

Young people who drop out of high school earn less than graduates, have to take less skilled jobs, and have higher rates of unemployment, Differences in earnings tend to become greater as years out of school increase reflecting the better basic education and promotion potential of graduates.

When interviewed, 15 percent of the boy dropouts were earning less than \$40 a week, as compared with only 3 percent of the graduates. A weekly salary of \$80 or more was being earned by 31 percent of the graduates but by only their high school studies.

A similar pattern of wage difouts earned less than \$40 a week, has been released. compared with 14 percent of the category.

Better Broiler Care Is Urged

Factors that influence t h cholesomeness of broilers were discussed recently by East Texas poultry industrymen and county Ben Wormeli, extension poultry

husbandman, reports that four of the many factors discussed were singled out for special emphasis Friday this winter.

One of the factors to be pushed | Saturday is the use of a disposal pit. Such a pit is an important part of any sanitation program, and is also part of a good neighbor policy. The chances of free-flying birds becoming infected by a disease outbreak and carrying it to neighboring flocks are cut considerably by the use of disposal pits.

Another factor in the select four is proper housing, continues the specialist. The broiler house should be constructed so that it can provide protection against winter weather or opened to provide ample ventilation during the warmer

Adequate heat and floor space in the brooder house are also among the factors to be emphasized. Brooding equipment adequate to supply sufficient heat in the coldest weather, and at least ten square inches of floor space under the hover for each chick should be available. Some means of furnishing supplemental heat to raise the brooder house temperature without creating a fire hazard should be helpful on cold days, Wormeli continues.

The final factor to receive spec ial emphasis is the maintenance of dry litter. Because of its im portance, Wormeli says, poultrymen should always make sure the litter is dry. This can usually be accomplished by changing the litter after each brood, replacing wet litter, providing adequate floor space and utilizing proper

Wormeli concludes by emphasizng that broilers continuously protected from chilling temperatures and drafts, wet litter and stale air will have the proper environment for developing into healthy and wholesome birds by market time.






