



Partnership or Corporation John Brown and Bill Smith desire to operate a business together. Should this be done as partners or as a corporation? The answer to this problem involves many legal questions.

Perhaps the most important factor is that the business or personal acts of either John or Bill may be binding upon the partnership. The corporation, however, can act only through its officers and agents, and then only within the limitations granted by the articles of incorporation.

As members of a partnership both John and Bin are liable for all of the debts of the business. In the case they have business losses, the creditors of the partnership could take all of the assets of the partnership, and all of the personal assets of either John or Bill, or both (except a few exempt by law), in order to satisfy the partnership debts.

On the other hand, if they form a corporation the creditors may go only against the assets of the corporation so that the most that either John or Bill can lose is the amount they have invested in the business. The creditors could not touch the personal property of either John or Bill.







Give thanks that this country grows those wonderful bracing grapefruit, and use the fine thin-skinned Floridas now in market generously through your holiday meals. Low in cost, high in nutrition, they're perfect symbols of the bounty of the land and as such des rive an honored place on the festive board.

Grapefruit makes a wonderful first course for Thanksgiving dinn since the rest of the meal is liable to be on the heavy calorie side. Make attractive baskets of your halves and tie tiny mums to the handles. Use the whole grapefruit as the body of a handsorie gobbler, and make lace cards of the first fresh Florida oranges. here are the easy steps for these novel ideas:

Grapefrui, Peskets

out Florida grapefruit in half. To make handle, insert two toothpicks a-inch apart on opposite sides of grapefruit Cut through peel 14-inch below edge, leaving space between toothpicks uncut. Loosen fruit fr brane by cutting around each section, and around outside edge. Lift handles, tie together. Turkey

Insert three wooden skewers in graperait for legs. Cut four rows of deep slits for fanned-out tail. Insert thick leaves (as whododendron) for tail feathers, placing smallest leaves in front, longest in back, and trive tips with seissors. Make two deep slits on sides for wings; insert two leaves in each without trimming tips. Cut gash for head and wattle. Make head of shelled almond with pin inserted in bottom to hold it in place. Use coxcomb, or pimiento for wattle. Cut scallops, bending them outward, to represent breast feathers.

Placecards

Insert two cloves in orange for eyes. Make shallow cut on two sides of triangle for nose and bend resulting flap outward. Cut smiling mouth out of skin. Neck for orange to rest on is strip cardboard, with ends glued together to make ring. Cut hat from heavy black paper.


