## LETTER FROM PERKINS

### Long Days Interest Traveler in Norway

(The following article was mailed April 28 from Norway, above the Arctic Circle.)

The train trip from the Army camp in Northern Sweden to the port of Narvik in Norway took less than two hours through very rough, rocky country. There were several tunnels and many snow sheds to get through, and the track hugged the sides of the steep mountains. Below were deep valleys, and as the train neared Narvik, it followed a winding fjord whose water, unlike the inland fresh water lakes, was not frozen but was as smooth as a mill pond.

## Young Explains City Is Big Business Here

City Manager Jimmy Young was guest speaker at Monday's Rotary Club meeting and he gave a report on the City's operations at present. Young told Rotarians the City is one of the largest businesses here.

During the last year, he pointed out, the City's income was \$204,216. Expenses during that period totaled \$203,470, leaving a balance of \$746.

Eastland now has a total bonded indebtedness \$309,887. Forty percent of all tax money goes to retire general bonds, which total \$192,487. The remainder of the bonded indebtedness is water and sewer bonds, which total \$117,400. Each year \$18,000 goes to pay off the water and sewer bonds.

The city now has three persons to handle the administration department, including Young and two women.

The fire department consists of a chief and two paid men and 18 volunteers.

The police department has three paid men and a chief.

Four men work in the street department, five in the sanitation department, two in the water and sewer department and two full time and one part time man in the cemetery department. There is also one man in the park department.

I am writing this on the train from Trondheim to Oslo, Early in the day we were in snow covered country but now it is late afternoon and the only visible snow is on the mountain sides. The train runs along beside a long, narrow ice covered lake. On the lake shores are thousands of freshly cut pine and fir logs with the bark hewn off, shining reddish brown in the sunshine, and awaiting the melting of the ice to float down to the lumber mill. On the other side of the track there is a steep mountain side and wherever the train stops I can hear distinct music of many mountain streams being fed by the melting snow. Spring is coming fast in Central Norway.

The night train from Oslo to the fjord country and the ski resorts was jammed with people most of whom had snowsocks and skis. The Norwegians take skiing very seriously. On some trains, very small, open flat cars provided a first aid kit and a stretch er or two. When I left the train at 6:00 this morning I knew dozens of young folks who had sat up all night. At a junction point I took a small, one car train down a steep grade for several miles to the head of the Sognefjord fjord. There I boarded a modern diesel powered boat for an all day trip to the coast.

This trip by bus was quite an experience. It took eight hours over unpaved gravel roads, narrow and with many sharp turns around blind corners. I thought it was rather hazardous but the trip was made with no trouble. The route, for the most part, was along the sea coast with occasional trips a few miles inland.

At three places on the route the bus drove onto a ferry to cross a wide fjord. One such ferry trip took forty minutes and was several miles in length. Along the coast the mud flats were strawn with glacial boulders. Inland the granite ledges were handsomely covered with green and reddish moss, something like the moss covered rocks in Portugal. There was snow near the coast except on the high mountains. The day was sunny and I estimated the temperature to be in the upper fifties. The coast of Norway is warmed by the gulf stream and seldom gets extremely cold.

At noon a lunch stop was made at a small village, and there I ate a very tasty beef stew and drank a glass of good rich milk. As the bus went south, the country had more habitation and after lunch we passed small farms. Every farmhouse had a large woodpile of birch wood. At one of the ferry crossings I had an opportunity to examine this birch wood and I found it to be very heavy and hard, due probably to the fact that all trees in this far north country grow very slowly. It is said to be excellent fire wood, which is very fortunate for the Norwegians as it is the only fuel readily available. One unusual sight, at least for me, is the moss covered roofs of old farm buildings, houses, barns and sheds. Apparently the moss grows only on old buildings with wooden roofs, for I saw none on modern buildings having metal or composition roofing. The moss is three or four inches thick and occasionally I have seen young trees growing from it. I have observed these moss covered roofs in both Northern

and Central Norway. I think the moss provides pretty good insulation and at the same time the look very well on the old buildings.

Narvik is an attractive, small Norwegian seaport but a very important one because most of the iron ore from the mines in Northern Sweden is shipped abroad from its large, modern ore docks. I noticed three ore boats in Narvik harbor waiting to load ore. After a restful night in a good hotel, I took the Monday morning bus for Fauske, the northernmost rail point in Norway, and 150 miles south from Narvik.

day trip down the fjord and back. These fjords lie between steep sided, forested, snow capped mountains, and the cascades from melting snow stand out white against their green forests. They are similar to those along the coast of British Columbia, but the latter tumble over more vertical cliffs and spill much more water. Some are so high that the water, striking against rock ledges, is turned into mist which is blown away by the wind. Here there are a few villages along the shore, and occasionally one sees a house perched high up on the mountainside in what would appear to be an impossible location.

The day is nearing its end as it is after 8 p.m. but the sun still shines brightly against the sides of the mountain. It was very light at 4 this morning. It has been a pleasant and restful day's ride up the main fjord and its many tributaries, calling at a dozen landings where freight, mail and passengers were transferred. At one landing two young bull calves were loaded in canvas slings. I expected some excitement but there was none. These animals apparently are accustomed to men and their ways because they behaved like perfect gentlemen. At another landing, hours later, they were unloaded in the same dignified manner.

On this day's trip I really got close to the Norwegians that live in rural districts, and they are a very fine lot. The boat trip began at 7 this morning and will end at 10:30 tonight. The entire cost of the trip, including boat transportation and two hearty and well prepared, family style meals, was 42 kroner, the equivalent of six dollars of our United States money.

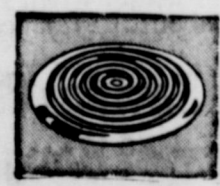

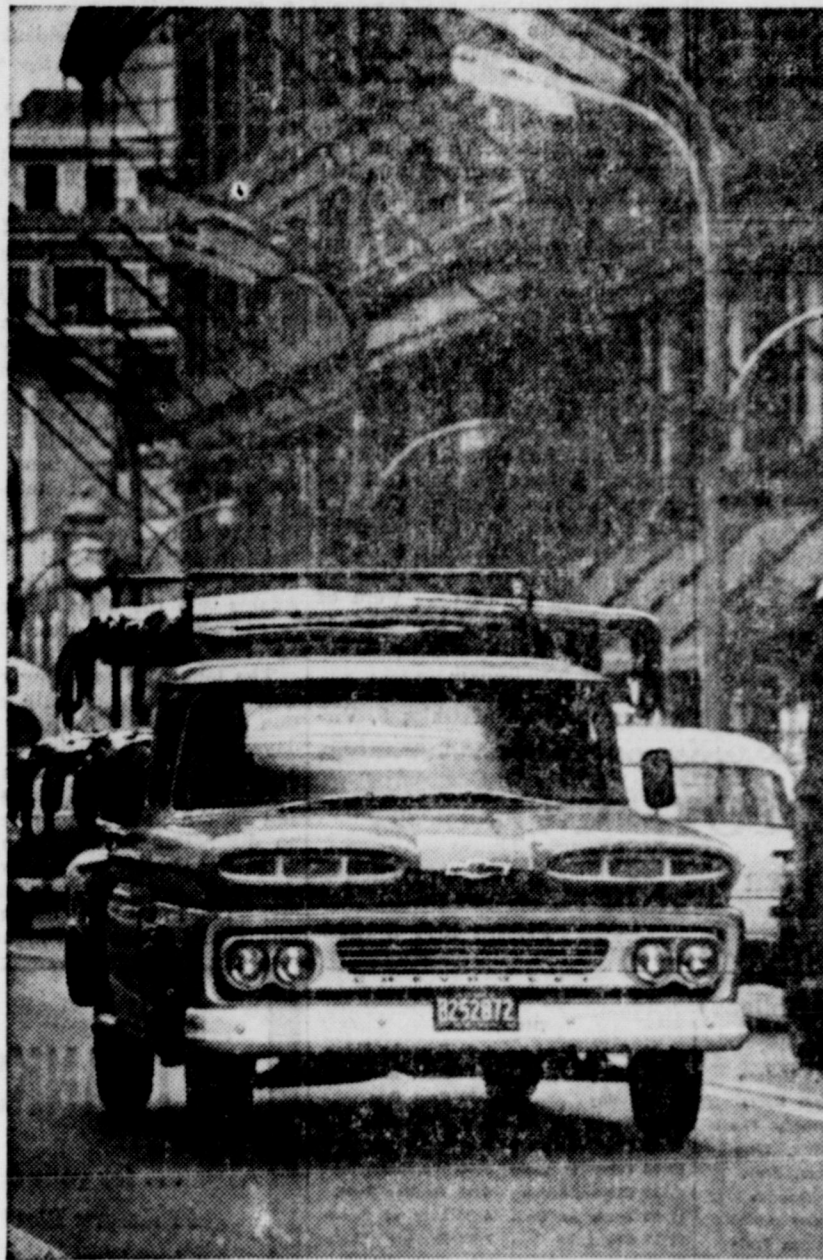

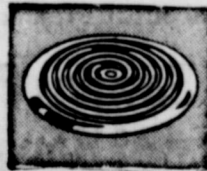

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Research has this information on Presidents. The youngest President was Theodore Roosevelt, age 42 years and 10 months when inaugurated. The youngest candidate was William Jennings Bryan, age 36 when nominated to oppose William McKinley in 1896. The oldest President to be inaugurated was William Henry Harrison at the age of 68 years and 23 days. The oldest President at leaving office was Andrew Jackson who was 2 days short of 70. President Eisenhower leaves office January 20 next year, at the age of 70 years and 98 days. Of the 32 Presidents prior to President Eisenhower, 9 were Episcopals; 7 were Presbyterians; 4 were Unitarians; 3, Methodist; 2, Baptist; 2 were members of the Dutch Reform Church. Coolidge was a Congregationalist; Garfield, Disciples of Christ. Hoover, Quaker. Three Presidents — Jefferson, Lincoln, and Johnson — were of no specific denomination. Only one Catholic—Alfred E. Smith—has received the nomination.

Seven Presidents were residents of New York; 6 of Ohio; 5, Vir-

ginia; 3, Massachusetts; 3, Tennessee; 2, Illinois; and 1 each of California, Indiana, Louisiana, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Several Presidents — 13 in fact — have been elected without receiving a majority of the popular votes. These include Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson, and Harry S. Truman.

Twenty-Four Presidents were lawyers and 5 were professional soldiers.

George Washington, who is said to have been the wealthiest man in the country in his time, left an estate valued at \$530,000. F. D. R. left the largest estate—\$1,085,500. The financial conditions of President Eisenhower and former President Eisenhower are not matters of public record. According to rumor, however, Mr. Hoover was a millionaire before taking office, Mr. Truman has made a million since leaving office, and Mr. Eisenhower is the first to become a millionaire while in office.

Only one man has been elected while serving in the Senate—Warren G. Harding (R-Ohio), elected in 1920. Only one—James A. Garfield—has been elected while a Member of the House. John Quincy Adams was the only President to serve in the House after his term of office.

The longest nominating convention was the Democratic convention of 1924, which lasted for 14 days. It took 103 ballots to select a candidate—John W. Davis.

In the first Presidential election and in the next three thereafter, no distinction was made between votes for President and Vice President. The person receiving the highest electoral vote became President, and the second highest be-

came Vice President.

The first American political parties formed with the election of 1796. Adams was the Federalist candidate and Jefferson the Anti-Federalist candidate. The Republican party today evolved from the Federalist party, and the Democratic party from the Anti-Federalists.

**Ralph Yarborough Report**

The Youth Conservation Corps Bill, which I am co-sponsoring, is an important step toward meeting three basic problems of our times—juvenile delinquency, conservation of our natural resources and unemployment.

This proposal passed the Senate last year and is now under consideration by the House Education and Labor Committee. It basically provides:

(1) Establishment of a work force of young men, ages 16 to 21, to perform conservation and improvement work in our forests and parks.

(2) Affording many thousands of our young men, many of whom need a new purpose and interest in life, a chance to leave the circumstances which have led to delinquency and take a new start and fresh outlook.

It seems to me that few things are more important to Americans, as a free people, and to this nation, as a free country, than proper preservation of our natural resources. The Youth Conservation Corps bill will improve two of the most important resources our nation possesses—many of our young men and many acres of our national park and wilderness areas.

Patterned after the original Civilian Conservation Corps, the proposed new YCC provides for the employment of 50,000 young men the first year who are paid \$60 monthly plus food and shelter.

To see how this program benefited America in the past, one needs only look at the park improvements, the countless other public works projects still in use to see that the CCC made its worthwhile lasting mark on America. What isn't so easily seen, but is many times more important, is the beneficial result it had on the lives of many Americans.

To see how this new YCC program will benefit America in the future, one needs only to consider the tragically high rate of juvenile delinquency and the mass of work needed to put our national parks and our forest in good condition.

This program represents an investment in America's future

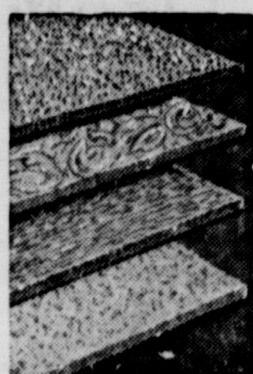

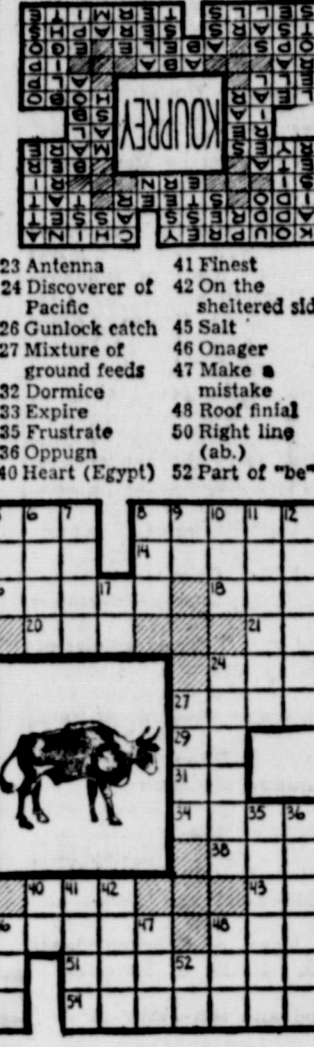
