At Tyburn, I found that the main street consisted of two traffic lanes and also a narrower lane for cyclists only.

While still in England I want to say a few words about the British currency. On this trip I have had to use the currencies of 16 different countries. Here in England the pound is the unit of value and is worth \$2.80 American money. It is divided into 20 shillings, and a penny is one-twelfth of a shilling. The paper money usually encountered is the half pound or ten-shilling note, the pound note and the five pound note. These present no problems. The coins in general circulation are more confusing to the uninitiated. There is the half crown or two and one half shilling, yet I do not find any crowns in circulation. A slightly smaller coin of a little less value is called the two shilling piece. Next is the one shilling, followed by the half shilling or sixpence as it is usually called. The above coins are the color of our five cent piece. Then, there is the three penny piece worth a quarter of a shilling. It is a 12 sided coin the color of brant and gives the impression of being much more valuable than it is.

Following that comes the one penny piece worth one twelfth of a shilling and last of all the half penny which is worth next to nothing but has a nuisance value as it adds to the general confusion. These last two coins are large copper pieces. A stranger to this system has his problems immediately. The first time he gets on a bus and hands the conductor a half pound note he receives first a dirty look along with a small slip of paper attesting to the fact that he has paid his fare, followed by a double handful of coins of assorted sizes, shapes, colors and values. He has absolutely no notion of what they are worth and if he is sensible he will shove them into a pocket and try to keep a straight face.

After four days in England, I find the currency still rather mysterious and confusing. The radio reports a movement to consider changing to a decimal system of currency, but the thought of changing all the cash registers, adding machines and similar devices that now digest the mess is quite discouraging and I do not look for any change in the near future.

Citizens Asked to Offer Suggestion for Schools

Eastland County citizens were asked today to contribute any suggestions they might have for providing Eastland County with a better school system. The request came from the school study board, recently appointed by school boards of Ranger, Olden and Eastland.

"We would like for readers to send any suggestions about the school problem," Dr. James Whittington and J. C. Everett, who are in charge of public relations for the committee, announced. "We feel that the final answer will rest with the people, therefore we would like to have their ideas now to enable us to make a more thorough study of the problem. Remember, to find fault is easy; therefore if you find a fault, also find an answer."

So that citizens may understand the problem faced by the committee, Dr. Whittington released the following information: The following is an outline of a group of impossible situations that we find ourselves. To find the answer is not only our educational challenge, but must deal with public opinion, pride and prejudice, jealousy and hate, emotion, social, economic and financial problems in the face of a falling population. Our problem is not one of too many students, but too few lost in a maze of complex taxing divisions, subdivisions and pride. Our county is the only county in Texas with 19,000 people, 10 high schools and 10 school boards. We have gone through a boom and bust economy and have not yet learned that we must cooperate to survive.

Funds to Build Chapel at State School Sought

There are eight children from Eastland County at Austin State School, a 45-year-old State institution for retarded children. There are more than 2,000 children at the school, and they have come from 198 counties.

There is no house of worship on the grounds and of course it isn't practical to take very many of the children to churches off the campus, according to Mrs. Homer Leonard, secretary of the Volunteer Council.

Three years ago a group of volunteer men, women, and ministers began the work of raising \$150,000 to build a chapel for the children. Only \$25,000 remains to be raised. Contributions have come in from 123 counties, but at \$45 per child, Eastland county is still \$315 short of its quota.

"There may be those among your readers who will want to have a part in doing for these children who cannot do for themselves," Mrs. Leonard said. "Contributions are fully deductible. Monday night the Medics test the Bulldogs and the Comets play the Lions.

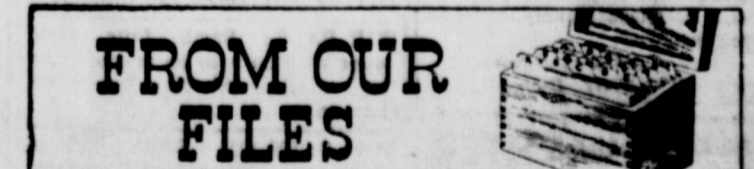

Sgt. Robert Butler, U. S. Army recruiter, said today his service is interested in contacting young men, who are interested in the U. S. Army Military Police Corp. The military policemen must know rules and regulations governing conduct and behavior of military personnel, according to the Sgt.

The military policeman gains complete knowledge of the operation of law enforcement agencies. Farming Becomes More Competitive

The financial position of farmers at the beginning of 1959 was favorable. But now the prospects are less encouraging, reports John McHaney, extension economist. Farm income has dropped substantially from 1958 levels and a further decline is likely in 1960.

Farm assets and equities continued to increase in 1959, but by the lowest percentage since 1955. The rise in farm assets and equities may stop for a time in 1960 or 1961. Also, farm debts rose during 1959 and are likely to increase further in 1960, the economist says.

Even though the farm financial outlook is less favorable, it varies considerably by types of farming and by areas of production.

The outlook for operators of the larger and more productive farms and of those operators who have been able to expand their volume of business is much better than for the operators of smaller and less productive farms.

The production and marketing of agricultural products is becoming more and more competitive between farms and areas of production. Agriculture is becoming more commercialized and specialized with larger investments. This is not only true in agriculture, but also in most businesses outside agriculture, McHaney points out.
