



Run-offs Loom In Several Important Races

Sheriff's Race Seems Hottest

Eastland County voters came up with some surprises in Saturday's Democratic primary. From all indications it seems that Lee Horn, former police chief at Cisco and a former deputy sheriff, will be in a run-off in the sheriff's race, which drew the most attention county-wide.

In other interesting races, it would appear that Rep. Paul Brashear and Scott Bailey will face each other in a runoff for state representative. Brashear led in the county race and Bailey was a very close second. Don Kincaid, the third man in the race, ran a strong third. In the two other counties in the 76th legislative race, Brashear held a fair lead. In Shackelford County he polled 722 votes to 452 for Kincaid and 318 for Bailey. Callahan County returns showed Brashear ahead although 600 votes remained out. Kincaid was not out of the race, but he would have to make an almost impossible comeback in the two remaining Eastland precincts (both very small) and in Callahan County. It looks like Bailey and Brashear in the run-off.

In the State Senate race, Tom Creighton held a small lead over Floyd Bradshaw, the incumbent, in Eastland County. Around the district Creighton led by about 2,400 votes at 11:30 p.m.

Jack Cox of Breckenridge led in the governor's race by a big margin in Eastland County, but Price Daniel ran up a huge lead statewide and it appears that he has won re-election.

There is a run-off between J. B. Arther and Ott Ervin in the Precinct 1 commissioners race.

At Rising Star, where returns were incomplete, the seven man commissioners race could still go anyway.

In other state results Will Wilson apparently has won re-election as attorney general. Ben Ramsey seems a sure winner as lieutenant governor, Robert R. Calvert has a

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in the Hamner Funeral Home Chapel for Floyd Brewer, long-time resident of Eastland, who had been in a rest home in Dublin for the past year.

Mr. Brewer was born in Tarrant Co. on June 20, 1870 and came to Eastland as a baby. He resided at 814 W. Patterson before his death Thursday.

Rev. James Campbell, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated at the services followed by burial in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Brewer had been prominently identified with farming and ranching and had land holdings located in Eastland, Callahan and Taylor counties. He married Emma Tanner on Dec. 25, 1921 in Ranger. Conventions Favor Lyndon B. Johnson

Democratic precinct conventions held in Eastland County Saturday afternoon and night went off in quick order in most instances, with most of the precincts passing resolutions pledging the delegates to support Lyndon B. Johnson for President of the United States.

In Eastland Virgil E. Moore

was elected permanent chairman and Mrs. Don Parker was named permanent secretary. The delegation, which will have 19 votes at the county convention, was bound by unit rule and passed a resolution pledging efforts to secure Johnson nomination and election as President.

In Ranger Calvin Brown was named chairman and Helen Boen was elected secretary. Ranger also had 19 delegates vote. The Ranger delegation was also bound by the unit vote and Johnson resolution was unanimously adopted.

Cisco convention elected A. D. Addy as chairman and J. W. Sitton as secretary. A resolution on States rights and a resolution calling for Sen. Johnson to be a favorite son candidate for President was passed. Delegates were instructed to vote for Johnson at County convention.

Olden democrats named Mrs. O. H. Dick as chairman and Gilbert Copeland as secretary. A Johnson for President resolution was passed and delegates were bound to a unit vote.

Gorman named Miss Buena VanWinkle as chairman and Hubert Craddock as secretary. No resolutions were passed and delegates fill go to the County convention un-instructed.

Desdemona passed a Johnson resolution and instructed delegates to support him. L. E. Clark is chairman and Dorothy Greenhaw is secretary.

Preston Mangum is chairman of Rising Star delegation. No resolution was passed at Rising Star convention.

At Pioneer Doss Alexander was elected chairman. A Johnson resolution was passed and delegates were instructed.

Scranton also passed Johnson resolution. I. A. Bailey is chairman and B. O. Speagle is secretary. Delegates were instructed to vote for Johnson.

Porter Woods is again elected constable here.

Porter Woods won re-election as constable of Precinct 1 (Eastland) in Saturday's primary.

Woods polled 952 votes to Hoover Pittman's 534. In Eastland Woods led 852 to 493 and in Olden he was ahead 100 to 41.

For example, when Jane was eleven years old, she became obsessed with creating laughter. She made faces, did stunts, anything to get someone to laugh at her. One night during church, she got the attention of several children and promptly began a performance. Stiff with shame, the family went home in silence. Flo planned a good spanking, but Tom had other ideas. Placing Jane on an ottoman, he forced her to entertain them for more than an hour. Two of them, that is, for Flo left the room to keep her sympathetic tears from mingling with Jane's humiliated ones. Needless to add, both mother and daughter cried themselves to sleep, but Jane never again competed with the pastor for attention.

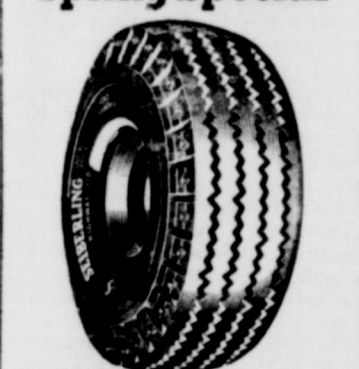

bringing to Flo a child of her own, her husband's two became even more precious. It is still a miracle to her that God gave a boy and a girl to a woman unable to bear children. "Can you realize the compassion of God this points out?" she asks. Perhaps the most revealing fact is that, while other mothers refer to their children by name, Mrs. Tom Clark always uses "My son" or "My daughter."

Surly God was concerned for the Bethel Baptist Church in Eastland, for He led the Clarks there, where they have worked and helped other members. A deacon, Tom has served as Chairman of the Board and is currently president of both his Sunday School class and Training Union.

Flo teaches a class of adult women, holds an office in Training Union, visits for the Extension Department, and plays the piano for all worship services. And where ever there is death, or sickness, or want, or despair, the alms are the Clarks. They offer physical and spiritual aid quietly with no fanfare, asking no glory for themselves, doing each deed in the name of Christ.

The children are grown and live far from here. But Gene, his wife, and Jane have a home—complete with two parents. They have the memory of seeing true Christian love in their home and they walk close to God as a result of this.

By seeking—and more important, by following—Gods will for their lives, Tom and Flo Clark have built a home dedicated to Christ. They have proven that a step-mother can successfully take her place in a family and become the nicest thing which could happen to small motherless children.

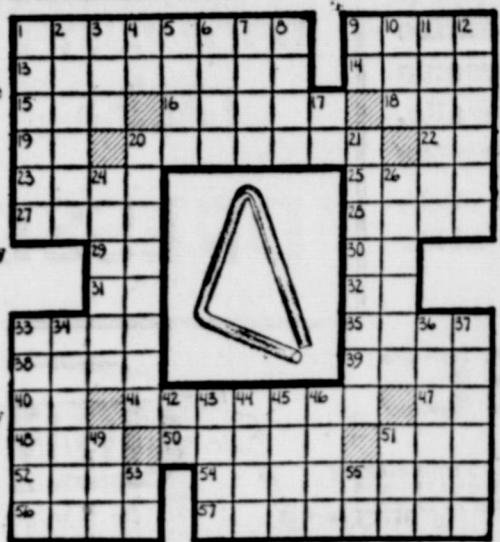
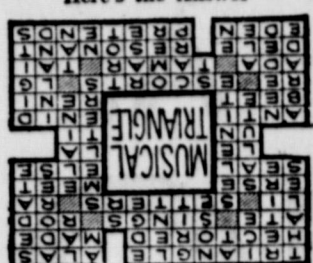

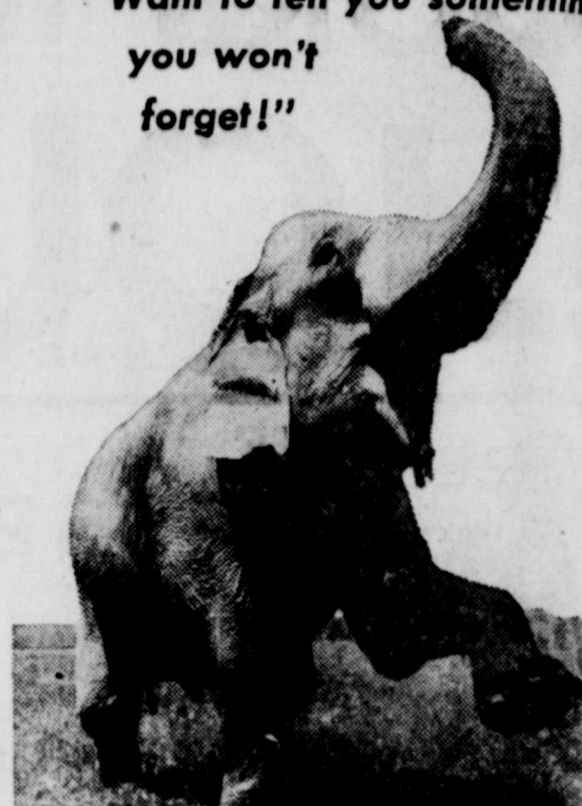
