After 36 Years of Teaching Piano Mrs. Taylor Retires

Mrs. A. F. Taylor presented her students in recital in the sanctuary of the First Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 3 and announced her retirement from the teaching profession after 36 years of working with piano students.

Her pupils outdid themselves playing a tribute to their retiring instructor and climaxing a long career in the music profession by playing as if they were professionals themselves.

At the close of the recital Mrs. Taylor announced her retirement from the profession she has loved and enjoyed for 36 years and also announced the establishment of a music scholarship for deserving music majors for the college study of music. The scholarships will be given over a period of 16 years and announced the first winner as Miss Jan Robertson.

Mrs. Taylor presented all range of pupils in Sunday's recital from first-grade students to finished performers who are as adept on the piano as most professionals. Little tikes who couldn't reach the pedals played as if they were born with one hand on a piano keyboard. Advanced students played as if they had performed all of their lives before critical audiences and were as poised about it as if they were running the chromatix.

As an example of the talent displayed at Mrs. Taylor's recital, little Lela Lee played Tchaikovsky's piano concerto so well that if one weren't watching the little lady perform one would have thought a mature professional pianist with many years of piano practice behind was at the keyboard.

The pianists played all sorts of music from western to the classics and back to the semi-popular and ragtime. At times the sanctuary was filled with the brilliant tones of two pianos responding to the agile fingers of four musicians while at other times only one musician performed.

Sunday's recital gave the well pleased audience in the church sanctuary a delightfully admixture of solos, duets, trios and quartets. One duet was a brother and sister team, Marsha Treadwell

and Terry Treadwell, playing under the beaming eye of the proud Dr. and Mrs. Treadwell.

The youngsters gave the audience a demonstration of piano skill that was enjoyable and amazingly good. It made one wonder how such a little fellow could make so much good music come from such a big piano.

The advanced students were simply marvelous, handling their numbers as if they had written them themselves and playing like angels who'd played their harps for an eternity.

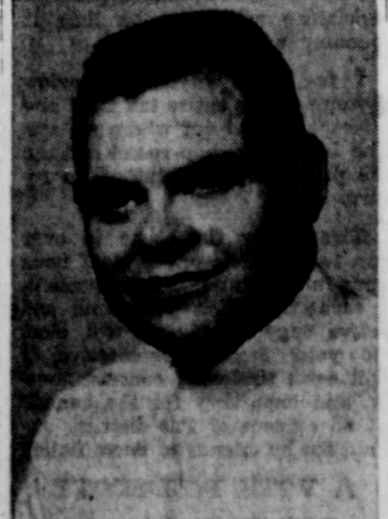

Warden Warns Keep Hands Off Wildlife Young

Leave the babes of the woods in the woods. That's the advice of Captain E. M. Sprott, director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

During the spring season, when the young of wildlife come into the world, they are subject to many predators, not the least of them being persons who think the baby birds or animals are cute.

There is a tendency on the part of children to pick up baby rabbits or baby birds, but grown-ups have their weakness, too. It seems they just cannot pass a little fawn. They'll be driving down the road and spot a baby deer. Chances are that the mother is in hiding in nearby brush, but the fawn-napper doesn't realize this. He gathers up the small animal and takes it home with him.

Bottle fed, the little animals grows up and becomes the family pet, unless someone reports it to the warden beforehand. Then one day the family pet reverts to nature and injures someone. The game warden then is called to take the deer back to the wild.

"If you have reason to believe a mother deer has been killed, then notify the game warden," says Captain Sprott. "Don't try to raise these babies yourself. It is illegal and dangerous."

Texas Electric Extends Study of Harnessing H-Bomb's Great Power

The world's first and largest privately-financed program aimed at harnessing the H-bomb's tremendous power for the generation of electricity has been extended for additional four years, it was announced today by J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Company.

Texas Electric Service Company is a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, composed of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas. Thomas is a director of the Foundation.

The directors voted at their annual meeting in Houston this week to continue their sponsorship of the nuclear research program underway since 1957 at the laboratories of General Dynamics Corporation's General Atomic Division which has as its goal the control of the nuclear fusion reaction for power generation. Nuclear fusion is the process responsible for the energy of the sun and stars, and of the hydrogen bomb.

Other member companies of the research foundation are: Central Power & Light Company, Community Public Service Company, Dallas Power & Light Company, El Paso Electric Company, Gulf States Utilities Company, Houston Lighting & Power Company, Southwestern Electric Power Company, Southwestern Public Service Company, Texas Power & Light Company, and West Texas Utilities Company.

The jointly sponsored research is being conducted at General Atomic's John Jay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure and Applied Science in San Diego, Calif., and includes both theoretical and experimental work in plasma phenomena, directed toward ultimately controlling and sustaining a man-made fusion reaction.

Dr. Frederic de Hoffmann, senior vice president of General Dynamics and president of General Atomic Division, hailed the TAERF decision as "a further impressive demonstration of the vision and vitality of the pioneering spirit in American enterprise, in the best tradition of technological progress."

"General Dynamics is delighted that we are to continue our association in this venture with such a forward-looking group of utilities," he said.

Dr. de Hoffmann said the new experimental facilities now coming into operation result largely from an enlargement of interest in shock wave plasma generation and ionization.

Indicative of the growth of the joint program, he said, is the fact that more than 50 scientists and other technical personnel are now engaged in its theoretical and experimental activities. In addition, the program has access to the talents of more than 1,100 scientists, engineers and others who make up the personnel of the John Jay Hopkins Laboratory. A large at-

omic beam laboratory, because of the nature of its research (the study of atomic scattering phenomena) is closely associated with the controlled fusion program.

The program is under the direction of Dr. Donald W. Kerst, inventor and developer of the betatron nuclear accelerator. Dr. Marshall N. Rosenbluth, internationally known physicist, heads the theoretical research in plasma stability at General Atomic.

PARENTAL CONSENT NEEDED FOR CHILD'S MEDICAL CARE

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid—but only for emergency treatment when a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or

guardians must give it for them. The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for avoiding consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstanding. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.

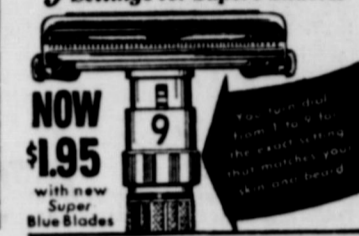

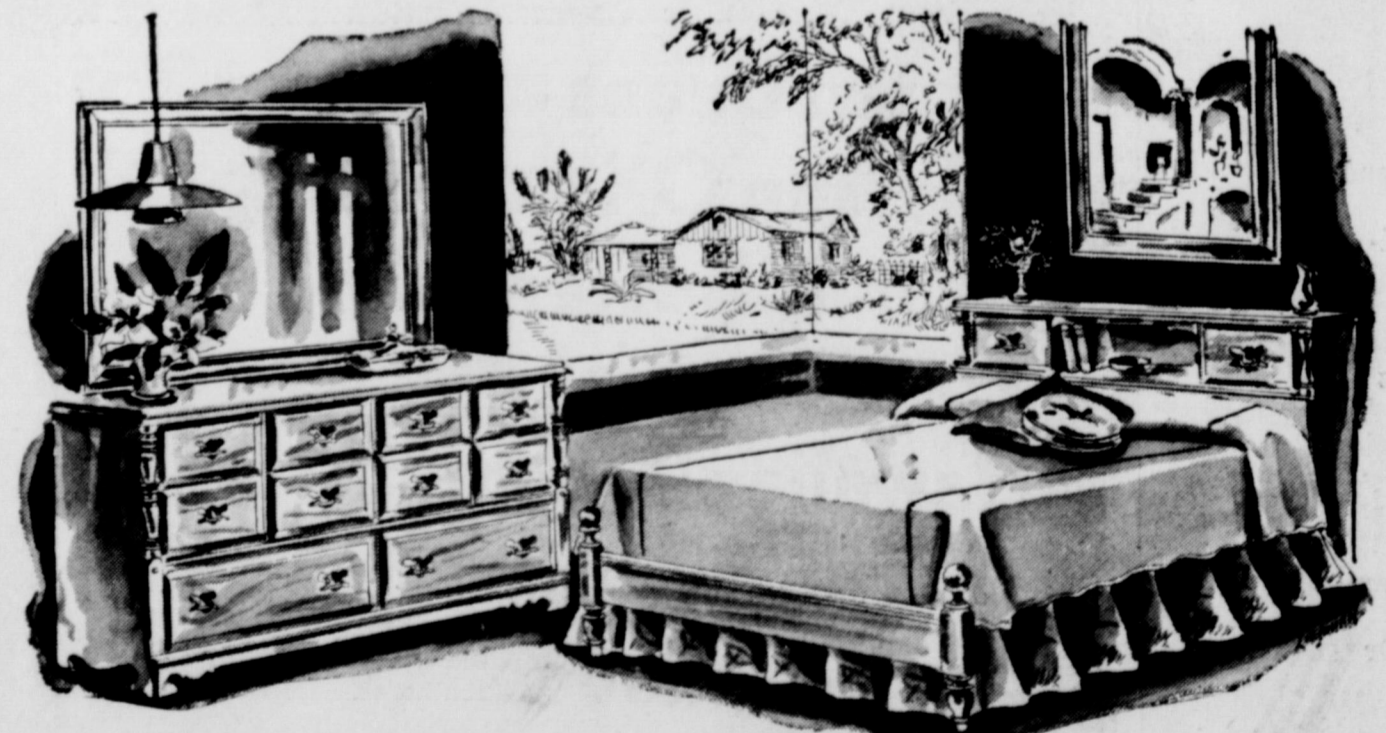

Texas SCS Head Is Honored by Ag Department

The man who heads the high-producing organization of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Texas, Henry N. Smith of Temple, today received the Department of Agriculture's Honor Award for Superior Services. The award was presented in special ceremonies here this afternoon by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson.

Smith was cited "for exceptional leadership in the direction and administration of the Soil Conservation Service program in Texas."

An accompanying account of Smith's achievement as Texas' state conservationist since 1954 revealed that well over half of Texas' farmers and ranchers are actively cooperating with the state's 178 soil conservation districts. More than three of every five of these are working on complete soil and water conservation for their farms and ranches.

Smith began his work with the Soil Conservation Service a quarter-century ago. He had served as the head of the animal husbandry department at Tarleton State College. Before his appointment as state conservationist for Texas, he was chief of operations for the four-state region which was disbanded with the other SCS regions six years ago.

Included in the achievements accredited to Smith is the state's program in the Great Plains Conservation Program and the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Program, both movements administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Texas has nearly 1900 Great Plains Conservation Program plans in effect in the 83 western counties in which the program is operating. This is 43 percent of the total for the entire 10 state area of the Plains. The program provides cost-sharing for complete soil and water conservation on a long range basis.

In the six-year Watershed Protection Program, Texas also has made rapid progress. There are 20 of the projects underway in the state, their objective to give local citizens in small watersheds technical help and cost-sharing to solve water and erosion problems.

The citation of Smith commented also on the Texan's skill in leadership in "the development of staff and line officers into a hard hitting, enthusiastic team" and its influence in producing "initiative and high morale among employees throughout the state Soil Conservation Service organization."

Smith also was commended for his efforts toward continually improving relations with other groups and organizations in agriculture in the state.
