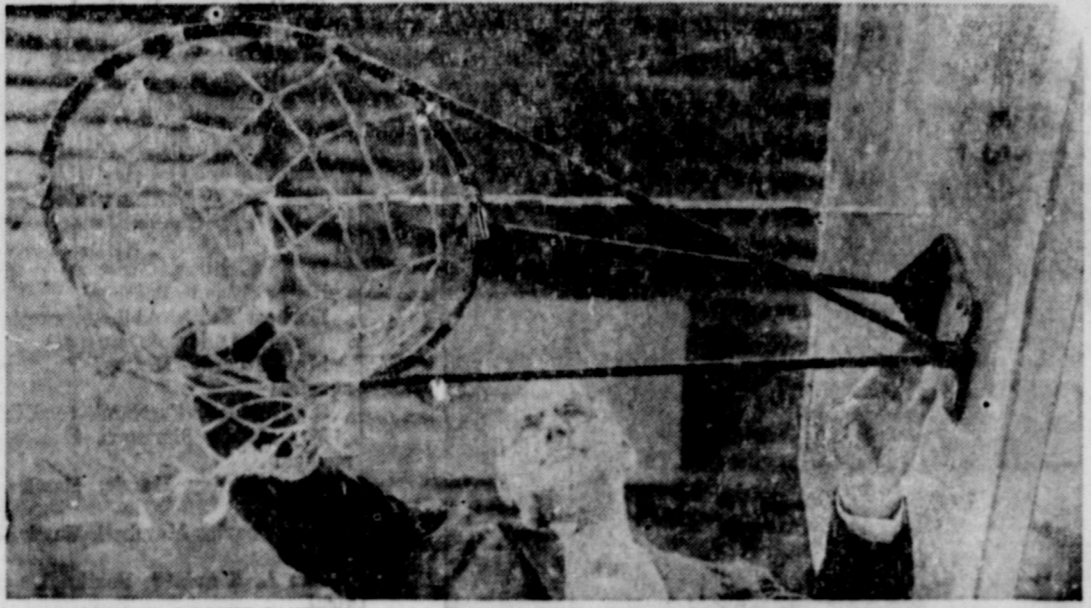

The money sought will move the project into actual construction, even though it is only a small percent of the \$18,000,000 required to build the 13,450-foot dam.

The other race matches Judge Lloyd Davidson of Travis County against W. T. McDonald of Brazos County for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Eastland citizens favored Jim Bowmer in the first primary and will have to find themselves a new leader this time.

School's Out! Teachers Let The Monkeys Out

When we were kids—and it was after the demise of the cigar-store Indian and the horse-drawn carriage, despite what our children may think—this was a pretty exciting time of year. It still is.

Schools across the nation have thrown open their doors for summer vacation. When we were kids, the cry was: "School's out! School's out! Teacher's let the monkey's out!" Wouldn't it be a bit surprised if kids today were saying the same darn thing?

Time for school to let out for summer—a time when kids can indulge in what one writer refers to as "the birthright of every child": having fun. The summer months will be jam-packed with unbelievable amounts of fun—swimming, walking, playing, biking, climbing, running, jumping, and, for some of the older boys and girls, driving a car.

Summer, for kids, is the roaming season. It's a time of freedom. It's also a time of tragedy—tragedy from accidents. The big killer in June-July-August to school-age children is drownings. This information comes from the National Safety Council, a non-governmental agency founded in 1913 to prevent all kinds of accidents—home, farm, work, public, traffic and school.

According to the Council, which has its headquarters in Chicago, no exact figure are available on what injuries befall children in summer. Cuts and bruises are probably high on the list, we'd suspect.

To try to list even a fraction of the safety tips that come to mind to prevent summertime accidents and injuries would be an impossible task, and would fill much more space than we have here.

Because the National Safety Council tells us that drownings, in all probability, will be the No. 1 death-dealer to our children during the next few months, we think a few words of advice on that subject are warranted here. The Council says children should, naturally, be in condition to swim, that they should never swim alone, and that
