



OF EASTLAND: SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of May, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city of EASTLAND by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as

Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.00 First 600 Cu. Ft. @ \$.1760 per CCF Gross; \$.1584 per CCF net. All Over 600 Cu, Ft. .8433 per MCF Gross; .7590 per MCF net. Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove. The above rate is applicable to

each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.
