Tarleton Grads to Hear Mrs. Perkins

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland will present the commencement address to the graduating class at Tarleton State College May 22. The graduating exercises involving nearly 160 students, the largest number to ever graduate from Tarleton, will take place at 7:30 p.m. Mrs. Perkins has participated in education work as a member of the Advisory Council, University of Texas Extension Library, as a member of National Board of Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, as table leader at the White House Conference on Education, and for five years was the only woman on the State Board of Education. Music textbooks have been adopted for Texas schools largely through her activity. She is the only woman in Texas who has been president of both Federation of Women's Clubs and Federation of Music Clubs. She organized the Women's Field Army of Texas, served as vice-president of the State Division,

American Cancer Society and was a member of the National Service Committee. She has held appointments from several governors in the fields of health, education and safety. As chairman of the Budget and Statistical Committee she has reviewed the budgets of all state supported colleges and universities. Mrs. Perkins, born in Gleasondale, Massachusetts, studied at New England Conservatory of Music and graduated from Boston University. Her husband is a geological and mining engineer and she has accompanied him on assignments in Canada, Mexico and South America. They have a son and two daughters, and five granddaughters. Her career in organizational work includes training as a YWCA secretary, four war years as Red Cross executive, secretary-treasurer for the Camp Bowie Council and eight years as grand secretary, Alpha Gamma Delta. As a Methodist, she has served her church as teacher, organist, and choir member. Her honorary memberships include Delta Kappa Gamma and Future Homemakers, and life membership in the National Federation of Music Clubs and Chautauqua Women's Club, past regent and daughter of the American Revolution. She is a member of the Stow, Massachusetts Women's Association, and the Eastland Thursday Afternoon Club and Music Club. In General Federation, she has been president of Past State Presidents Club, chairman of Music Division and chairman of two departments of Fine Arts and Education. She attended the Manila Conference. Mrs. Perkins is treasurer of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. President E. J. Howell of Tarleton State expressed the good fortune of the college in obtaining such a highly rated speaker.

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Three Tornadoes Spotted In Area

No Injuries; Little Damage Is Reported

Three tornado funnels were reported sighted in Eastland County Wednesday afternoon, and two of them touched ground, causing minor damage. The twisters were accompanied by rain and hail. The first tornado funnel to hit ground destroyed a tin barn near Carbon. Two others were seen about eight miles southeast of Eastland on the Whit Graham place. One of the twisters touched ground and ripped up a tree, but the other failed to touch down, witness said. Hail the size of golf balls accompanied the small tornado funnels in that area. Heavy hail broke out windshields on vehicles near the Carbon storm area. And in the Nimrod community the home of Garland Pharr was damaged when lightning struck in the kitchen, starting a small fire in electrical fixtures. A radio and electric mixer were damaged. Eastland had an official 1.17 inches of rain. Cisco reported 1.30 inches, Nimrod 2.50, and Rising Star .70. The Eastland County area was under a severe weather alert until 9 p.m. Wednesday. The storm came right on schedule, and by 9 p.m. things were generally clear in this area.

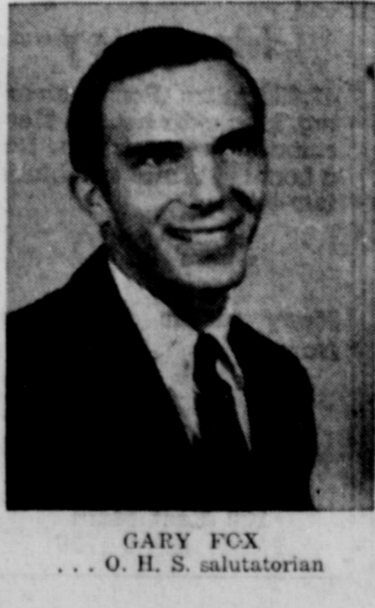
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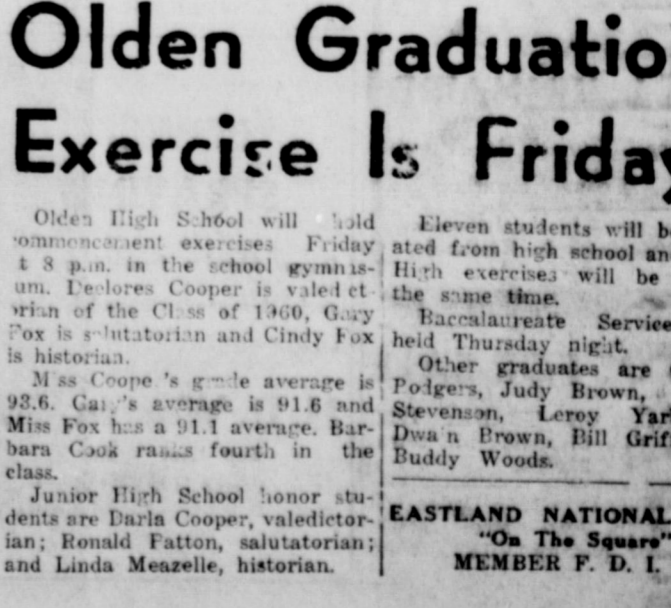

Producers A'erted On Hog Cholera

The percentage of pigs vaccinated for hog cholera is not adequate to prevent widespread losses in the event of an epidemic, warns Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian of College Station.

Last year, with seven million head more pigs farrowed than in 1958, this follows a general trend which has prevailed for the past five or six years.

If the trend toward less vaccination continues, only about one-third of the nation's hogs will be protected against hog cholera. This is too low a percentage to stop heavy losses if the disease becomes widespread, Dr. Patterson says.

There is no evidence at this time that the incidence of hog cholera is increasing. However, fewer vaccinations could set the stage for costly outbreaks of the disease.

Available vaccines and vaccination procedures are effective, but they should be used before summer, when the incidence of this disease is usually greatest.

The best time to vaccinate is in the spring or fall when pigs are young. Also, it is the most economical time to vaccinate, since pigs are smaller and easier to handle. Vaccinating now would decrease the chances of a widespread epidemic, the veterinarian

Plant Temporary Pastures for Summer Grazing

Summer temporary pastures are valuable for several reasons. Probably the most important is that they offer one of the most dependable sources of summer grazing, says George McBee, extension pasture specialist of College Station. Also, with proper management they will provide a large volume of high quality grazing, permitting permanent pastures to be rested.

Several types of plants can be used. Sudan is still one of the most dependable. Varieties of Sudan include Sweet, Common, Tift, Piper and others.

Pearl millet is suggested for use where Sudan does not produce satisfactorily, mainly on acid, sandy soils of East Texas and severely eroded soils of Central Texas. Varieties include Georgia Hybrid No. 1, Common, Starr and Texas No. 7.

Perennial sweet Sorgrass can also be used the agronomist says. It has a sweet stalk which is coarser than Sudan and the peak of grazing is mid-summer to fall. It should be handled as an annual.

Another, sorghum alnum, is nonsweet and has a larger stalk than sudan. It gives more grazing in mid-summer to fall than Sudan and is more successful when handled as an annual.

Planting in 36 to 42 inch rows will give a longer grazing period than will broadcast plantings, McBee says. Other advantages of planting in rows are: livestock won't trample as much of the pasture and weed control is easier. He suggests more than one planting in order to extend the grazing period.

Fertilizer should be used if needed and applied according to a soil test, McBee adds. During growing season, when moisture is available, applications of 20 to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre should be used as a sidedressing after each grazing period or cutting.

Birds appeal to nearly everyone because of their natural beauty, sprightly actions and pleasing songs. Much can be done to attract song birds to the home and garden to increase enjoyment of bird study, reports Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

Feeding trays and nest boxes can be constructed to make the lawn and garden more appealing to native birds. Many types of shrubs can be planted to offer the food, shade and protection required by certain types of birds.

There are many things to take into consideration when planning to make an area attractive to birds, Cooper says. Certain birds require nest boxes of specific dimensions. Cats and other natural enemies must be prevented access to bird houses and nests. Certain types of food are necessary to attract desirable birds rather than undesirable species such as the English sparrow. Good watering facilities also add much to a bird sanctuary, Cooper points out.

Several publications are available on how to make an area more attractive to birds and also on how to identify the feathered visitors. Information on the availability of these helpful publications can be obtained from Cooper at Texas A&M College, College Station, or from your local county agent.

Hog cholera is caused by a virus and is more prevalent in the Midwest and South, where hogs are raised in large numbers. Vaccination is not a cure or a treatment for the disease—only a preventative, says Dr. Patterson.

Texas Scientists Receive Cancer Society Grants, Garrett Reveals

Three Texas scientists and one institution received American Cancer Society grants totaling \$81,613 it was learned here today by H. R. Garrett, district director.

Two of the scientists are at the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, Houston. Dr. A. Clark Griffin received \$12,846 "To Isolate Factors from Malignant Tissue Affecting Metabolism" and Dr. Saul Kit received \$13,900 to study "The Nucleic Acids of Normal Tissues and Tumors."

Dr. William C. Levin of the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston was awarded \$39,767 to investigate the "Methods for the Diagnosis and Management of Dysant Paraproteinemias Associated with Malignancies." An institutional grant of \$15,000 went to the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School and is under the direction of Jack A. Pritchard.

Garrett revealed that these new research grants brought to \$1,833,736 the amount allocated for cancer research since 1945 in the state of Texas a part of the American Cancer Society's nationwide research program.

Currently, he stated, 13 grants totaling \$228,356 are in effect in Texas, including M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Clinic, Baylor University College of Medicine, Houston; Southwestern Medical School, Dallas; and the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. These, he stated, are part of the \$15,409,353 in ACS research projects now in effect throughout the nation.

Garrett stated that these recent grants and others in effect are funds returned to Texas from the annual April educational fund raising Crusade conducted by the society in each Texas community.

In addition to the 60c of every cancer dollar which stays in Texas, practically 30c is returned to the state in the form of cancer research grants, Garrett said.

Texas, he stated, are very fortunate indeed to share so largely in the cancer control dollars, being able to support a year round educational life saving program of cancer control as well as conduct vital research activities, which may one day find the answer to the disease.

The research approach to the

cancer problem, H. R. Garrett stated, is complex and diversified because cancer is a complex disease. For example, he stated: Is leukemia caused by a virus? Dr. Leon Dmochowski at Baylor University and Dr. John Trentin, also at Baylor, are conducting research to answer this important question.
