## IRS Announces Examinations for Taxpayer Agents

## Election Saturday to Decide Five Key Issues

Eastland County voters will return to the polls Saturday and there are several issues they will decide in the second Democratic primary.

There is only one statewide run-off race, but there is also one county race, two precinct run-offs and one district campaign to be settled.

The state race matches incumbent Lloyd Davison against W. T. McDonald for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. McDonald led in Eastland County in the first primary, getting 1,944 votes to 1,733 for Davison, who ran third here. Jim Gomer got 1,888 votes in this county in the first election, and McDonald will probably be favored to lead the ticket again in Eastland County.

The sheriff's race is still drawing key billing here, however. Two good vote getters are matched off in this one. J. B. Williams, seeking re-election, trailed Lee Horn in the first primary. There were four men in the first race and Horn failed to get a majority vote. The first time around Horn got 2,468 votes, Williams polled 1,939, Bill Reid had 754 and Hop White got 758.

Paul Brashear and Scott Bailey are seeking the 76th District state representative's post. Brashear is asking re-election, and he led the first primary in all three counties in the district. In Eastland County his lead was very narrow though. He led Bailey in Eastland County by just 28 votes, getting 2,193 to 2,165. The third candidate in the first primary, Don Kincaid, led 1,713 votes, however, and that means that the race could go either way. Brashear had a good lead in Shackelford and Callahan counties, but the Eastland County vote is considered all-important in this race.

Also at issue Saturday will be two of the county's four county commission seats. In Precinct 1 (Eastland, Ranger and Olden), J. B. (Tip) Arther, the incumbent, faces O. R. (Ott) Ervin. Arther got 1,141 votes in the first primary to Ervin's 744. The run-off was forced by the 566 votes polled by E. W. (Bud) Griffin of Olden.

The other commissioner's race matches Mark Clark and L. J. Collins in the Precinct 3 (Rising Star) race. Clark and Collings

earned run-off positions in a seven man race. The winner will take the seat on the court now held by Bob Carter, who ran fourth in the first primary. Clark led the ticket. Collins barely got his name on the ballot, edging Ervin Hull by one vote after a re-

count of the ballots broke a second place tie.

The polls will open at 8 and close at 7. Voting will be in Eastland, Ranger, Olden, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemonia, Kokomo, Rising Star, Okra, Pioneer, Nimrod, Cisco and Stanton.

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**Planned Decisions Aid Profits**

Extension Farm Management Specialist  
College Station, May—The margin of potential profits from present day farming and ranching is narrow. Sometimes small savings are of tremendous importance. With the trend toward larger volume of business, there are increased risks from lower prices or higher costs.  
For example, a few cents less per hundredweight on 200 steers marketed means a reduction of thousands of dollars in returns. Similar variations on prices will influence profits materially. Not all risks can be avoided, but careful planning may help reduce their impact on profits.  
Individual operators may benefit more from planning by concentrating on their "recurring" and high-cost items. This emphasizes the reduction of per unit costs.  
On crop enterprises, the aim should be to minimize labor costs through the economic use of machinery. Often adverse weather causes costs to increase for weed control, combating insects and for certain harvesting operations. Planning should include alternate methods of handling these practices under adverse conditions.  
Timeliness of many operations often means the differences between a fair crop and a larger one. Also, the unit cost of products is higher with a reduced yield such as often results from poorly timed insect measures, for example.  
For the producer, economical gains or lower unit costs are important. Here again the well planned operation must reduce labor

**Entomologist Is Named by Extension Service**  
Richard L. Ridgway, a native of Brownfield, Terry county, will join the headquarters staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on June 1 as an associate entomologist.  
In making the announcement, Extension Director John E. Hutchison said, the new staff member would work with C. F. Garner on the cotton insect control program and assist county agents with their county entomology programs. He will, however, work in the broad field of entomology including livestock, vegetables and other crops.  
Ridgway was valedictorian of his Brownfield High School class and was an honor graduate of Texas Technological College where he received a B. S. degree in agronomy in 1957. He was a member of Tech's national and international winning senior crops judging team.  
He holds an M. S. degree from Cornell University in economic entomology and is now completing work for his Ph. D. degree from that same university. His doctorate is also in entomology with a minor in plant pathology.

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MANY LARGE STRONG TOMATO PLANTS  
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needs. Full use should be made of mechanical feeding and automatic devices which reduce costs.  
A small reduction in important production items may bring sizeable savings in total annual costs resulting in more profit. For example, feed costs comprise about 75 percent of the outlay for pork production. Thus, a small saving of \$4 per ton on the ration needed for 500 market hogs would total almost \$1,000. Similarly, the use of feeders designed to avoid waste can reduce costs because of the cumulative saving.  
Other considerations which involve planning in livestock operations may include: carefully scheduled breeding to fit market demands; shortening or prolonging feeding periods as justified by changes in feed-price ratios; and contracting for delivery of commodities at a pre-determined price. This may include feed items to be purchased as well as the animals to be marketed.  
In short, no business requires more careful study and management than does farming and ranching. The carefully planned operation should net a wider margin of profit.

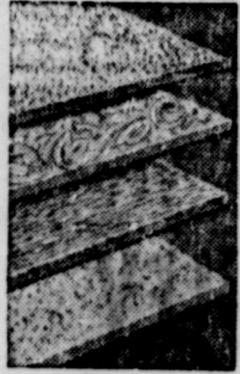

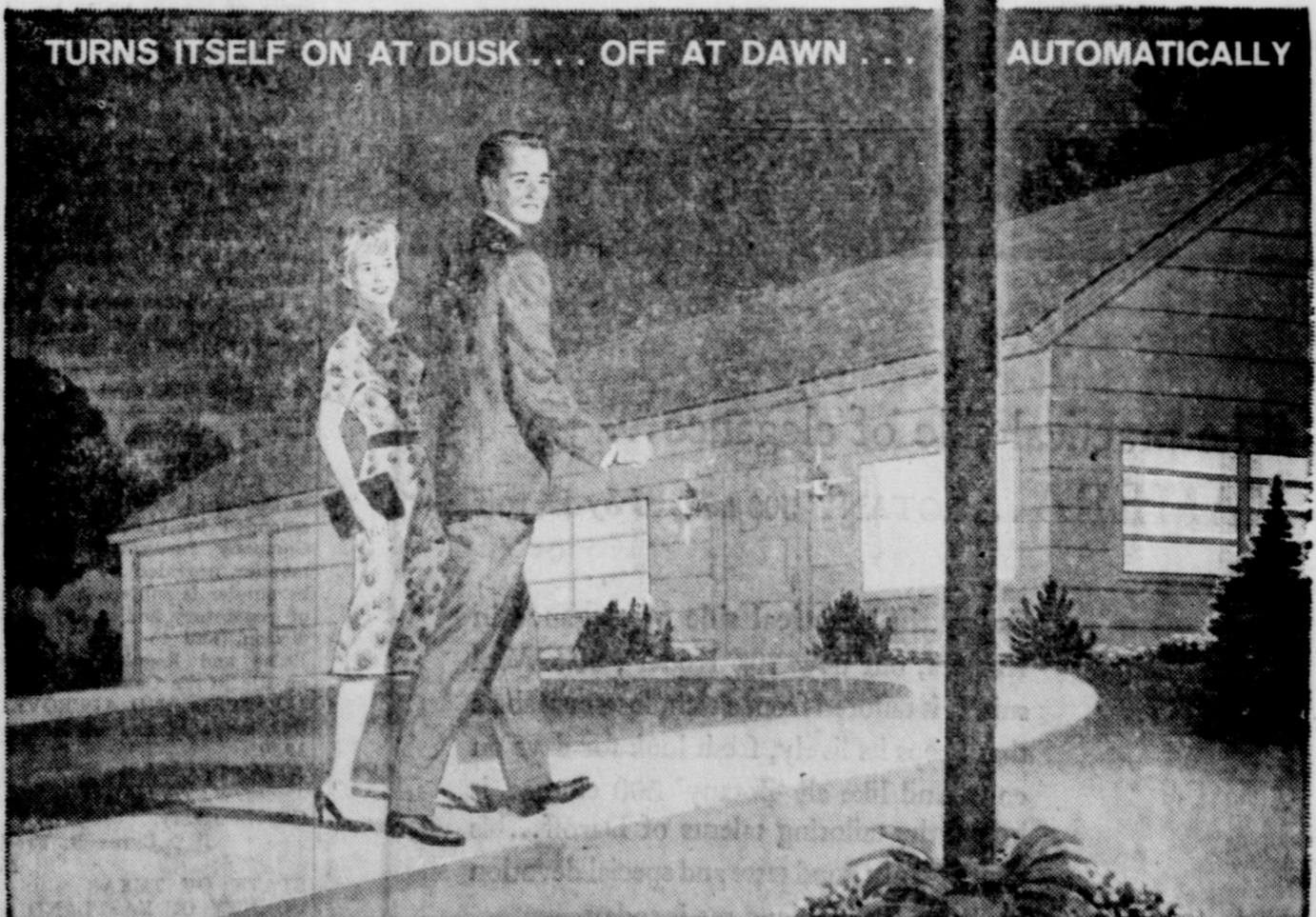

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS AND NATURAL GAS SERVICE TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF EASTLAND, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND:  
SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of May, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of EASTLAND by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:  
Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.00  
First 600 Cu. Ft. @ \$.1760 per CCF Gross; \$.1584 per CCF net.  
All Over 600 Cu. Ft. .8433 per MCF Gross; .7590 per MCF net.  
Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove.  
The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

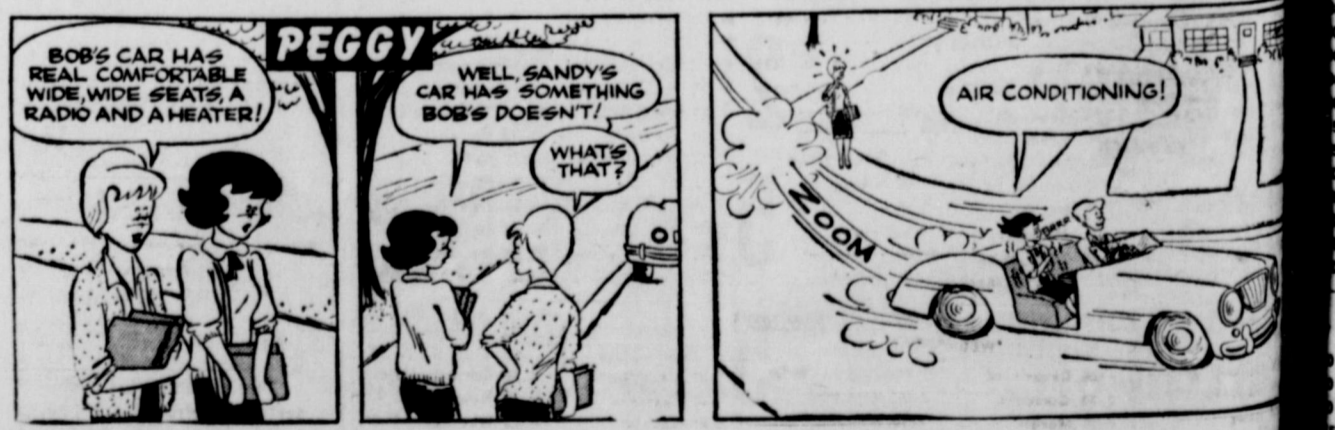
