Eastland High School basketball teams are getting into full-season steam, visiting Baird Monday night, hosting Dublin teams Tuesday in this Thanksgiving Week's action. It was a fever - pitch finale Tuesday night in Maverick Gym as the visiting Dublin Lions won out over a stubborn time piece and the Mavericks, 32 - 28, in 32 minutes of E-X-C-I-T-I-N-G basketball. In the evenings openers, the visitors claimed the Boys Junior Varsity, 43 - 38, and the girl JV, 32 - 24. Coach Charlotte Mason's Mavettes came into their own, whipping the Dublin girls handily, 67 - 33, with Eastland's CCynthia Pinkerton leading with 27. It was touch and go from the beginning with the Mavericks and the Lions. Scoring by periods: Eastland 6 4 10 8 - - 28 Dublin 6 9 7 10 - - 32 It stood 30 - 28 for Dublin with 1:34 showing on the clock. After a timeout, action began but the clock didn't and after it got started, the action boiled as the Mavericks tried in a vain effort to even it up. They moved the ball good, but failed to set up the scoring situations. In the white-hot heat, a Dubliner was fouled, and he sank two perfect ones to end it just at the buzzer at 32 - 28. Jerry Boles was high for Eastland with 8. The Mavettes whipped Baird girls 40-35, and the Eastland Girls Junior Varsity winning by the same score. The Mavericks lost to Baird 57-49 and the boys JV won 42-29. Jerry Boles lead Maverick scoring with 20; Duke Johnson had 8; Roby Sharp, 7; Lawn Mahan, 6; Randy Wharton, 4; and Sylvester Wilson, 4. Jill Price lead Mavette scoring with 19. The Eastland 8th girls came home Saturday night with the Championship trophy. The Dogies beat Bangs 45 to 19, Gorman 28 - 25 and B Blanket 36 - 22 in that order to win the Tournament. Members of the 8th grade team this year are forwards: K Kim Owens, Kim Woodsroft, Dawn Underhill, Lonnie Hull and Patricia May; while the defense consists of Susan Smith, Pam Morren, Kim Miller, Jackie Sowell and Tammy Jordan. Kim Bollinger is the Junior High Asst. Manager for the 7th and 8th team.

Hospital Opens New Wing

Major Phase No. Two at Eastland Memorial Hospital came to a close this week as hospital personnel moved patients into the just-completed new west wing. Administrator Helga Tiner reported that transition was as smooth as possible in the utilization of the new wing. The new wing adds 26 beds immediately, with 12 others available as final plumbing installations are completed. Opening of the new east wing last year gave the facility 46 new bed spaces, so the hospital is near its redesigned capacity of 85 beds. Tuesday, during moving day, census stood right at 60 patients. Medical and long term patients are being housed in the east wing and surgery, O.B. and accident patients are going into the new west wing. Mrs. Tiner explained. Next major phase is the rebuilding of the kitchen, central supply and "center section" of the old hospital. The new lobby will be opening soon, near the site of the original lobby facing S. Daugherty St., and some trim from the original building were used in planter boxes at the new main entrance. Hospital personnel and the medical staff are proud of the new facilities, particularly the new call system throughout the hospital and other modern conveniences helping make the hospital the first-rate medical center it is. **EMERGENCY ROOM DOOR OPENER** Important new addition at Eastland Memorial Hospital is a new automatic emergency room door opening device. Administrator Helga Tiner announces. The Emergency Room is located just north of the main lobby entrance on S. Daugherty St., and a bell at the emergency room door will summon nurses on duty at the nurses station, who can talk with the patients at the door with a two-way communications system. The emergency room door, which is kept locked, can be unlocked remotely by the nurses at the station, permitting patients quicker entrance for emergency treatment. A doorway off the emergency room will permit those accompanying emergency patients to go directly into a lobby waiting area adjacent.

EFD Busy With Grass Fires
The Eastland Fire Department was called out to two grassfires in the Norwood Addition at approximately 8:55 p.m. Tuesday. Later Tuesday night they were called to Olden to assist the Olden and Ranger Fire Departments with three or four grassfires in Olden. Ranger reported three grassfires Tuesday night and Cisco reported 2 grassfires. These fires were believed to be started from hot boxes on the railroad.

Duane Kleiner, 17, Buried Following Monday Services

Duane Kleiner, 17, an oil field worker from Olden, was killed about 8 a.m. Saturday when a deer rifle accidentally discharged near Gordon in a car in which he was a passenger. Young Kleiner's father, R.W. Kleiner of Olden, was driving the car when the quilt-covered .243 caliber Ruger rifle shot through the front seat and hit the youth, who was sitting in the back seat behind his father. Palo Pinto County Sheriff Bill Harris said.

The sheriff said the accident occurred on Ranch Road 919 about three miles north of Gordon. Justice of the Peace Freddy Boyd pronounced young Kleiner dead at 9 a.m. Saturday at Cunningham's Truck Stop in Gordon, where Constable David Cunningham assisted in the investigation.

Judge Boyd ruled death by accidental gunshot wound.

The sheriff said the youth had used the rifle in trying to shoot a deer from a hill at an oil lease near Palo Pinto Lake where he, his father and two other men had worked Friday night and Saturday morning.

He said Duane Kleiner later put the rifle in the car, setting it with the muzzle pointing to the back seat, and covered it with a quilt.

The four men left the lease to go home, Harris said, and the rifle went off just after they turned onto 919. Cunningham's Truck Stop is

about six miles from where the youth was shot, Harris said.

Boyd said the youth, hit in the chest, apparently was killed instantly and "never knew what happened".

He said it was not certain what caused the rifle to discharge.

Deputy L.D. Hill of Mineral Wells investigated for the sheriff's office, Harris said.

Duane Kleiner was an employee of Shaw Drilling Co. of Eastland.

Services were held at 3:30 p.m. Monday at First Baptist Church.

The Rev. Harold Meeker, pastor of Olden Baptist Church, officiated. Burial followed in the Eastland Cemetery, directed by Bakker Funeral Home.

Born March 24, 1958, in Vernal, Utah, Mr. Kleiner had been an eight-year resident of Olden. He attended Eastland High School and had been employed by Shaw Drilling Co. for six months.

The bounty pouring from America's countryside is one of the great benefits of the average industrial worker, the family struggling on welfare, the diplomat dealing with a foreign power. It benefits every American, whatever his or her job or circumstances.

This is a blessing for us to remember this Thanksgiving.

Those of us privileged to work in agriculture or for farmers and ranchers have some extras to appreciate — the richness of this nation's soil, the magnificent food production system our forebears left us, a political and economic system that permits us to function and to grow more freely than our counterparts anywhere else in the world.

Food was the basic reason for the first Thanksgiving — the Pilgrims thanked God for providing in the wilderness. Food that is so good and so plentiful in the United States is a good reason for giving thanks today.

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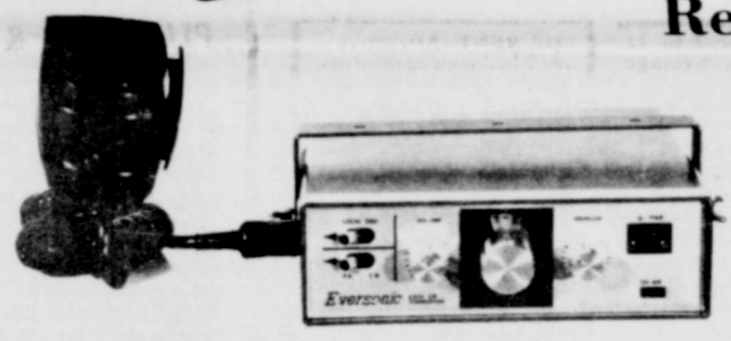
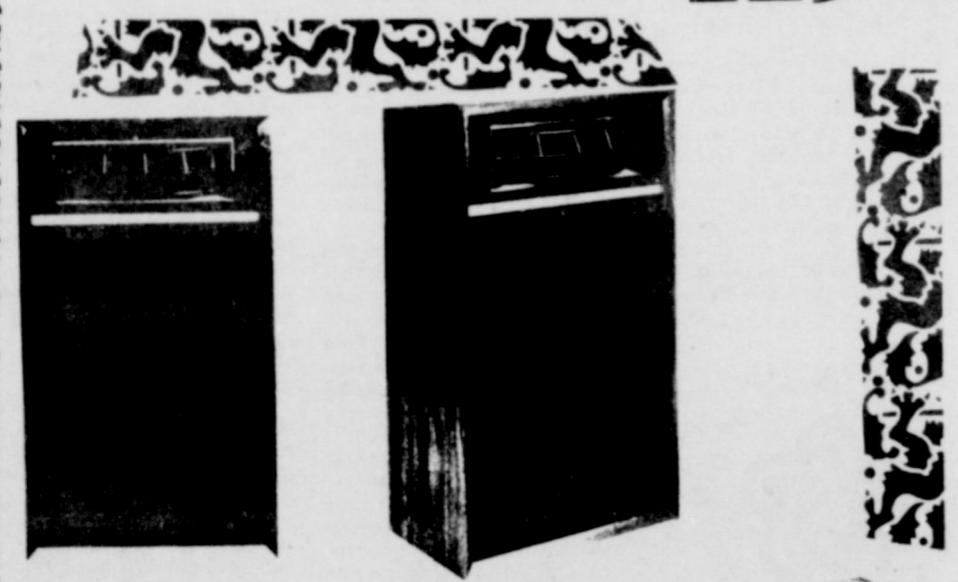


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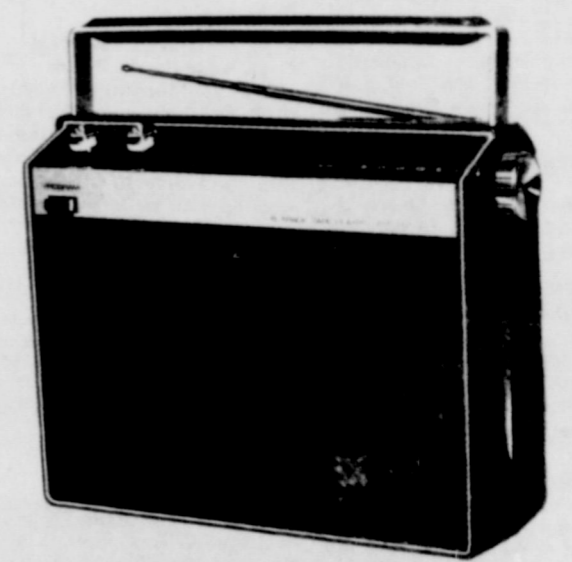

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — The debate goes on over whether the legislature will be faced with a billion dollar tax bill in 1977 — or none at all.

Comptroller Bob Bullock stated that if lawmakers

continue their recent spending patterns they will have to pass a record tax measure.

But House Speaker Bill Clayton predicted the legislature will be "trying to maintain the status quo" and will avoid growth of the bureaucracy. In spite of Bullock's repeated warnings, Clayton said he is not convinced that a major tax bill will be required.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe at a governmental conference in San Antonio stated government at all levels must become more economical and efficient. He called specifically for "redirec-

tion" of spending for education.

State Sen. Peyton McKnight of Tyler, speaking more harshly, said runaway spending in education may bankrupt the state if it isn't brought under control. He called for a lid on education spending.

Meanwhile, the new Joint Advisory Commission of Government Operations (Little Hoover Commission) held its second meeting and adopted a time-table for a year's inquiry into 250 state units of government. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby warned members to keep their eyes on the big spending areas and avoid "rabbit hunts."

Courts Speak

Reversing itself, the State Supreme Court agreed to consider whether a landowner, to claim an agricultural tax exemption, must prove 51 per cent of his overall income is derived from farming or ranching.

Third Court of Civil Appeals threw out a State Board of Pharmacy appeal from a district court ruling blocking its enforcement of a limit on advertising prescription drugs. The intermediate court noted an appeal notice already has been filed with the Supreme Court, and two parallel appeals cannot proceed simultaneously.

The Third Court rejected approval by the Savings and Loan Commissioner of a fourth savings and loan association charter for Longview due to rulings on evidence by a hearing officer.

An injunction prohibiting the State Board of Insurance from enforcing a requirement of 90 days' notice for cancellation or premium increases in medical liability policies was upheld by the Third Court.

Improper jury arguments by Dallas prosecutors led to two reversals of cases by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The Supreme Court directed an intermediate court to reconsider a workmen's compensation case in which the lower tribunal earlier had held a Brazoria County chemical worker intentionally jumped off a building.

AG Opinions
A blood sample cannot be

legally taken without the consent of a person suspected of a traffic-related offense, Atty. Gen. John Hill stated in a recent opinion. A physician, taking the sample without apparent consent, could be subject to civil liability, Hill stated.

Postponed Again

The Senate for the third time postponed the impeachment trial of District Judge O. P. Carrillo.

By a 16-10 vote, senators delayed the trial until January 5 to await outcome of a Judicial Qualifications Commission hearing and federal court final action on Carrillo's income tax conviction.

Carrillo said he will never resign his post on the Duval-Starr-Jim Hogg counties bench, although he has been suspended since last August following House passage of articles of impeachment.

Court Race On

New Texas Supreme Court Associate Justice Ross E. Doughty of Uvalde decided he will not be a candidate to retain his job in 1976.

Two Court of Civil Appeals chief justices immediately indicated an interest in a race to succeed Doughty who was appointed only about two months ago when Associate Justice Ruel Walker retired.

The prospective candidates are Judge Charles W. Barrow of the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals in San Antonio and Martin Dies Jr. of the Ninth Court in Beaumont.

Barrow says he is definitely going to run. Dies says he is "inclined to" but wants to check his bases of support again.

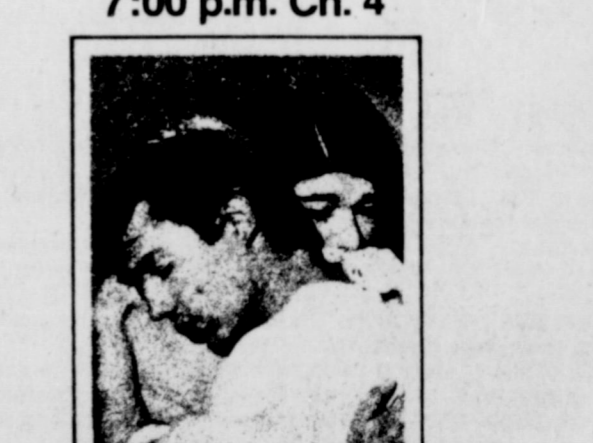
