Farm Bureau To Sponsor Mexico Trip

Plans have been completed for an 11-day Texas Farm Bureau Goodwill Tour to Mexico July 14-24, according to an announcement by J. H. West, president of the state farm organization.

Included in the tour will be visits to places of agricultural interest, sight-seeing in and around Mexico City (including a bull-fight), visits to the Floating Gardens of Xochimilco, the fabulous mountainside spa of San Jose Purun, the Pacific resort of Acapulco, plus stop-overs in quaint and historic towns such as Taxco, Cuernavaca and Morelia.

The Texans will fly to Mexico City July 14 and return to Texas by air on July 24. Touring in Mexico will be by either automobiles or air-conditioned motor coaches. Most of the land tour will be in the cool and scenic mountains and valleys of Mexico.

A royal welcome can be expected in Mexico for those who sign up for the tour. Sr. Julian Rodriguez Adame, Minister of Agriculture of Mexico, has extended, through West, an official invitation to Texas Farm Bureau members to visit Mexico this summer.

Voters Throw Most 'In's' Out In Eastland County

Eastland County voters turned out strong Saturday and helped throw out three incumbents and narrowly re-elected a fourth. A total of 5,212 persons participated in the election.

Voters named Lee Horn as sheriff and Scott Bailey as state representative. In the only state race they handed W. T. McDonald of Brazos County a good lead, and McDonald went on to unseat Judge Lloyd Davidson in the Court of Criminal Appeals race statewide.

Percentages in Eastland County voted heavier than any county in this area. Two county commissioners races probably had a lot to do with the vote.

In Precinct 1, Eastland, Ranger and Olden voters favored J. B. (Tip) Arther over O. R. (Ott) Ervin. In re-electing Arther by a scant majority, voters stuck to a hometown attitude. Arther had 1,082 votes to Ervin's 1,958. Eastland voters heavily favored Arther, giving him an 87-318 margin. Ranger voters, on the other hand, went for Ervin, 662-120. Olden voters didn't show any partiality. They split even, giving 69 votes to each man. The absentee vote showed 22 for the winner and 18 for Ervin.

The Precinct 3 (Rising Star) commissioner's race wasn't quite as close. L. J. (Buck) Collins won the race, getting 485 votes to Mark (Mutt) Clark's 356 votes. Rising Star voters favored Collins 404-258 and Pioneer went for the winner 44-28. Okra gave Clark a 29-21 margin and Nimrod went for Clark 36-13.

The sheriff's race, which was probably the biggest key to the big turnout, saw Horn win by a surprisingly big margin. He carried all but two small precincts in defeating the incumbent, J. B. Williams, by a margin of 3,298 to 1,923.

### West Indies Barbecue Sauce Glazes Broiler-Fryers



Broiler-fryer chickens broiled over an outdoor grill have new taste wonder when glazed with a West Indies barbecue sauce. The ingredients for the shining, sweet-yet-nippy barbecue sauce are found on every pantry shelf . . . unsulphured molasses, vinegar, corn oil, Worcestershire and Tabasco. The sweet molasses gives color and flavor to the sauce, blends easily with the other ingredients, and gives a golden glaze to the plump and juicy broilers.

**West Indies Barbecue Sauce**  
1/4 cup lemon juice or vinegar  
2 tablespoons corn oil  
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup prepared mustard  
1/2 cup unsulphured molasses  
1/2 teaspoon Tabasco  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Wash and dry chicken. Sprinkle each chicken with one teaspoon monosodium glutamate. Place chicken, skin side up, on grate set 12 inches or more from heat. Combine mustard and molasses; stir in remaining ingredients. Brush chicken with barbecue sauce. Cook slowly until tender, turning frequently and basting each time. (Total cooking time: 1 hour to 1 hour, 15 minutes.)  
Yield: 8 to 26 servings, depending on weight of broiler-fryer chicken.

### Bagworm Control Time is here

Bagworms are or soon will be active in all parts of the State. The time to obtain a good control of these pests is when they are young, as chemicals applied after the worms are grown give no control, says James Hawkns, assistant extension entomologist of College Station.

After hatching the larvae immediately start to feed on the foliage of ornamental plants. The young worms spin a silken bag about themselves and as they feed attach bits of foliage to this bag. The worms carry this bag with them as they move about. When the worms are grown, this bag is one and a half to two inches long and affords the worm almost complete protection.

In September the female worm deposits her eggs in the bag and then dies. The bags should be picked from infested plants and burned because the eggs for next season's worms go through the winter inside the bags.

Hawkns recommends 10 percent toxaphene or 4 percent malathion dust as a control. Lead arsenate, toxaphene or malathion spray can also be used. Remember, the entomologist concludes, these chemicals are effective only if used when the worms are young.

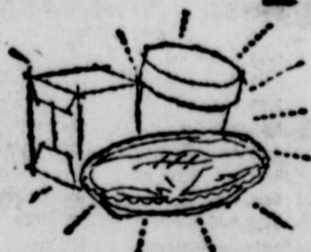

Always disconnect spark plug wire before working on the blade. A clean sharp blade does a better cutting job and requires less power.

Never operate mower with safety shields removed.

Make sure all rocks and debris are removed from the area before close mowing.

Do not refill the gasoline tank when engine is hot or running.

Run mower as slow as possible to do good work.

Keep children and pets away from mowers.

Always be certain of your footing when mowing on steep slopes. Never leave engine running when mower is unattended.

Make sure mower is steady and under control before starting engine.

Always be aware of the hazards involved when you are using a power mower. Don't get caught napping.

**Deadline Nears For WWII Vets Loan Applications**

Less than two months remain in which World War II veterans may apply for GI home, farm or business loans, Mr. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas warned today.

Under present law, July 25, 1960, is the cut-off date set for World War II veteran participation in the post-war program that has seen more than 5 million World War II veterans take advantage of the GI Bill loan provisions.

Veterans who submit their applications on or before the deadline or July 25, 1960, will be allowed an additional year, or until July 25, 1961, in which to have the loan processed and actually closed.

Mr. Onstot pointed out that these dates do not apply to Korean conflict veterans who have until January 31, 1965, to make loan applications. World War II veterans who also served during the Korean conflict are considered Korean veterans for the purpose of GI loans.

Although several bills to extend the loan period for World War II veterans have been introduced into Congress, outcome of this legislation is unpredictable, and veterans should consider the nearing cut-off date in their plans, Mr. Onstot said.
