## Funeral For Clyde Fisher Monday At 2

E. Clyde Fisher, age 72, of Eastland, died at 7:45 p.m. Friday in the Eastland Memorial Hospital following a short illness.

Funeral services will be at 2:00 p.m. Monday in the Eastland Church of God with the Rev. W.E. Hallenbeck, Church of God minister, officiating. Interment will be in the Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Bakker Funeral Home. Nephews will serve as pallbearers.

Mr. Fisher was born August 31, 1903, in Comanche County. He married Ruth Hall November 5, 1923, in Comanche County. They moved to Eastland in 1926 where he owned and operated a garage for several years. He became an Eastland City Policeman in 1957, retiring in 1965. He was a member of the Eastland - Methodist Church and Knights of Pythias Lodge.

He is survived by his wife Ruth of Eastland; one brother, Pat Fisher of Fort Worth; one sister, Mrs. Evil Kennedy; and a number of nieces and nephews.

## Petitions Ask KRBC Relax 5 Demands

Petitions directed to the advertising customers of KRBC TV and the citizens of Abilene are now being signed by Eastlanders in an effort to keep full-time viewing of KXAS-TV (Fort Worth) on the local cable system.

Citizens of Eastland became upset recently when KRBC filed an application with the Federal Communications Commission asking that Southern Television System provide non-duplication of the NBC network. (Both KRBC and KXAS carry NBC). The FCC rules prohibit cable company duplication within 55 miles of a television station if that station asks for the protection.

Eastland cable viewers have had access to NBC on KRBC and KXAS for years, and now object to not having a choice.

The petition, available all around Eastland, states in part:

"The citizens of Eastland ask your help with station KRBC TV to relax their efforts in removing NBC's affiliate KXAS Channel 5, from your use on cable TV."

"This matter involves a grey area whereas the 55 mile area controlled by KRBC-TV reaches only two or three miles past our city. We feel that it is unfair of KRBC-TV to take advantage of the technical situation. We must pay \$7.00 per month to have Channel 5, and a limited number of other stations. "...We feel that the Abilene people could show their appreciation NOW by helping Eastland keep its Channel 5. "So long as our choice is taken away in an attempt to force us to watch Channel 9, we cannot feel friendly toward those who advertise on KRBC-TV, and shall indeed do our shopping elsewhere, unless we can once again regain our freedom of choice."

## Cosmetology Class Begins In January

An additional class in cosmetology at Cisco Junior College is being planned for early 1976 with a starting date of January 12, CJC Beauty School instructor Alta Dixon has announced.

The college currently has one class operating to full capacity, Mrs. Dixon stated, and the new class would for the first time have two courses operating concurrently in the CJC Beauty School facilities. Class meeting times for the new class will be from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The course will be the one-year general course for beauty operators, and will include training in such things as shampoo, hair and scalp treatment, cold waving, chemical hair relaxing, hair coloring, wigs and hairpieces, manicuring, facials, hair styling, scissor cutting, and razor cutting.

Cost of the course is \$150.00 for the complete 1500 hours of instruction, with additional costs of about \$68.00 for books, a beauty school kit, wigging equipment, and wig kit.

### REPORT ON RELIGION

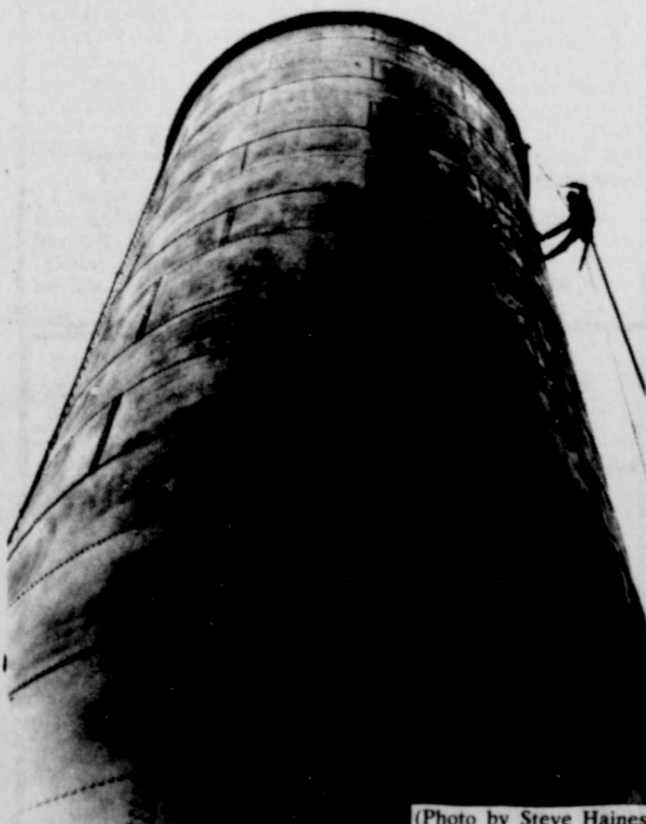

## 6 Flags Has Record Attendance

ARLINGTON--A new attendance record went on the books as Six Flags Over Texas ended its 1975 season last Sunday. 2,277,006 persons passed through the gates during 170 days of operation. The figure is the largest ever posted by a theme park in the Six Flags chain.

The old record, 2,267,365, was set in 1973. The latest figure brought Six Flags Over Texas' total attendance since its opening in 1961, to almost 26,788,000 persons.

General Manager Dan Howells said the record mark was achieved despite the rainiest spring season in the entertainment center's 16-year history.

He added, "Our surveys indicate that tourists were definitely back on the road after the fuel crisis of 1974. There was an increase of 16% in the number of visitors who came from outside a 500 mile radius of the park."

"We consider our parking lot survey to be one of the more reliable indicators of the health of the tourism market in the Southwest, and that market was obviously very much alive in 1975."

He said, "Before the season began, we saw a definite need for providing a chance for the public to get away, if only for a few hours, from the economic and political pressures which had produced a rather 'dark' mood."

"Everything which was done to change Six Flags for the '75 season emphasized fantasy and escape. That included such things as the introduction of our new Cyrus Cosmo character, the unique Rotoriculous ride and the new Light Parade."

"The general acceptance of this approach was, we feel, reflected in the final attendance figures."

Howells continued, "Work is already underway to prepare the park for the 1976 season. We know that people are spending their discretionary dollars more selectively nowadays, and everything we are doing for '76 is aimed at making Six Flags an even greater entertainment value."

Changes for the coming season, which will begin in mid-March, include installation of a huge parachute ride called "The Texas Chute Out".

The foundation for the giant thrill ride was poured in early November, and the first sections of the parachute drop's 200-foot-tall tower were shipped from Switzerland about two weeks ago.

The ride will feature twelve parachutes, each equipped with a seat which will hold two or three persons, depending on size. The parachutes will be pulled 175 feet into the sky before suddenly breaking loose. They will plunge at free-fall speed for more than 30 feet before the chutes blossom and begin slowing the descent. The entire ride, from liftoff to touchdown, will last 28 seconds. But, as Howells put it, "That's some 28 seconds!"

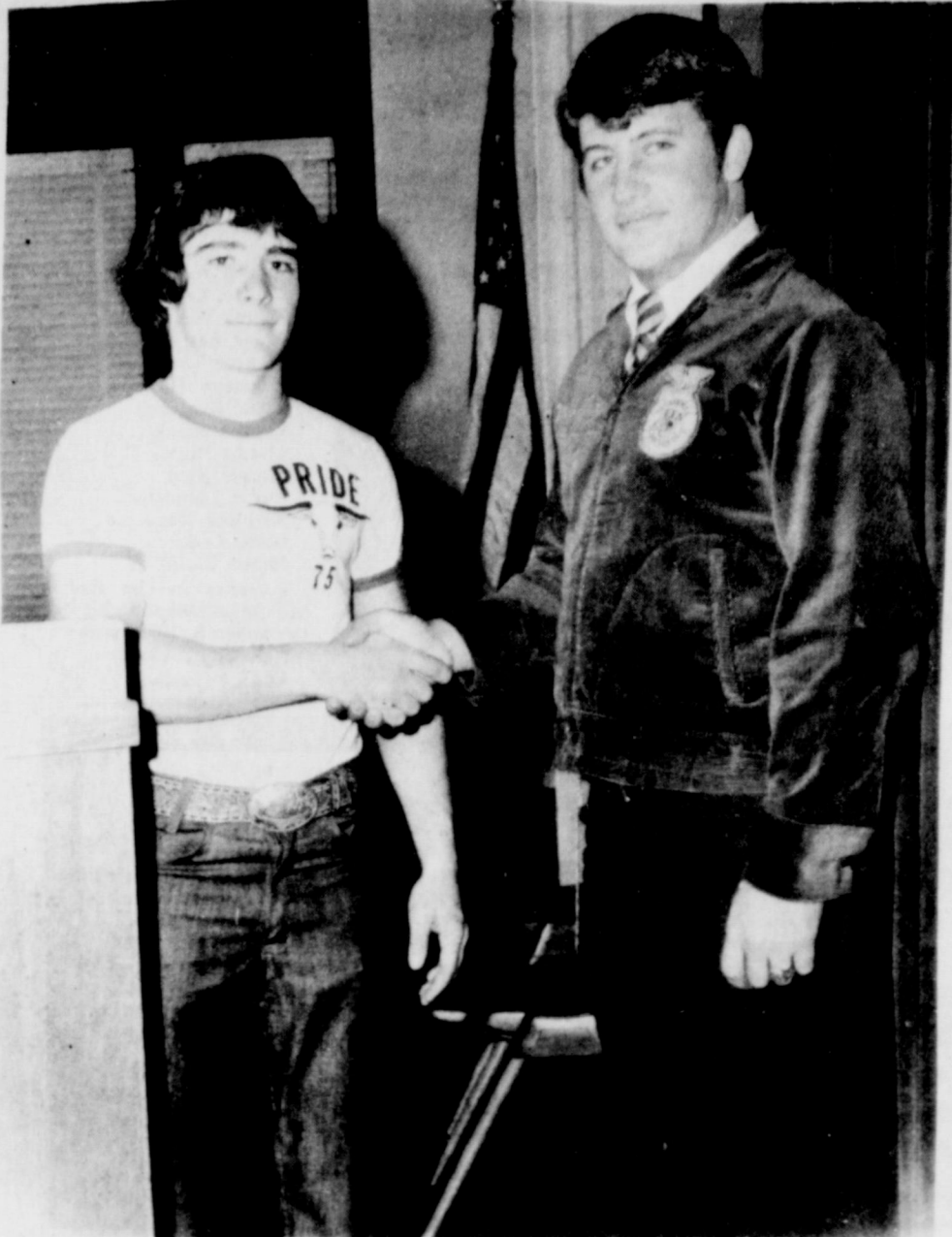
The 1.5 million dollar ride is only part of the park's capital improvement program. Every building and ride in the theme park will be totally refurbished during the winter months.

Howells said new shows have already been written for the park's numerous theaters. Auditions for performers will begin in early January, with "try outs" scheduled for 34 cities across the nation.

Howells also said plans are "in the mill" for additional new attractions for the 1976 season. He said details will be announced in coming weeks.

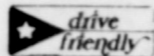

To prolong the life of your Christmas tree, as soon as you bring it home from the market place place the butt end in a container of water and store in the shade or in a cool garage

until ready to decorate. Make a new cut across the base of the trunk, about an inch above the original cut before placing in water. This aids in the movement of water to the upper portions of the tree. When ready to bring into the house, select a location where the tree will be as far from the heat source as possible. Keep the cut surface of the tree trunk completely covered with water at all times. A tree in a warm room may use a quart of more of water per day. When selecting a tree stand, be sure you have one which will hold the tree firmly and has provision for an adequate supply of water.

  - 1 1/2 lbs. figs, dates or apricots
  - 1/2 lb. butter or margarine
  - 1/2 cup fruit juice or sweet pickle syrup
  - 1 cup brown sugar (well packed)
  - 6 eggs
  - 4 cups flour
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon

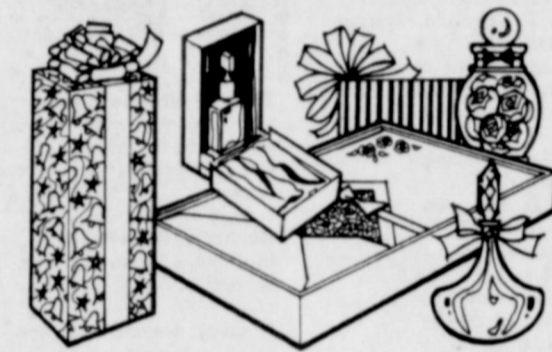

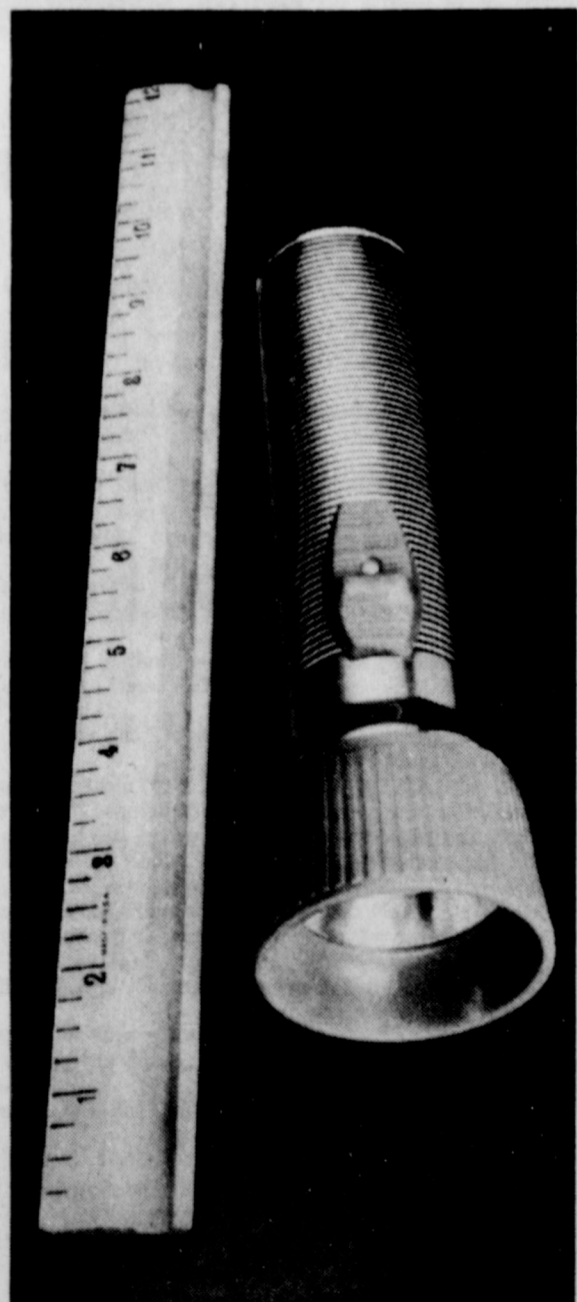

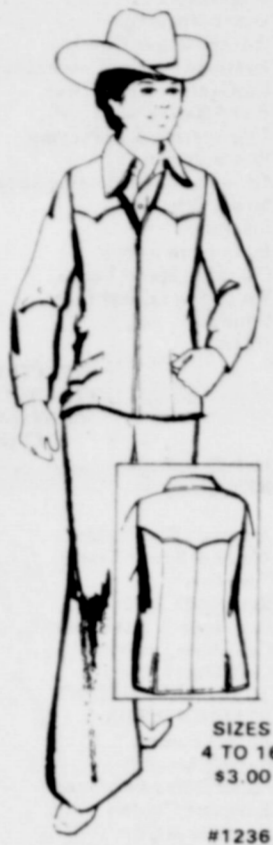
### Beef Short Course Set For Dec. 15-18

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 15-18, under the sponsorship of the Eastland High School Vocational Agricultural Department according to Mr. Pruitt, Superintendent and Mr. Hutto and Griffin, teachers of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel is a native of Oklahoma. As a farm boy and FFA member, he had shown livestock and won many awards, including championships at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition in Fort Worth and at the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City.

He has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. Degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, an M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas, in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle



research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For the past two years prior to joining the Agricultural Education Specialist program he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Eastland is scheduled to begin December 15, at 7:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series will be held Dec. 16-18. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction according to Charles Hutto and Don Griffin.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Ray Pruitt, or the teachers of vocational agriculture, Mr. Griffin or Mr. Hutto. An entry fee of \$5 will be charged.

Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattlemen who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profitable business. Dr. Krehbiel indicates that the beef production short course will deal with

methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, half crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers enrolled.

Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University. states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, farm electric wiring and safety, farm electric motors, arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.

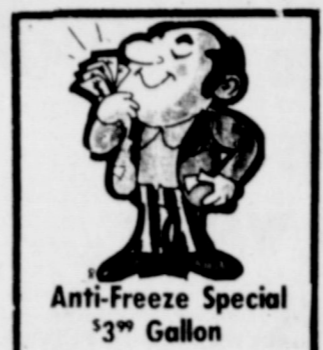

# New Almanac Out

The American Revolution of 1776 set in motion events that led to the colonization of Texas and eventually to its own struggle for self-government, notes the new 1976-'77 edition of the Texas Almanac, published by A.H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

Those historic events affecting Texas have been traced in an article written especially for the Texas Almanac by the late R. Henderson Shuffler, editor, historian and, at the time of his death in the summer of 1975, executive director of the Insti-

tute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

"What we call the American Revolution was simply the first stage of the revolution of the Americas", Shuffler wrote. "Texas was affected directly by the American Revolution and the course of its history for centuries to come was shaped by the outcome."

Also in the Almanac's Bicentennial section, Sam Kinch Sr., chairman of American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, tells of the American Bicentennial in Texas. A commission listing of Texas events

during the bicentennial year is included. (Listing for Eastland is blank.)

The new edition also contains a special section on "Gardening in Texas" prepared by specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is a guide for planting vegetables, fruit and nut trees and ornamentals in all sections of the state.

"The LBJ Hill Country" written by Art and Elise Kowert, publishers of the Fredericksburg Standard, presents a description of the home of the late Lyndon B. Johnson, 36th President of the United

Each Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area, the urban concentrations in which most Texans live, has an editorial page devoted to it.

A new Texas map in color, with major highways, supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department. Tourism and recreation also are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

"This is the 48th edition of the Texas Almanac that has been published since 1857", said Joe M. Dealey, president of The Dallas Morning News. "We believe it continues the high standards that have made this publication the Encyclopedia of Texas."

Antlers from a buck deer or other proof of a legal kill must remain with the animal until it arrives at the residence of the person who is in possession or at a commercial processing facility.

Get a receipt for any trophy heads turned over to a taxidermist and attach it to the remainder of the carcass.

Since the season opened November 15, P&WD wardens across the state have filed some 248 citations for failure to properly tag deer. Such violations can carry up to a \$200 fine.

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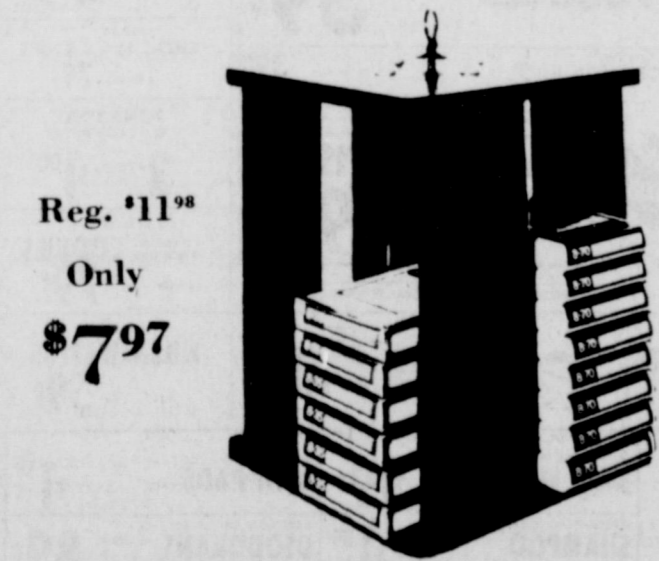
