## Circus to Make One Day Stand Here Nov. 2

The largest tented circus in the United States has scheduled a one day engagement in Eastland at the Homer Williams field just west of the city limits on Highway 80.

Date for the circus to be in Eastland is Wednesday, Nov. 2. There will be an afternoon and night performance. The circus is the Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. show.

The show's advertising cars, comprising six motorized units with a crew of 28 advertising and publicity men, is to arrive in Eastland soon.

This will mark the first appearance of a big circus in Eastland in seven years. # Joe Depends Full Measure In Bottle

This is one week that I'm having to walk on a tight rope. A fellow doesn't realize what a wonderful thing the American automobile has become until he has to do without one for a little while. This week my car's in the shop and I had to ride the bus to Fort Worth. First stop out of the box the bus was 30 minutes late, so that didn't leave a very pleasant taste in my mouth. Of course the bus station was closed when I went to catch the 7:58 p.m. to Fort Worth, so the only place to wait until 8:30 for the 7:58 was on the sidewalk.

There may be some things rougher than a bus ride but I don't know what it is. In my opinion the bus makers made a mistake in putting the buses so high off the ground. They sway so much that the additional height only serves to increase the width of the sway, which to me is an awful nuisance.

And this week I also made another startling discovery. I'm in favor of the return of the glass milkbottle. Milk keeps better in the refrigerator better in glass than it does in paper. Actually, it seems to my taste that after milk is stored in these paper bottles all the bottlers use these days it sort of takes on some of the taste of paper. I guess this is natural and there is nothing that can be done about it.

I figured out that the way to get around this problem was to store milk in glass bottles before placing them in the refrigerator. To my surprise I found out that the milk bottles aren't giving full measure. Every quart of milk I've tested in this manner has been at least two ounces, and sometimes more, short to the quart. In other words, a quart of milk these days isn't a quart of milk.

One brand of milk is consistently shorter than another brand and the one that gives the best measure is consistent in that it always has more milk in a paper quart bottle than any of its competitors.

Most of us can well remember when food processors used to take pride in giving full measure. That was back in the days when business didn't try to see how many people they could fleece on any given day. The baking business, for example, used to be famous for giving 13 units of anything for a dozen. That gave rise to the term "a baker's dozen."

But since the last few years have brought about some changes in merchandising and packaging, we don't get that kind of pleasant treatment any longer.

The advertising industry has taken over the packaging of food products and they've consistently tried to palm off a lot of inferior stuff for superior products.

One of America's leading soap manufacturers has only recently changed its most famous toilet

soap to such an extent people who used that soap all of their lives no longer recognize it. It used to be good soap, fine for the face and hands. Today I don't know whether it's good to wash the dog with, although they put it up in a little different package these days. But this soap manufacturer will find out one of these days that a new package won't merchandise a product that doesn't measure up to standard.

A manufacturer can change its product all it wants to, though, and I haven't got much of a complaint coming. About all I can do about it is to refuse to listen to their lousy soap operas and refuse to buy their product. But in the case of the short measure I can howl my head off that's exactly what I'm doing now. In addition to this if the people selling milk in Eastland haven't changed to a full quart the next time I test one of their quarts I'm filing an official complaint with the attorney general of the State of Texas. Perhaps he'll do something about it.

Along this same line a year or so ago in Perry, Florida, I drove into a gas filling station and brought 10 gallons of gasoline. The price was posted on the front of the station in letters three feet tall that he price was 33.9 a gallon. That is to say the 33.9 was three feet tall. The nine was so little you almost had to have a microscope to see it, but nevertheless they did have a nine added to the 33.

The station attendant put the 10 gallons in my car, looked at the pump and said, "Ten gallons at 33.9 a gallon is 340."

I knew those people were doing that there but this was the first time I had had a man make

# Plans for Big Peanut Bowl Game Completed

The two college teams will clash Saturday night at 8 in Maverick Stadium and the winners will emerge as the county college champions.

Both teams got ready for the big game with key victories last week. Actually Ranger College was held 9-3 tie with mighty Wharton Junior College, but most people agree getting the tie was a victory for

the Rangers since Wharton is ranked nationally as a junior college power.

Cisco was even more impressive in their first outing. The Wranglers knocked off San Angelo Junior College, 9-6, in one of the state's major upsets.

In the Ranger-Wharton game ex-Eastland High School players were important links in the victory. Knicky Arther and Marvin Agnew were standouts on defense, and Button Humphreys and Martin Day were the standouts on offense. It was a pass from Humphreys to Day that scored the only Ranger touchdown.

Tickets for the game will remain on sale the rest of the week, providing they are not sold out before then. They are available from any Jaycee member and can be purchased at Perry Brothers, Worth Food, MacMoy Super Save, Safeway, A&P, the Men's Shop, KERC and the Telegram. There are still some good east side reserved seats left, but most west side seats have been sold. General admission tickets may be placed on sale Wednesday.

John Slaughter, who is in charge of the parade, has revealed that there will be many floats in the parade, which will begin at 3 p.m. From five to eight bands are due to march, and float entries are expected from all parts of the county. One of the featured floats of the Peanut Parade will be the Queen's Float. ### Powers Elected Supervisor Palo Pinto Soil Dist.

Sam Powers, well known Desdemona stock farmer, was elected District Supervisor to represent Zone 2 of the Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District in an election held last Tuesday night at Desdemona. Powers replaces W. O. Dayson who has recently moved to Arkansas.

Powers has long been an outstanding conservationist in this area. He lives on and operates about 400 acres of cropland and 700 acres of rangeland some three miles north of Desdemona on Hwy. 16. Powers' conservation program on this land has included complete cover crop, strip crop, and good crop residue management on his sandy land in cultivation, and proper use brush control, and periodic deferments of his rangeland. His place might truly be called a show place, but unlike many show places its development has come about solely from the operators labor on the land.

Powers is especially well known for his success with coastal bermuda. He was among the first in Central Texas to make use of this improved variety of bermuda grass. He sprigged his first coastal in the spring of 1954 having obtained his first planting stock from Tipton Georgia and later some certified sprigs from Iowa Park, Texas. Production from his coastal bermuda is almost unbelievable both under dry land and under the acreage he has under irrigation.

When he was elected to the supervisors position Powers accepted with the same enthusiasm which he shows by the results of his labor on his farm.

The Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District includes all of Palo Pinto County and portions of Jack, Erath, and Eastland Counties. The District was organized in 1941. Zone 2 from which Powers was elected includes the eastern portion of Eastland County. The late Mr. Leslie Haganam of Ranger served as supervisor for Zone 2 for many years before Dawson's term of office. Other supervisors now serving on the District Board are Bill Sanders of Strawn, A. L. Cranford of Perrin, C. B. Quantel of San'os, and Ted Fulfer of Gordon.

These supervisors meet regularly on the first Wednesday of each month at 8:30 a.m. at Mineral Wells. All farmers, ranchers, or anyone with an interest in conservation are cordially invited to meet with these men at any time they meet for conducting the business of the District. In addition to regular meetings special conservation programs and field days are held from time to time in the various zones. The Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District has done much in its gallant effort to awaken the people of this part of the country to the needless abuse of our soil and water sources.

That is nothing more than flat stealing. An operator who gives a little over 10 gallons to round out the odd cent isn't hoodwinking the purchaser, but some of these pumps do.

A careful observer can see what is happening to him at the gasoline pump. He can't see the inside of a paper milk bottle, though, and has to take the word of the bottler that he is getting a full quart.

It's about time the milk industry started giving a full quart or cut the price of milk a cent or two a quart if they don't intend to abide by the law.

(Editor Note: The editor immediately went home and measured his milk supply after reading this article. Our paper "bottle" had exactly a quart of milk in it. This is not to say, however, that Joe's did.)


