

DR. JAMES C. WHITTINGTON

A former Eastland eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, Dr. James C. Whittington, has been named President-elect of the American Society of Opthamalogical and Otolaryngolical Society of Allergy Specialists at the group's recent national meeting held in Dallas.

The medical group has more than 600 members from throughout the United States. Current president is Dr. Leonard Draper of Houston. Outoing president is Dr. Barnard

Dr. Whittington practiced medicine in Eastland immediately after his discharge from the Navy until 1964. He and his family moved to Fort Worth in

Dr. Whittington is the son of the late Dr. Diaz Whittington who founded Eastland's first hospital in 1919.
