



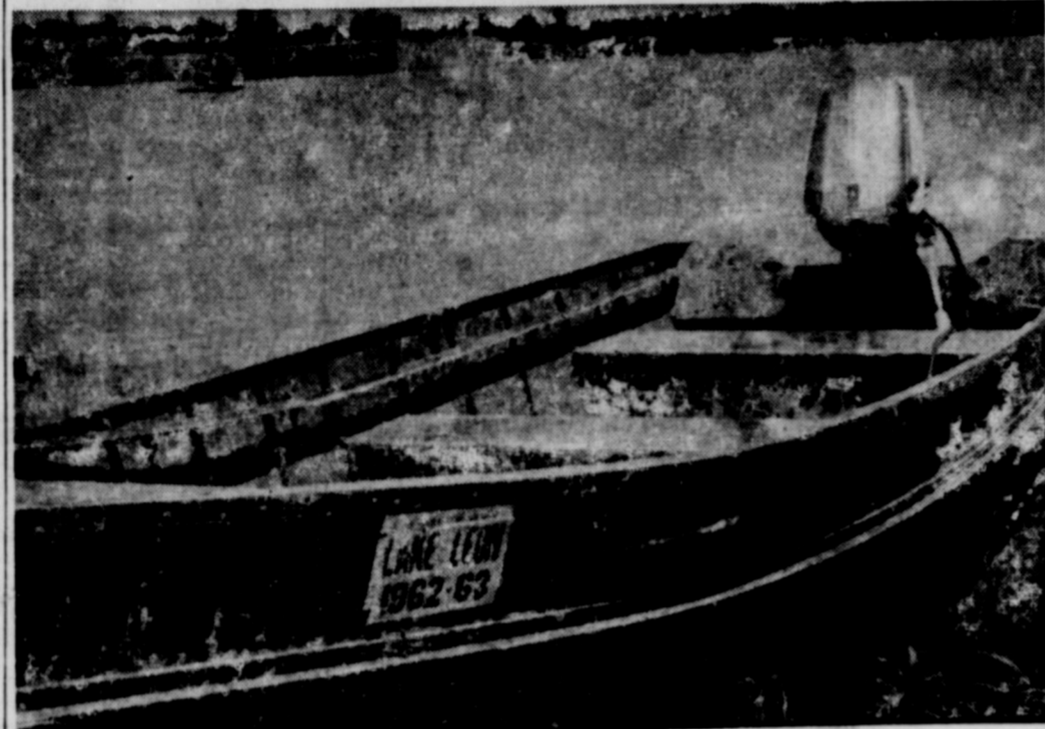

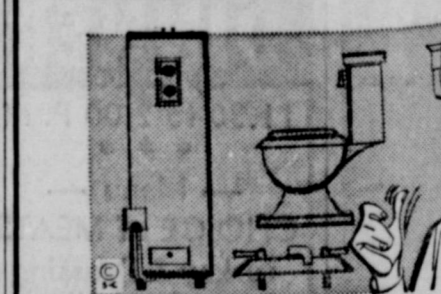

### Major Houle Is Honor Graduate Of AF College

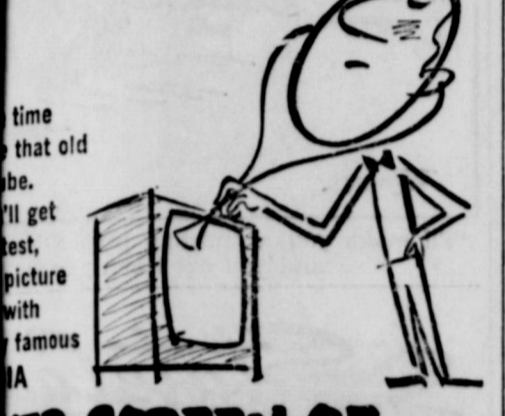

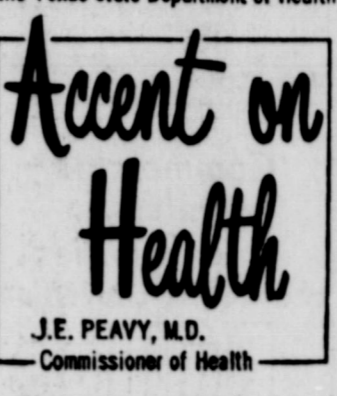
