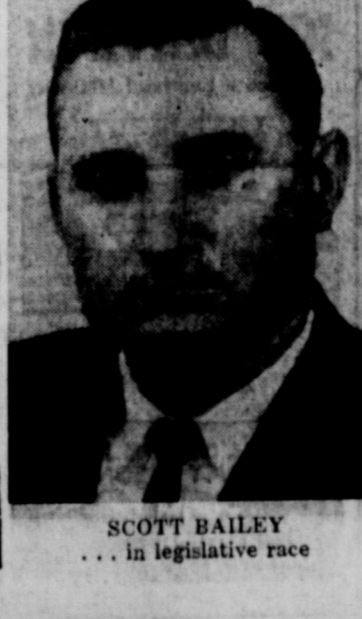
There will be an all-day cemetery working at the Providence cemetery located about five miles east of Eastland, Saturday, April 30.

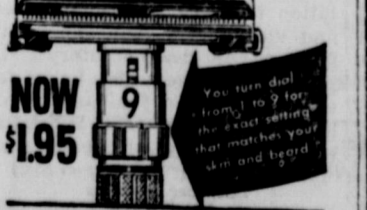

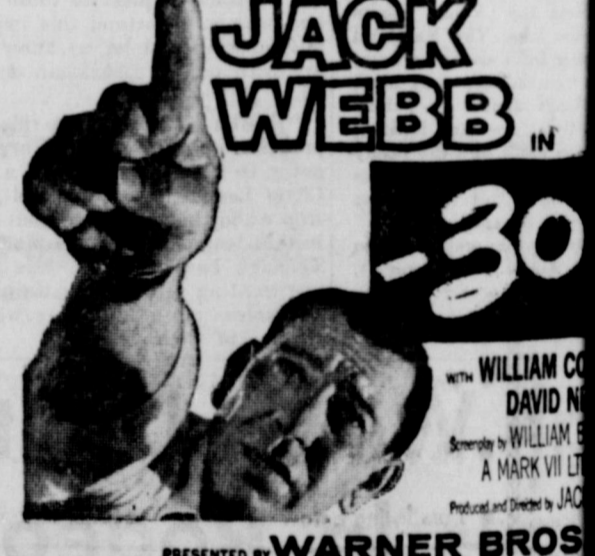

**Oat Diseases Affect Weight, Price and Yield**

Oats are widely grown in Texas, but diseases reduce forage and grain yields of this crop particularly in the humid areas, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. Oat diseases cause a 28 percent crop loss in 1957. Lowered grain production was only a part of the loss since test weights, market price and germination were also reduced. Lodging of the straw caused by diseases increased the cost of harvesting. Crown rust, stem rust, blights and the smuts are major oat diseases in Texas. Powdery mildew, Septoria leaf blotch and virus diseases are minor diseases but may be important in local areas. Oat diseases caused by parasites often are confused with mineral deficiencies and damages from abnormal climatic conditions. The organisms that cause parasitic diseases are small and frequently overlooked, Smith notes. Many diseases can be controlled by the use of resistant varieties, seed treatment and crop rotation. The control of plant disease increases yields and net profit at the end of the crop year. "Diseases of Oats," a new extension leaflet, discusses the above diseases with tips on identification and control. Copies are available from your local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for L-465.

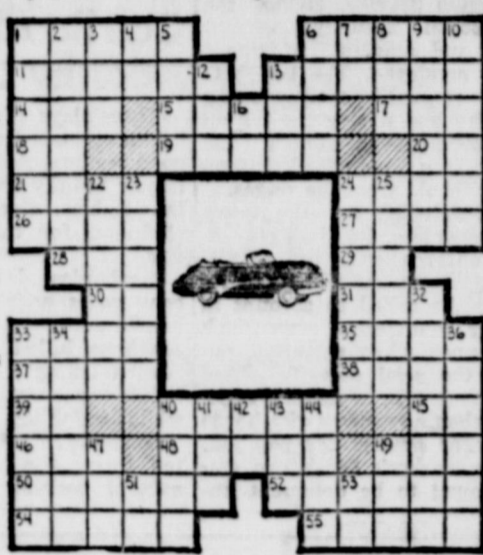

### I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Fort Worth, when I moved there in 1931, had a population of around 150,000. As a reporter on the Star-Telegram, I was often assigned to the police station and there was a period of a year or so when I attended the luncheon of some service club five noons a week—so that I knew all the detectives, half the patrolmen and nearly all the members of the downtown Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs. Now the city has grown to such an extent that I can walk two blocks and not see a single face I know.

Automobile traffic was not a third of what it is today. There were no parking meters. The traffic signals were connected with bells which rang when the signal changed.

This was during the depression and national prohibition. Millions chucked at Will Rogers' remarks in the daily paper. There was no air-conditioning; no TV and even radio was not yet so stabilized but one man operated a station without a license until federal officers walked in, in the mid-

dle of a program, and jerked the wires loose.

People were talking about a successor to "the great engineer in the White House" and a Texan and two former Texans were coming in for consideration—Speaker of the House John N. Garner of Uvalde, Gov. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray of Oklahoma, who had lived in Parker County, and Melvin Traylor of Chicago, who began his banking career in Malone, in Hill County.

Travelers visiting Fort Worth for the first time inquired the way to the Seibold Cafe, famed for its huge steaks; and gourmets said the specialty at the Virginia Ham Kitchen was better than the ham served in Virginia.

A certain hooded organization had faded, like a spectre, from the scene only a few years before, after having briefly exercised political power in Fort Worth and over the State. There was a rumor it was going to be revived so I was assigned by the city editor to report the meeting. The place of assembly was a hill-top overlooking the Fort Worth-Dallas pike, a quarter of a mile east of the car-barns. This hill was said to have been the meeting place during the heyday of the organization.

Several hundred men were there, none in robes and masks, and a few speeches were made but the ghost returned to its tomb.

One week-end the Missouri Pacific railroad ran an excursion to San Antonio. I went. The round-trip fare was \$3. (Years ago, the Missouri Pacific gave up passenger service between Fort Worth and San Antonio.) Ten thousand was a good crowd for a T. C. U. football game. The Stock Show was held in the North Side Coliseum. Bowen Air Lines advertised that the fastest passenger planes in the world were in operation between Fort Worth and San Antonio.

Amor Carter already had become an international celebrity. William P. McLean was the State's most renowned trial lawyer. The Rev. Frank Norris was one of the best known ministers in the nation.

The city's most spectacular capitalist of that era was busy in various enterprises. Rated many times over a millionaire at that time, he was to die 20 years later as a guest in a hospital to which, in his days of affluence, he had given \$50,000.

W. T. (Tom) Waggoner, last of the old-time West Texas cattle kings, was living in Fort Worth. He was said to be the richest man west of the Mississippi because of the countless cattle and the oil wells on his vast ranch. At this time, he was building Arlington

Downs, which came to represent an investment of \$2,000,000. But, to stand deserted except for the memories of pounding hoofbeats and cheering throngs. After years of desolation, the big grandstand recently was torn down so the land can become part of a great industrial development.

Verily, time has brought changes since 1931.
