## \$1 TV Cable Rate Hike Okayed With 'Conditions'

### Franchise Tax Hiked For Lone Star, Bell

A rate request is granted with reservations to one utility company, and the franchise tax increased for two others in a marathon City Commission meeting this week.

Southern Television Systems Corp.'s request for a \$1 hike in service was given second and final passage, with provisions that equipment and service be improved in Eastland. Terms

were agreed to by local Manager John Nevill, as City Commissioners discussed the requests for a long period. Mayor W.Q. Verner presided and all commissioners were present.

Commissioners also passed on first reading a dangerous building ordinance, drafted by the city's legal counsel.

Citizen Ray Pryor appeared, asking among other things, if the gutters on Daugherty St. could be cleaned. He was told, like many other citizens, that the city would get to this project as soon as possible. (The city crews are presently heavily committed to a project to provide sewer service to the Airport Area on the north side of town.)

Mr. John Honea appeared asking the possibility of providing sewer service to his new home at 207 S. Folts St., in an area where five other homes are without sewerage. He too was told that this would be taken under consideration.

Terms of the television cable service rate hike, which goes into effect July 1, include the provisions that:

Southern TV will maintain a telephone answering service.

And replace all existing microwave equipment with new transistorized units. (The firm filed application with the FCC on March 1 to get permission to change.)

The Commission asked that the changes be made within nine to 12 months. (Southern now has three channels on microwave now, and will have four—39,11.4 and either 13 or 8) on microwave with the new equipment, Mr. Nevill said. The system will offer nine channels including the weather scan.

The company will also attempt to eliminate local system damage due to sudden power surges and lightning, he explained. Proposed is the use of power sources at each of the amplifiers on the line coming into town, and also the company will attempt to control the signals along their lines, to maintain a constant signal.

The Commission heard City Manager Lewis Tiner explain that an eight-inch water line is needed on the north side of Highway 80 to provide proper

service to a fire plug at the corner of College and Main St., to provide adequate water pressure in case of a fire at the Vassarette plant. The city maps show a six-inch line there but it was found that only a four-inch is in place. It will require boring under Highway 80 to bring an eight-inch line off Commerce and the Commissioners agreed to do it, "again as soon as is feasible".

In another similar project the Commission agreed to take water and sewerage to the new housing development on S. Connellee St. in Valley View as soon as possible to work it into the city project schedule. The Commission authorized two members to attend the Mayors and Commissioners Convention in Corpus Christi beginning June 8.

Permission was granted to change the taxi franchise from Bo Hood to Fritz Jones.

A summer recreation program was okayed by commissioners with Coach Doug Dallas to be in charge. However, the Commissioners agreed not to open the City Park pool until proper Red Cross-approved life guards can be obtained, and the city is seeking applicants for these positions. The pool will be opened when these requirements are met.

The Commissioners voted to increase the franchise tax paid by Lone Star Gas Co., and Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. from two percent to three percent on gross receipts. Texas Electric Service Co. has been paying three percent for some time. (The current city financial statement shows that TESCO has paid \$13,385.11; Lone Star Gas, \$2,904.76; and Southwestern Bell, \$3,337.43).

The commission agreed to endorse a program in which a governing board would be established to maintain a base radio system for the county law enforcement agencies. The cities of Eastland, Ranger, and Cisco and the County are cooperating in developing the base radio facility in cooperation with the West Central Texas Council of Governments. Under the proposed plan a representative from each body would be selected to form a board to be in charge of operating the base unit.

### Dr. W. E. Chaney Buried

Funeral for former Eastland dentist Dr. Walter E. Chaney, 84, was Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Dallas in Restland Wildwood Chapel on Greenville Ave.

The Rev. Wilfred Bailey of Dallas directed services, with burial in Restland Cemetery.

Dr. Chaney died Sunday night in Baylor Hospital in Dallas following an apparent heart attack.

He graduated from Baylor State Dental School in Dallas in 1917, moving to Eastland in 1918, where he practiced dentistry until he retired and moved to Dallas in 1968.

Survivors include his wife of the home; one son, Dr. Clyde E. Chaney of Dallas; a brother, John of Big Spring; two sisters of California; several grandchildren.

The latest survey showed the median dollar income suggested by those responding to the question to be \$152 per week. In 1937, the figure was \$30. To fill out the picture, the amount in 1974 was \$43, in 1957 it was \$72 and in 1967 it reached \$101.

AUSTIN, Tex. — The end may be in sight for the historic Texas Constitutional Convention which began last January.

Delegates have been zipping along since they came back to work after the May 4 primary election, and only one major article — the catchall, controversial General Provisions — was left to complete on tentative passage at mid-week.

After that, of course, lawmaker-delegates must go back through the whole package on final consideration. And only those articles receiving a two-thirds majority vote can be submitted to voters.

Actually, the convention has until the end of July to complete the entire revision effort.

However, President Price Daniel Jr. has expressed hope for a much quicker windup. Daniel, of course, pushed unsuccessfully for agreement on a proposed revision before the

primary election, then had to settle for a month's recess during April.

Convention leaders debated whether to submit a \$1 million budget — enough to last until mandatory July adjournment — or to budget piecemeal, hopeful of getting through within a few weeks.

Daniel expressed a preference for budgeting through July, then "giving a lump of it back" on earlier adjournment.

However, Administration Committee Chairman Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon said he was concerned that appropriating through July would tempt delegates to stay that long.

Meanwhile, Louisiana Gov. Edwin Edwards gave delegates some practical advice on how to get new constitutions adopted. His own state has just approved one.

PRIMARIES CANVASSED — Executive Committees of both Democratic and Republican parties canvassed returns of the May 4 primary.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe is officially the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, having won over Frances "Sissy" Farenthold 1,024,335 to 438,564.

W.H. Posey of Houston got 31,498 votes and Steve S. Alexander of Waco 26,889.

Republicans certified James H. (Jim) Granberry as their candidate for governor. Granberry defeated Odell McBrayer of Fort Worth.

Raza Unida again is running Ramsey Muniz of Corpus Christi for governor and Fred Garza for Railroad Commissioner. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby will be opposed in the general election by GOP Gaylord Marshall of Dallas; Atty. Gen. John Hill by Tom Cole; Bob Bullock by James N. (Nick) Rowe of McAllen; Agriculture Commissioner John White by Zack Fisher of Memphis; Treasurer Jesse James by Robert G. Holt of Amarillo; Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong by Mary Lou Grier of Boerne; Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon by Joe P. Cain of Houston and Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace by Dale W. Steffes of Houston.

FUEL SHORTAGE CONTINUES — Once more, the statewide oil allowance (for June) has been set at a wide-open 100 per cent — for the 27th straight month — amid warnings that fuel shortages may last through summer.

Railroad Commissioner Langdon commended Texans for their conservation efforts. He noted that crude oil stocks in the state are up two million barrels over a year ago — to 93.3 million — and that U.S. supplies are up 8.1 million barrels.

Langdon credited voluntary energy-conservation efforts with the improved inventory picture, but he warned that heavy summer vacation travel may cause more lines at the pumps.

Nominations to purchase crude oil for the next month totalled 3,879,449 barrels, an

increase of 18,684 barrels over May.

COURTS SPEAK — A Dallas man won a reversal and new trial of a murder conviction because the state placed in evidence an obituary of his slain wife.

The Court of Criminal Appeals also reversed the assault to murder sentence assessed a Harris County man due to introduction by the state of a marriage annulment petition purporting to show he had a violent temper.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a state savings and loan commissioner's order backed by an Austin court allowing Equitable Savings of Fort Worth to set up a branch office in Lubbock.

The State Supreme Court set a June 12 hearing in a suit over whether Day and Zimmermann Inc., which operates Lone Star Army Ammunition plant at Texarkana, must pay \$112,668 in state sales taxes. The taxes were paid under protest on materials bought by the munitions maker. Day and Zimmermann claims the purchases were non-taxable, since they were made for the U.S. government.

AG OPINIONS — An 18-year-old public school student may legally serve on a school board of trustees if otherwise qualified, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- \* A tape recording of an open meeting of the Texas Board of Private Investigators and Private Security Agencies is public information.
- \* A court-appointed counsel for an indigent defendant is entitled to compensation even if he spends only a fraction of a day on the job.
- \* The Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, lacks power to revoke approval for programs offered by the Texas State Technical Institute (except for teacher training programs).
- \* The Judge of the Court of Domestic Relations of Nueces County may act as presiding judge, but he gains no authority beyond the jurisdiction given him by statutes relating to juvenile and domestic relations matters.
- \* Marl, gravel and shell sales by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are subject to state and local sales taxes.

Barr of Fort Worth, Richard Brown of Austin, Edwin B. Daniel of Wichita Falls and Bernis W. Sadler of Port Arthur to the council.

Briscoe appointed Dr. Vivian A. Hicks of Fort Worth to the Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education.

Sen. Ron Clower of Garland is chairman of the new Senate sub-committee on Mass Transit. Sen. Jim Wallace of Houston and Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur are members of the panel.

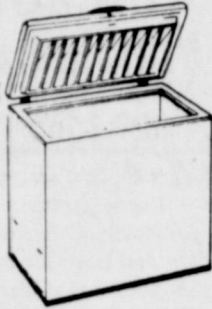

### Urges Peanut Action

WASHINGTON--The USDA today announced the minimum national average support level as \$358.50 per ton and other major program provisions for 1974 crop peanuts. The new minimum support level represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price for May 1974. The support level for 1973 crop peanuts was \$328.50 per ton.

The 1974 peanut program differs from the 1973 program in that (1) peanuts found to contain visible aspergillus flavus mold will be ineligible for support. (2) the charges assumed by producers for storage, handling and inspection will be increased

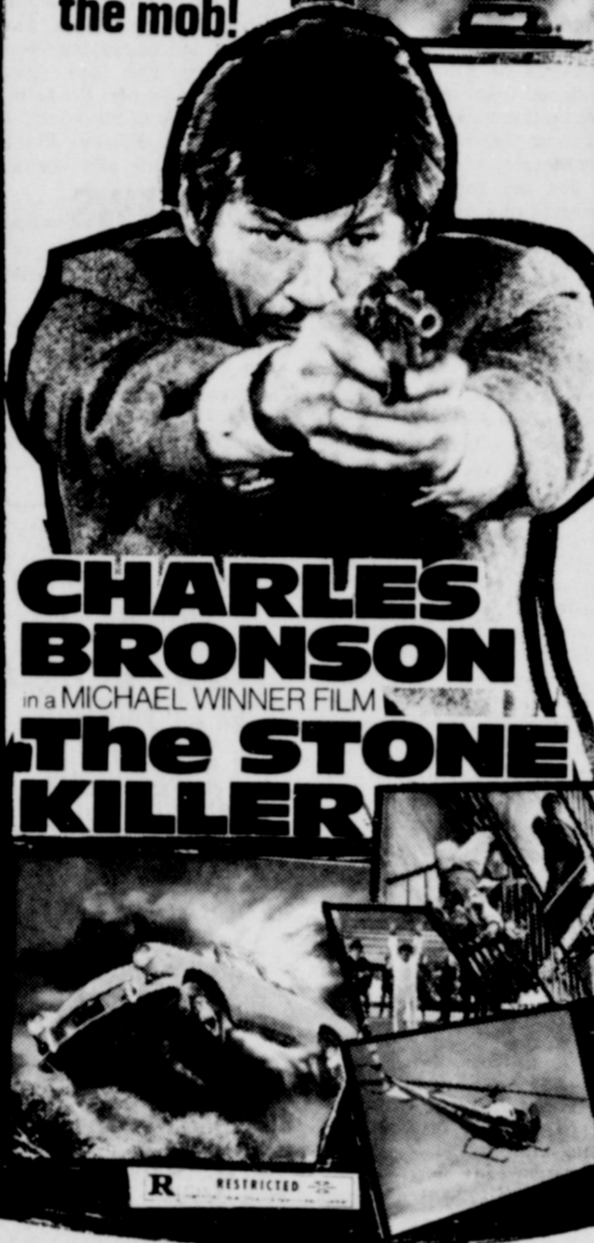

**Electricity Is Program Topic For Rotary**

The mystery of electricity was partially revealed for members of the Eastland Rotary Club at their luncheon meet Monday at the Ramada Inn when Member Ken Reese was program chairman and gave a classification talk.

President-elect Jerry Mathews presided and guests included Coater Ramsey of Arizona and Earl Bradley.

Mr. Reese, Transmission Superintendent for Texas Electric Service Co., here detailed the history of the developments of electricity and the terms used in measuring and describing its use.

He compared the delivery of electricity to a water system, with volume and pressure. "The only thing is," he said, "we can't store it. We may be generating at half-capacity at 3 p.m., but we must be ready to deliver full capacity at 5 p.m. when the peak hits."

"Our biggest problem is weather," he explained. "Because weather changes causes so many variations". Another problem cited is the lead time necessary now for the delivery of materials, and of course, the increasing costs.

Among the key people mentioned by Mr. Reese in the development of electricity were Volta, Ohm, Edison, Einstein, Franklin, Curie and Watts.

**BIRDS**

Eastland Memo:

With his tail cocked straight up, our aggressive little House Wren arrives in early spring, staying until Fall. The male stakes out his territory, building nests in every nook and cranny, marking his area. Shortly the female debuts, and will probably veto his building sites, while constructing one to suit herself.

Grass, leaves, twigs, and the other normal materials are used in nests, but there are innumerable others, and in fact one nest was found to contain 52 hair pins, 188 nails, 4 tacks, 13 staples, 10 pins, 11 safety pins, 6 paper clips, 2 hooks, 3 garter fasteners, and a buckle.

Another nest was built with chicken wire. Such nesting places are located within 12 feet of the ground, and are built in most anything, including an old hat hanging in your garage.

House Wrens do utilize man made houses. These should have an entrance hole not larger than one and 1/4 inches. This size keeps out sparrows, and other unwanted visitors.

Wrens lay six to eight dotted, reddish brown eggs, which hatch in about 10 to 14 days. During this time of nesting the Wrens scold trespassers, act menacingly and often attack. A male, once observed feeding the brood, working from 4 1/2: 15 a.m. to 8 p.m. made 1,217 trips in a single day with food. That averages a trip every 47 seconds, excluding side trips to feed himself.

You might very well find a wren that has no mate, to be satisfying his parental urge by feeding other birds young and old, even his arch enemy, the sparrow. Young Wrens go out on their own in about two weeks.

A long Indian name give the wrens means, "A big noise for its size". The Wren song is loud and bubbly, a pleasant one during our often routine days.

Wrens, mostly brownish, are not colorful in looks, but have a pert, darting way which attracts attention, and at four to five inches long, are hard to keep up with sometimes.

House Wrens feed almost entirely on insects destructive to crops, so should be a desired and welcome guest around your house and garden.

Why not try hanging a Wren house? An Eastland Bird Watcher
