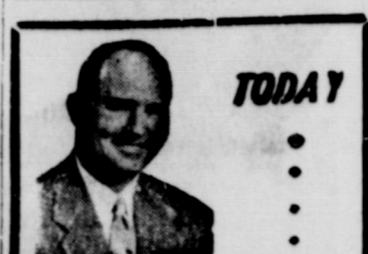

Better Broiler Care Is Urged

Factors that influence the wholesomeness of broilers were discussed recently by East Texas poultry industry men and county agents.

Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman, reports that four of the many factors discussed were singled out for special emphasis this winter.

One of the factors to be pushed is the use of a disposal pit. Such a pit is an important part of any sanitation program, and is also part of a good neighbor policy. The chances of free-flying birds becoming infected by a disease outbreak and carrying it to neighboring flocks are cut considerably by the use of disposal pits.

Another factor in the select four is proper housing, continues the specialist. The broiler house should be constructed so that it can provide protection against winter weather or opened to provide ample ventilation during the warmer days.

Adequate heat and floor space in the brooder house are also among the factors to be emphasized. Brooding equipment adequate to supply sufficient heat in the coldest weather, and at least ten square inches of floor space under the hover for each chick should be available. Some means of furnishing supplemental heat to raise the brooder house temperature without creating a fire hazard should be helpful on cold days, Wormeli continues.

The final factor to receive special emphasis is the maintenance of dry litter. Because of its importance, Wormeli says, poultrymen should always make sure the litter is dry. This can usually be accomplished by changing the litter after each brood, replacing wet litter, providing adequate floor space and utilizing proper ventilation.

Wormeli concludes by emphasizing that broilers continuously protected from chilling temperatures and drafts, wet litter and stale air will have the proper environment for developing into healthy and wholesome birds by market time.

 Lon more in overall dividend payments than the amount being paid during 1960. This increase is in large part due to the expected higher interest earning resulting from a new investment formula into effect last year.
 The 1961 individual policy dividends will not be materially different from the 1960 dividend. In some policies the extra interest is offset by a decrease in some of the other dividend factors.
 The dividends will be paid as soon as possible after the 1961 anniversary date each policy was issued, Onstot said. Both term and permanent plan participating NSLI and USGLI policyholders will receive dividends.
 As the payment of dividends is automatic, policyholders will receive their dividends sooner if they do not delay the processing by making advance individual inquiries, he added.

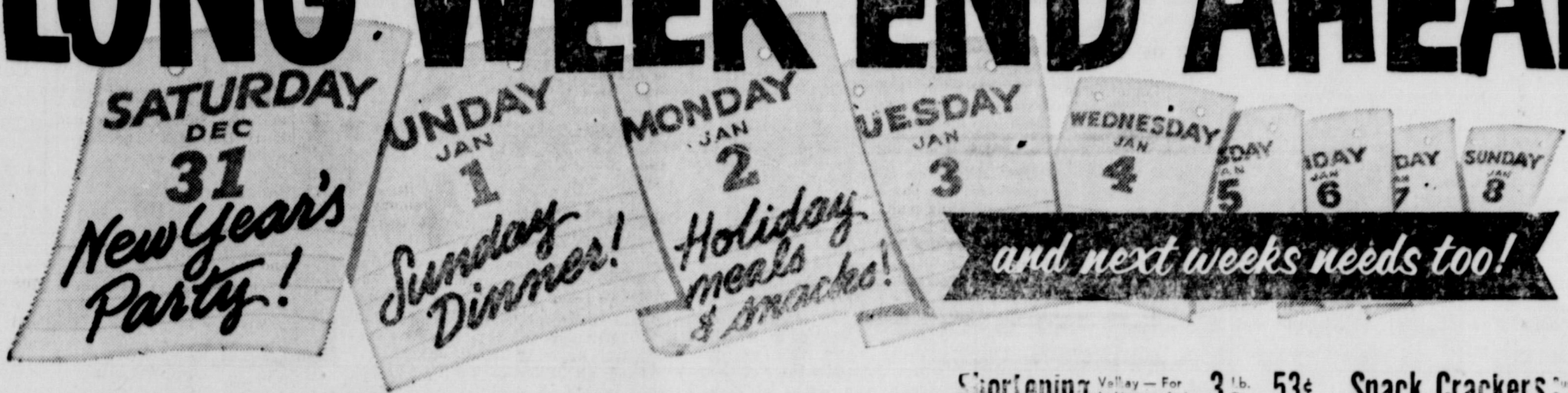

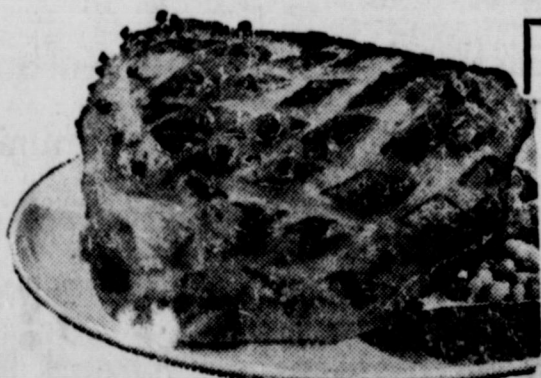
