COUNTY BAR OPPOSES CONSTITUTION

A RESOLUTION OF THE MEMBERS OF THE EALTALND COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION DECLARING ITS UNAMIOUS OPPOSITION TO THE PROPOSED NEW TEXAS CON-DV THE LEGISLA STATE OF TEXAS IN 1975, AND RECOMMENDING THAT THE VOTERS OF THIS COUNTY AND STATE VOTE AGAINST THE ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTION.

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Texas has proposed a new constitution and the citizens of Texas have an opportunity to vote for or against its adoption on November 4, 1975; and,

WHEREAS, the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas sitting as a Legislature, in very rapid order brought out this proposed constitution which they could or would not do sitting as a constitutional convention; and,

WHEREAS, the State Comptroller has warned that the financing of this proposed constitution could break the backs of the taxpayers of Texss in that the cost estimates are upward from over one billion dollars (\$1,000,000,000.00) with many additional costs being hidden and undeterminable; and,

WHEREAS, this proposed constitution will create uncertainty in the taxation laws for the schools, cities, counties, and State in its provisions for the executive and judicial branches of the sState of Texas by setting the stage for expensive and time - consuming lawsuits to determine and interpret the proposed constitution's new and revolutionary concepts of government; and,

WHEREAS, section after section of this proposed constitution provides a basis for an erosion of individual rights and the expansion of state and local government into activities shich either have been prohibited by the present Texas Constitution or not

WHEREAS, this proposed constitution contains at least six (6) provisions which were previously submitted to the voters of Texas as constitutional amendments and which were defeated by the voters at the polls; and, WHEREAS, this proposed constitution is a permissive donstitution for the Legislature rather than the people in that it creates and delegates unlimited power and authority to the Legislature, provides for annual legislative sessions at the expense of the taxpayers, and allows the members of the Legislature to have their salaries and expenses determined by a Salary Commission, a body which will not be accountable to the people of Texas;

NOW: THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE EASTLAND COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION:

SECTION 1: That we beleive this proposed constitution, which has already cost the taxpayers of Texas millions of dollars, will not only legally cloud many of the provisions regarding the basic rights of the itizens of Texas but will set off lawsuits and court rulings for years to come, that it will result in higher taxes, and that it will eventually result in more governmental control at the sole expense of the citizens of Texas

SECTION 2: That we beleive the citizens of this County and State are becoming more aware of and concerned about the ever increasing bureaucratic powers in our state and dederal governments unto themselves at every opportunity.

SECTION 3: That we are unanimously opposed to this proposed new constitution for the State of Texas, and we would recommend to the voters of this County and State that they seriously consider their decisions and urge them to vote against the adoption of the proposed constitution on November 4, 1975.

ADOPTED by unamious vote of the members of the Eastland County Bar Association, at a regular meeting in Eastland, Texas on

Commissioner Hoffmann entered a motion which passed, to table the matter until later in the week when all commissioners were present.

Eastland Division Manager Frank Sayre and Doyle Maxwell of Texas Electric Service Co. next appeared asking for a rate increase of 6.8 percent (nine percent company wide). to be effective on Jan. 1 billing. Mr. Sayre explained, with charts, how the company needs to stay abreast of generating capacity in order to deliver low-cost electricity in the future. He showed that rates here are much lower than most places and the company is able to do this due to the fact that certain important fuel purchases and plans were made several years igo. The company is presently building new plants (including nuclear and lignite) and will spend five million in the next three years to provide electricity in the future. The company would realize 6.39 percent return on the new rate, Mr. Savre explained. Consumption is increasing by about seven

percent a year, he said. Commissioner Siebert entered a motion, which passed, to table the increase reading

He had been a resident of Eastland County since 1918. He was an independent oil operator for the past 15 years.


Mr. Griffin was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Kernes and a deacon of Olden First Baptist Church since 1938.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong suggested the swap of 18,000 acres of state-owned land near Fort Bliss in El Paso County for the federally-owned share of the island.

A joint House-Senate committee unanimously decided the state should own the island which lies south of Port Lavaca.

Matagorda's beach is growing rather than expanding, the committee was told.

Rates Set

The State Insurance Board has set medical malpractice rates in the state's assigned risk pool 40 per cent lower than the industry asked for. Doctors insured through the risk-sharing pool will pay 18 to 20 per cent more than the highest rates charged by companies writing insurance voluntarily.

New rates for the Texas Medical Liability Insurance Underwriting Association (JUA) will cover physicians, surgeons, hospitals, podiatrists and nurse anesthetists who cannot obtain profession insurance on the open market.

The Board asked JUA to re-submit its rate filings, terming those first submitted excessive.

Base premiums for \$100,000/\$300,000 limits for non-surgical physicians in Harris County were set at \$1,800 and at \$1,200 for the same class of physicians in the rest of the state.

Neurosurgeons and orthopedic surgeons will pay highest premiums— \$14,000 in Harris County and \$9,600 in the rest of the state. Harris County plastic surgeons will pay \$10,800, those in other areas \$7,200.

per bed plus \$42 for ever 100 out-patient visits.

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



PUBLIC NOTICE OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

BLOCK

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly at-tached to either of the

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The ar ticle provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in evennumbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of threefifths of the membership of each house. The legis lature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular

Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

New Law On Child Care Effective January 1

license for everyone caring for unrelated children outside that child's own home on a regular basis. The law provides for licensing and regulations under the supervision of the Texas State Department of Public Welfare. The Department of Public Welfare is given authority to develop reasonable policies and standards for each type of child care provided. The categories of child care are set up on the basis of arount - the clock care or pary day care for children under the age of 18. These two categories are further broken down by the

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Gov-

ernment, is amended to: Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create addi-tional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business at more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibi-tion or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lot-teries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and

The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may in-crease this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, nonprofit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a major-ity of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption.
