



Looking For The Thin Line

The search for the "fine line" is underway.

Members of the Eastland City Commission are attempting to come up with an acceptable approach for dealing with new housing sub-divisions, and some major policy decisions are in the making.

Right now there are some five separate developments in the planning, mapping, dirt-moving or other stages and the city, while wanting to contribute to expansion and development, is, like most individuals, faced with the very bold-faced fact that ready money is not always available.

It has been agreed that a sub-division ordinance is and has been badly needed, so that specific guidelines may be laid out so that all, developers and the city will know exactly what can and won't be done. This of course would include basic specifications for material, construction and finished improvements.

Recognizing that the city has a responsibility to service that which is already within its existing city limits, the city fathers worry long and hard about the advisability of expending funds for new sub-divisions coming into the city.

Therefore at the same time, a study is being made of some other important factors.

Specifically, a study is underway on which water lines need to be replaced first. (The city spends a lot of their time mending and patching an admittedly-outdated water system, and if this were eliminated, the crews could conceivably spend more time on paving and street improvements, so these are being looked at too.)

The city has contributed in some manner to the past three sub-divisions (Valley View, Crestwood, and Indian Hills) and now question whether it can and should continue. City participation has varied in each of these projects with agreements having been worked out between the developers and the city.

Eastland apparently is not a lot different than a lot of other cities on the question of helping developers. According to the Texas Municipal League, some cities do not help in any way, but require certain standards for annexation. Others help in varying degrees.

It is generally understood that the commissioners believe that some kind of help is warranted but just how much or how little is still the elusive "fine line", being sought.

According to the most recent League survey of 221 cities in Texas (126 of which under 10,000 population), 43 require the developer to pay the entire costs; eight cities pay costs for all lines; 12 cities pay for only certain lines (mains, etc.); four cities furnish material or labor;

38 refund to customers at the hookup; and 21 are other and unknown.

Participation in water facilities financing among the 126 under 10,000, 80 cities contributed nothing; five pay 100 percent cost of all streets; one provides labor; one provides equipment; one provides materials; 15 pay percentage of total cost; eight pay a portion (intersections, etc); none provide engineering; and 15 report other or unknown.

The report shows municipal participation in financing street construction as follows:

The results of this survey indicate that a substantial number of cities financially participate to some degree in the cost of providing community facilities. Insofar as major improvements are concerned, a general summary of the policies of the 221 cities reporting for this survey reveals that:

77% require the developer to pay the entire cost of streets; 67% require the developer to pay the entire cost of curbs and gutters;

87% require the developer to pay the entire cost of storm sewers;

42% require the developer to pay the entire cost of water lines; and

42% require the developer to pay the entire cost of sanitary sewer lines.

These statistics apply to regular size facilities (i.e. facilities needed to serve just the developer's tract). Municipal participation in the cost of over-size facilities is not taken into account.

Repair Work Gets Underway On City Water Storage Tank

Workmen for Steel Tank Service of Joplin, Mo., began work Wednesday on repairing the water storage tank on City Park Hill as the result of City Commission action in a five-hour session Monday evening.

Work is expected to take from two to three weeks and will include sand blasting the interior to a near white metal blast, removing the old ladder from the inside wall; cutting out old steel around holes inside of tank plus hole in roof and replacing existing holes with new plate approximately six by two feet together with any additional needed repairs; applying two coats of epoxy by hand to all rivets and seams; another sand blasting; vacuuming clean all interior surfaces; and applying three coats of epoxy paint to five and a half mils minimum thickness, by spray. The exterior will be sand blasted, given one coat of primer and one coat of paint.

Robert O'Neal, owner, guarantees the work for 12 years on the interior and five years on the exterior. He and his crews arrived in Eastland Monday and demonstrated by sand blasting a section, and with the use of video cameras showed commissioners the condition of the 680,940 gallon tank (smaller of the two on Park Hill). Estimates are that it would cost upwards of \$100,000 to replace the tank at today's prices. (This tank was moved from the old City Hall site on West Commerce St. to the Park in 1929 for a fee of \$5,000 records show.)

Commissioners spent most of Monday night and Tuesday morning checking out the company's references and getting recommendations for the epoxy treatment, and entered into the agreement just before noon. The giant tank has been leaking for some time and contract cost for this repair will be \$18,000 complete. The company will inspect the work in 12 to 18 months.

With all commissioners present Monday evening, a great deal of other business was handled.

Texas Electric Service Co. was given second and final reading on their rate increase request.

Eastland National Bank Vice President Grover Hallmark appeared requesting that the city relinquish its telephone number 629-1754, so that the bank can add additional lines in its rotary system. The bank now has 629-1751, 52, and 53, and the Eastland telephone system does not have the mechanical equipment available to "skip" numbers in a rotary system, he said, and there are no other groups of numbers available in the overloaded Eastland telephone system. No action was taken.

Daniel Williams appeared asking information on having an eight acre tract, on Block 46, south of Siebert Elementary School annexed and developed into a housing addition. He proposes to divide the subdivision into 33 building lots. Mr. Williams was told that the commission is in the process of developing a subdivision ordinance in which specifications, city cooperation (or lack thereof) will be spelled out. He was thanked for his appearance before the commission.

In other business the commission granted an easement to Texas Electric Service Co. to run lines to Hollinsworth Oil Co. at Ringling Lake; authorized a mercury vapor street light at the corner of Plummer and Mulberry Streets; decided on a change in a lease to Jim George for property on N. Seaman St.; and agreed to engage an attorney to collect delinquent taxes.

Texas Taxes



By BOB BULLOCK, State Comptroller

Austin—Many people who earn their living making things with their hands probably would not think of themselves as manufacturers, fabricators or processors, but that's what they are under the sales tax law.

If you take any kind of material and improve it or make it into something other than what it was to start with, you are one of the three.

Watchmakers, bird-feeder builders, steel fabricators, muproofers and ceramic kiln operators are all manufacturers, fabricators or processors.

I hope, however, that you don't spend much time trying to figure out which you are because it doesn't matter.

If you are any of the three, you must collect and remit the sales tax on your total charge to your customer

including labor.

Many tailors, dressmakers and persons who make custom draperies have mistakenly thought that if a customer brings in material, and they make a drape or gown or suit of clothes from it, they are only providing a service and it is not taxable.

They are wrong. If they make something out of their own stock, they are manufacturers; if they make something out of material the customer brought in, they are processors. Either way, they must charge the sales tax on their total bill.

Only two aspects of their business might be exempt from the sales tax:

If the custom drapery-maker separates on the ticket the cost of that labor used to install the drapes, that portion of the cost would be exempt.

If a tailor has a suit made and hanging on the rack and sells it, the whole suit price would, of course, be taxable. But if the tailor also made slight alterations for which he charged the buyer, the alteration charge wouldn't be taxable if listed separately on the bill.

The distinction in both examples — installation and alteration — is that these labor services don't have anything to do with the basic creation of the whole item.

In following columns I will discuss other questions about when labor is taxable and when it isn't.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — State government ended its 1975 fiscal year with a record cash surplus of more than \$1.4 billion, but if the legislature continues its spending ways it may not last long.

This was the good news and the bad news of Comptroller Bob Bullock last week as he released his annual financial report for the fiscal year which closed August 31.

"We're in the best shape ever for now," said Bullock. "But our analysis consistently shows that if spending increases as usual in 1977, we will face a tax bill in the \$1 billion range."

The Legislature this year passed a \$12.1 billion biennial appropriations bill.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others have predicted that, with reasonable economies and continuing high yield from sales and oil and gas taxes, a major state tax bill can be avoided in 1977 as in the last two legislatures.

Bullock said the state had \$6.9 billion in the last fiscal year to meet an expenditure level of \$5.5 billion.

Revenues, the Comptroller said, increased 13 per cent over 1974 income — reaching \$5.7 billion.

"The real story," said Bullock, "is that revenue increased because of inflationary prices while the tax base remained the same. Spending jumped 21 per cent over the previous year. If legislators want to increase spending another 25 to 30 per cent in the next biennium, they had better have that billion dollar tax bill ready."

GOP Moving

Texas Republicans outlined major plans for 1976 campaign activities at a meeting here recently.

The State GOP Executive Committee approved Chairman Ray Hutchison's proposal to establish a powerful new executive campaign committee and central political fund.

Special recruiting committees were also appointed to seek out qualified congressional and legislative

candidates.

Republicans decided to conduct their presidential preference primary on a congressional district basis. Ninety-six of the 100 GOP presidential nominating delegates will be elected at the polls May 1, and only four will be picked at the June 19 state party convention in Fort Worth.

Mrs. Pat Archer, wife of Houston Congressman Bill Archer, was elected new GOP National Committeewoman to succeed Mrs. Rita Bass Clements of Dallas who resigned.

Hutchison named Ernest Angelo of Midland to head the new 15-member GOP executive campaign committee. Bob Flournoy of Lufkin was designated vice chairman.

Rates Studied

A 7.1 per cent increase in workmen's compensation insurance rates has been recommended by State Insurance Board actuaries.

Insurance company spokesmen aren't happy. They recommended a 12.3 per cent boost. Industry representatives weren't pleased either. They pointed out Texas business and industries already pay \$611.6 million a year to insure employees against on-the-job death and injury, and they claimed this is too much.

Courts Speak

The State Supreme Court left standing a lower court ruling that state and local governments can charge fees for access to large records computer data and microfilm.

The Open Records Act, court rulings have held, permit charges to examine such records.

In another ruling, the High Court affirmed a Texas Railroad Commission gas curtailment order placing Houston Lighting and Power Company in seventh priority as a customer of United Texas Transmission Company.

The Supreme Court also held that a Smith County man must be jailed for contempt of a court order by re-

turning a tractor which he sold out of Texas.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the 100-year prison sentence of a Grayson County man in the death of a fifth-grade girl from Denison who had been abducted on her way home from school.

A three-judge federal court in Tyler set arguments in the continuing controversy over whether voters can be signed up under the new Texas registration act without U.S. Justice Department approval.

AG Opinions

Atty. Gen. John Hill's opinion banning many special school fees may cause loss of district accreditation, State Board of Education warned recently.

In a recent opinion, Hill held school districts should not contract with one of their trustees to furnish garbage service even if there is only one such service in the area.

Hill also concluded the Smith County domestic relations court judge's pay should be equal to the state portion of the county's district judge salary.

School Session Urged

Texas Association of School Boards executive committee has urged Governor Briscoe to call a special legislative session to deal with school finance problems arising from the Hill fee opinion. (See above).

Texas Association of School Administrators executive committee also asked the governor to help ease the strain on districts which the opinion may cause. Briscoe said he has no intention of calling a special session and will be "looking for other ways to meet the problem."

Hill's opinion October 1 concluded special school fees for such things as driver education, band uniform rental and workbooks

are illegal.

Short Shorts

The State Insurance Board formally approved rules and regulations for new prepaid group legal insurance.

Stephen Oden of Texarkana has been appointed to the board of regents of East Texas State University, succeeding Joseph Zeppa of Tyler.

Speaker Bill Clayton ordered a series of House Administration Committee hearings over the state to explain "innerworkings" of state government.

Many county clerks and tax officials support proposals to take election matters out of their hands and create a separate local election office.

Comptroller Bullock's "raids" have produced more than \$2.4 million in back city and state sales taxes.

Texas' business activity index increased 7.6 per cent in the third quarter of 1975. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

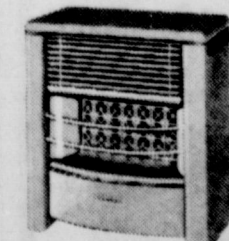

They meet at the old National Guard Armory across from CJC.



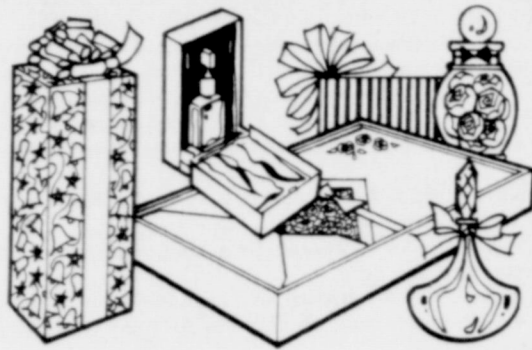
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
