The meeting is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Experiment Station and A & M College and all denominations are invited to participate.

Pratt said the program would include items of interest to rural church leaders including discussions on moral responsibilities, traffic safety, pastoral counseling, cancer research, the changing role of agricultural extension service, and the rural church adjustments needed to meet the changes of rural life.

Jim's been busy the past few days getting out a mailing for the homecoming and, come to think of it, it won't be long before Eastland will again be pulling off one of the largest homecomings ever held.

After it's all said and done next month's homecoming will almost be the result of the work of one man and that's Jim. He's done more to get this home coming off of the ground and into the middle of the race than any fellow I know. And Jim's a result getter too. When he sets out to do something you can mark it down in your little notebook that it won't be long until it's done.

There used to be a saying during the war by some outfits that were especially proud of their units and their accomplishments that they could do anything "but the impossible would take a longer."

I guess I've got the homecoming fever as I'm ready for the next one myself. There ought to be enough old timers here next month to make a fellow do a lot of thinking about the old days about them until memories of Old Rip come to mind.

You know, there are some people who don't think that little frog actually survived 31 years in the cornerstone of the old courthouse. I don't know whether he did or not, but I don't know where you would be able to get one of the little lizards in February, which, if my memory serves me rightly, is the month the cornerstone was opened and Old Rip removed. At the time the cornerstone was opened he was in it.

I was right there, and I don't see how he could have been placed in the thing the night before as a lot of brick had to be taken down from above the cornerstone before it could be opened. That stone didn't open from the face out but only from the top. A brick wall was on top of it until the Saturday afternoon of the official opening.

Whether Old Rip slept in our cornerstone for all of those 30 years or so doesn't make any real difference, the old town certainly got a lot of publicity out of it. It caused a high school debate too.

About the time we opened that old cornerstone the question of course came up at high school assembly one day to rename the Mavericks to the Horned Frogs. The matter was voted on, after a long debate, in assembly and of course it didn't pass.

The man I remember debated for a new name for the Mavericks most sincerely was George Brogdon. George opened up all the oratory stops and made an impassioned plea for our high school to change the name of our athletic teams to conform with the little animal who'd done so much to put Eastland on the map and on the front pages of all the big-time daily newspapers.

As I remember it too the girl opposed more to the change in names than the boys. Most of the boys I remember were willing to go along with the change. But Daphana Grisham, who at that time was one of the yell leaders,

made a strong plea not to change the name of the immortal Mavericks to something else. At that time there was a clause in the old high school song that went something like "and the Maverick stood guard over the Red and Black." Daphana said in her talk to the assembly, "Now wouldn't that sound silly if we changed it to 'and the Horned Frog stood guard over the Red and Black'?"

George Brogdon, however, was equal to the occasion. He suggested the school song could be changed and in rebuttal about some statement someone else had made about no one ever heard of Horned Frogs being used as a symbol for athletic teams George gave a long lecture on the merits of Texas Christian University, which of course calls its athletic teams The Horned Frogs.

Well we tried to rename the Mavericks during my time in the old school atop the hill and didn't make it. I guess it's a good thing we didn't, but at the time it seemed good to me.

Somewhere down the line however we did change the high school song. I don't know what the name of the present song is nor what the words to it are, but I've been listening to a tape recording of the band concert the other night where it was played as the final number. It's a much better song than the thing we used in my time.

A lot of the homecomers probably won't know the present high school song when they hear it during Homecoming, so I guess it might be a pretty good idea to play a tape of it around the square during the Homecoming to let all the boys and girls returning home hear it.

And speaking of bands, this year's Eastland High School Maverick Band is a real good one. This fellow Phil Hewett has done a very good job in his first year in Eastland but don't say too much about it around other school board members until we get him signed for another year. Some other school will be trying to hire him out from under us before we can get the doors of the school open for another term.

And before I forget it, I noticed in the paper the other day where a town up in New England that had been having band concerts by the town band for three-quarters of a century had decided not to have them this year due to lack of attendance.

During the twenties the town's Wednesday night band concerts often drew as many as 10,000 to the town square for an evening's entertainment. That goes to show you how times have changed and how people now spend a lot of time before their television sets, but I wonder if they enjoy life any more than they did in those days.

You can say what you want to, but as for me, I sort of miss the old-fashioned band concerts. At one time some little towns like Eastland boasted as many as six or seven brass bands; they'd have a police band, a fire department band, a kids band, a high school band, a Boy Scout band, and almost all sorts of bands ready to furnish music for any and all occasions.

That's a day that's passed. The Homecoming next month will bring back memories of some of those days of old.
