Applications and instructions for applying may be obtained from Gilreath's office or from the county agricultural agent.

Under the free classing service, organized growers learn the grade and staple of each bale of cotton they produce. Through market news they learn what cotton is selling for. These two services put them in better bargaining positon when they sell their cotton.

More than 13.7 million bales of cotton, about 95 percent of the 1959 crop, were classed under the Smith-Doxey program last year. sed for any crop since the service became available in 1938.






