### **Disabled Vets Asked to Report Annual Income**

Approximately 49,970 disabled Veterans and dependents of some 26,133 deceased Veterans in Texas who receive monthly pension payments, are being reminded by the Veterans Administration to report their annual income promptly and avoid the risk of having their payments stopped.

Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office at Dallas, said that VA will mail to all pension recipients a tabulating card with their December pension hecks upon which the income report may be made. Pensions cease under the old pension law if the income of a single individual exceeds \$1400, or \$2700 if the recipient has dependents.

Under the new law, Onstot pointed out, pensions will cease if the income of a single individual exceeds \$1800, or \$3000 if the recipient has dependents. T h e
