## Gas, Electric Rates Postponed

Gas and electric utility rate increase ordinances have been postponed temporarily as the result of a five-and-a-half hour City Commission meeting this week.

The Commission postponed action on electric rates for a

month, until the October meeting, and until later this week, action on second reading of the Lone Star Gas Co. request for a gate rate (not deficiency) increase.

In other important action the commission gave tentative ap-

proval to cooperate with the Comanche Trail Scout Council in developing Ringling Lake as a short-term Scout Camp Ground, on a request by Council Committeeman Mike Collins.

Commissioners Mike Siebert, Charles Marshall, and Bill Hoffmann were present with Chairman H.V. O'Brien presiding.

Some additional data regarding Lone Star Gas Co.'s payment of gross franchise tax was asked for from District Manager Wilbur Simmell, and it was agreed that the commission would meet later this week when Commissioner Dale Baker could be present to give consideration to the second reading of the Lone Star request, which would go into effect 30 days after the final reading approval. The Texas Electric rate increase is pegged to be effective, when passed, beginning with bills mailed on and after Jan. 1, 1976. (Two readings are required.)

Prior to getting into the utility rate discussions, Commissioners were advised by Chairman O'Brien that Lakeside Golf Club Manager Ralph Cain had authorized him to report that he (Mr. Cain) was willing to agree to the Commission request regarding the lease of the club facilities and an acre of city land upon which he will put a home, near the club, to help cut down on vandalism there.

Earlier the commission agreed on a 25-year lease of the club, and a lease of the acre of land with the condition that the additional acre lease would be in effect only for so long as Mr. Cain operated the club. Mr. Cain had preferred that the two leases be handled separately, but the Commission felt that it could only justify the lease of the home site only as it was connected to the operation of the city-owned golf club. Mr. Cain and Commissioner Siebert were to work out final details of the lease agreement.

Mr. Simmell then appeared asking second reading on the Lone Star request which asks that the city gate rate charge be changed from 94.19 cents to \$1.0399 per thousand cubic feet. If approved the gas rate would set the local costs at \$3.1277 gross, \$2.8149 net (bills paid on time) for the first 1,000 cubic feet; \$1,8499 per MCF gross on each next 3,000 cubic feet; \$1,7388 MCF gross on the next 6,000; \$1,6499 gross on the next 15,000; \$1,5943 gross on the next 75,000; \$1,5610 gross for the next 100,000.

Mr. Simmell was asked about gas costs and he explained that Lone Star pays an average of 72 cents a thousand system-wide and about 23 cents a thousand in Eastland County, producing some two and a half to three billion cubic feet a year. Commissioner Hoffmann stated that the local gas appears to be

bought cheap and sold back high. Mr. Simmell explained that the company must consider its customer, throughout its system.

Commissioner Marshall asked if an extension of time were possible and Simmell explained that since it is a gate rate adjustment, the company needs the increase now to keep from absorbing the increased costs.

Commissioners asked about a difference between revenue shown on the rate increase document and the report of the company's franchise tax payment. Mr. Simmell explained that the would get the exact data on the number of customers on which the company does not pay the franchise tax. (Utilities are permitted by law to exempt payment on certain industry and governmental agencies and some companies pay on these and some do not.)

Commissioner Hoffmann entered a motion which passed, to table the matter until later in the week when all commissioners were present.

Eastland Division Manager Frank Sayre and Doyle Maxwell of Texas Electric Service Co. next appeared asking for a rate increase of 6.8 percent (nine percent company wide), to be effective on Jan. 1 billing. Mr. Sayre explained, with charts, how the company needs to stay abreast of generating capacity in order to deliver low-cost electricity in the future. He showed that rates here are much lower than most places and the company is able to do this due to the fact that certain important fuel purchases and plans were made several years ago. The company is presently building new plants (including nuclear and lignite) and will spend five million in the next three years to provide electricity in the future. The company would realize 6.39 percent return on the new rate, Mr. Sayre explained. Consumption is increasing by about seven percent a year, he said.

Commissioner Siebert entered a motion, which passed, to table the increase reading until the next regular meeting. Mike Collins presented a map showing proposals for development of Ringling Lake for a short-term Scouting camp and the Commission agreed to cooperate with the Scout Council in developing the Camp. Details are to be worked out and formally approved at a later date. There's about 330 acres of land at the lake north of town.

Commissioners agreed to inspect a lot on West Patterson which a citizen has requested permission to purchase. A proposed ordinance to prohibit the drinking of intoxicants on public property was tabled for further study.

The Commission terminated its tax equalization board status and agreed to begin in March next year seeking to equalize taxes on the city rolls.

In other action the commissioners discussed parking violations, water tower repair, a Moody Foundation grant request for city park renovation the planning board.

### Special Film Presentation To Members Of Lions Club

The Department of Agriculture's stand on the presently controversial exporting of food commodities was presented in a special film presentation to members of the Eastland Lions Club at noon Tuesday.

Eastland County ASCS - Manager David Martin was program chairman and introduced the finely produced sound-slide exhibit on the advantages of exporting. The film showed that there are some half million industrial jobs directly and thousands of others, indirectly connected to the production of agricultural equipment and supplies. So, USDA holds that agricultural production creates jobs in many fields. Another important point brought out is that this nation's balance of trade is improved through food exports.

On the topic of food to needy countries, it was pointed out that the USA provides 3/4 of all foods that go to such developing nations, and the current slogan is "aid turns to trade", as the nations develop and become purchasers.

What about food prices at home? The film showed that there is plenty left at home, and in fact that current production is only from one of every four

harvestable acres in this nation. President Ray Pryor presided and guests included Lions Chambliss, Kirk and Stark, all of Cisco. Don Martin has the program next week.

The club voted a thanks to the club's food committee and to Chi-Chi Restaurant Manager Bob Chellette for the excellent meal served at the luncheon.

**Food News**

COLLEGE STATION - Canned green beans may be the main attraction at grocery stores across the state this week.

One authority says they're plentiful and have very low prices.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, also termed carrots one of the better vegetable values currently.

Other vegetable "reasonables" are cabbage, corn, cucumbers and soft-shell squash.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Fruit-counter "best" features include prunes, plums and grapes--along with bananas, cantaloupes and watermelons.

"New crop apples are a bit more plentiful, and some are offered at more attractive prices," the specialist says.

At meat departments, heavy-beef specials appear on chuck cuts, round steaks, ground beef and liver--while lightweight beef specials include chops and roasts.

"Fryer chicken prices are somewhat higher, though they still compare favorably with other protein food prices--but turkey prices are tempting," Mrs. Clyatt said.

She also termed low-fat milk, yogurt and cheeses prices as "non budget wrecking."

AUSTIN — A big state land trade has been proposed to obtain a scenic new park on 30-mile-long Matagorda Island.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong suggested the swap of 18,000 acres of state-owned land near Fort Bliss in El Paso County for the federally-owned share of the island.

A joint House-Senate committee unanimously decided the state should own the island which lies south of Port Lavaca.

The U. S. Air Force has decided it will not continue use of Matagorda as a bombing range, but the U. S. Interior Department wants it as additional refuge for the whooping crane.

Armstrong said Matagorda offers among the best sports fishing and hunting in the country, and it is within easy auto range of Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi citizens.

Matagorda's beach is growing rather than expanding, the committee was told.

Federal holdings on the island total nearly 19,000 acres. The state owns 16,369 acres and private interests 15,570 acres.

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Pearce Johnson questioned wisdom of the trade, however.

Rates Set

The State Insurance Board has set medical malpractice rates in the state's assigned risk pool 40 per cent lower than the industry asked for. Doctors insured through the risk-sharing pool will pay 18 to 20 per cent more than the highest rates charged by companies writing insurance voluntarily.

New rates for the Texas Medical Liability Insurance Underwriting Association (JUA) will cover physicians, surgeons, hospitals, podiatrists and nurse anesthetists who cannot obtain profession insurance on the open market.

The Board asked JUA to re-submit its rate filings, terming those first submitted excessive.

Base premiums for \$100,000/\$300,000 limits for non-surgical physicians in Harris County were set at \$1,800 and at \$1,200 for the same class of physicians in the rest of the state.

Rates were adopted for more than 30 classes of

physicians and surgeons including doctors normally classified as "high risks." Neurosurgeons and orthopedic surgeons will pay highest premiums—\$14,000 in Harris County and \$9,600 in the rest of the state. Harris County plastic surgeons will pay \$10,800, those in other areas \$7,200.

Hospital rates are \$420 per bed plus \$42 for ever 100 out-patient visits.

**Constitution Aired**

Secretary of State Mark White announced a program to encourage voter registration for the November 4 constitutional revision election.

White also said an all-out effort will be launched to encourage voters to study the proposed document.

Proponents and opponents of revision will outline their views at a conference sponsored by Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters here Sept. 19

**AG Opinions**

Texas Department of Public Safety may provide criminal history information to the State Bar of Texas and Department of Public Welfare to assist in licensing responsibilities, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:  
• Texas Student Publications at The University of Texas is no longer a legal entity and cannot hire an attorney without regents' approval.

• Temporary and part-time state employees accrue sick leave, but leave for the part-timers is acquired on a proportionate basis.

• The Employees Retirement System of Texas may grant credit for service as a county attorney to a qualified member of the System.

• The Teacher Retirement System can purchase insurance for liability under the Texas Tort Claims Act. Insurance for the System's building, contents and papers may also be purchased, but workmen's compensation coverage may not be.

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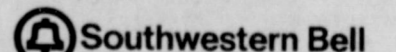

Asked if there would be an increase in sonic booms, Col. Vaughn said that there will not be, because the plane will not be flying that fast or that low. "About the only noticeable change will be an increase in aircraft activity over Eastland County," he said.

An eight-man crew is here now installing the initial trailer-bound equipment, and Col. Vaughn indicated that at some point, when the installation is complete, perhaps an open house could be held.

**New Law On Child Care Effective January 1**

It has been said of this nation's bicentennial celebration that "Birthdays are for Kids" and Texas has a special present for her children. On January 1, 1976, a new licensing law becomes effective. This new

law updates and revises the now existing law which requires all child care facilities to be license.

The new law requires a license for everyone caring for unrelated children outside that child's own home on a regular basis. The law provides for licensing and regulations under the supervision of the Texas State Department of Public Welfare. The Department of Public Welfare is given authority to develop reasonable policies and standards for each type of child care provided. The categories of child care are set up on the basis of around-the-clock care or part day care for children under the age of 18. These two categories are further broken down by the number of children in care. The State's Licensing Law

provides for consultation, regulation and visitation by a representative of the Welfare Department.

It is this individual's job to provide information and regulatory assistance as well as certification that minimum standards are met and issuance of a license.

It now becomes essential that the people of Eastland County know of the newest protection for the children of Texas. Those refusing to apply to be licensed, or those who falsely advertise will be subject to fine.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S.J.R. NO. 11)  
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present deduction of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VII, Section 9, which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county officers are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

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The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

**PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the MODE OF AMENDING PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

**PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 7 is adopted, the article will be Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "A BUSHEL FOR A BARRELL" HAS A VERY great appeal and sounds simple and practical. OUR OIL COMPANIES ARE PAYING EXORBITANT PRICES TO THE oil exporting countries for about a third of our needs. This, of course, means higher prices for the consuming public.

WE HAVE JUST EXPERIENCED A BUMPER GRAIN CROP. Corn production in the Midwest looks better than a few weeks ago. We need to sell two-thirds of our grain supply to foreign purchasers. We can dispose of two-thirds and still have a carry-over greater than last year. Unless sales of this approximate amount are made, grain prices to producers will be severely depressed and planting for next year is almost certain to be greatly reduced.

FOR THE STANDPOINT OF THE CONSUMERS\* PURE ARITHMETIC indicates that if sales of grain of the magnitude needed are made, the price of a loaf of bread should not increase more than a little more than 1 cent. Should acreage be curtailed for the next crop year

because of over-supply, a good excuse would exist for increased prices to the consumer.

If this makes a case for the need to dispose of our surplus grains, how can we go about making a swap for oil or other resources in which we are in short supply? As said in the beginning, it appears to be a simple proposition. There are, however, some problems with it. Our grain dealers trade with the Russians as private businessmen, where the Russians buy or sell through Government agencies. Canada has a central board which sells its wheat after purchasing from the producers. To put our Government in the business of dealing on a country to country basis would be a considerable deviation from our system. On a barter exchange, it would also have the effect of putting the Government into the oil importing business and then selling to the oil companies for refining and distribution. There may be a way to overcome these basic problems and it might be well that we look at the Canadian system for a possible way out.

LEGISLATION HAS BEEN INTRODUCED IN THE CONGRESS TO MAKE THE COMMODITY CREDIT CORPORATION the sole marketing agency for the sale of U.S. grains and soybeans. This would mean country by country dealings. The legislation does not address

imported oil once a trade was made.

WE HAVE THE MEANS OF ANSWERING THE OPEC CARTEL with our dominance of world food supply. It looks ridiculous that we should keep paying exorbitant prices for foreign oil while selling wheat to the same countries at bargain price. If these tangible commodities were exchanged on a comparable horse-trading basis, the problem of fluctuating currencies would also be resolved. Longer term arrangements could also be put into effect, making markets more secure over a period of time and avoiding high demands in one period and no demand in another.

BY REASON OF THE DIFFERENT GOVERNMENTAL SYSTEMS involved, some real sticky problems exist but the matter should be pursued to determine if answers can be found for a barter method.

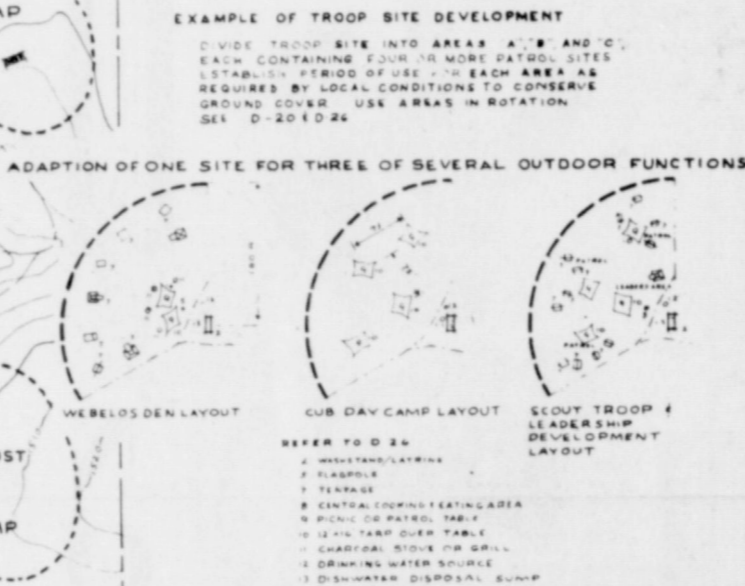
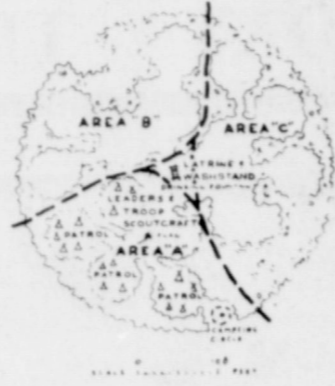
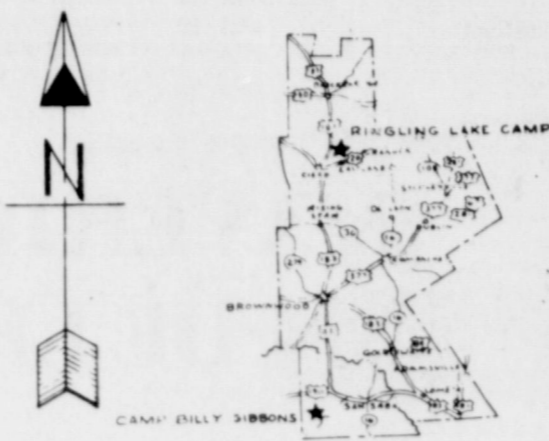
