Stephenville Teenagers Get Fined for Theft

The three boys, ages 15, 16 and 18, skipped school Tuesday at Stephenville and made a tour of Eastland County towns, stealing hub caps in Eastland, Ranger and Gorman. The trio also painted up school buses at Ranger.

The boys were spotted by some alert citizen in Ranger and notified officers. The boys, along with their parents, made the tour of the three towns again Wednesday, this time facing judges instead of hubeaps.

In Eastland the three were each fined \$50, in Gorman each was fined \$25 and all three were also fined \$15.70 each in the Ranger City Corporation Court.

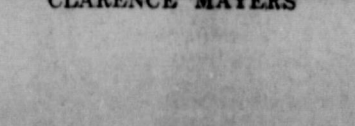
Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney said there has been a rash of hub cap thefts lately and he warned that heavy fines would be given any person convicted.

Four Year Term For Theft Given Arthur Sanders

Arthur Sanders entered a guilty plea in 91st District Court Wednesday to a charge of theft and was given a four year term in the state penitentiary.

Sanders was charged with theft of over \$50 from Meglasson Grocery in Cisco. He was the second Negro convicted on taking part in the theft.

Earlier this week Judge Turner Collier had ordered the man's bond be forfeited when he failed to show up for trial Monday. Later it was discovered Sanders was in jail in Fort Worth at the time so the bond money will not be forfeited.

Duties of Safety Dept. Explained to Rotarians

Highway Patrol Sgt. J. O. Tanner gave Eastland Rotarians a better look at the work of the Department of Public Safety when he spoke at the club's regular weekly meeting.

Tanner pointed out that the state has approximately five million licensed drivers who drive approximately four and one-half million motor vehicles some 46,053,000,000 miles over 230,000 miles of streets and highways each year.

Charles Freyschlag introduced the speaker, who is in charge of a large area with headquarters in Eastland.

"We kill around 2,500 people, injure 23,984 and suffer an economic loss of about \$382,000,000 yearly on our rural highways," he said.

Tanner explained that the Department of Public Safety actually has eight departments. He told briefly what each does:

Highway Patrol—Responsible for all rural traffic accidents and enforcement on rural roads and also assist local officers in their enforcement efforts when called on to do so.

Drivers License and Improvement Department—Gives drivers tests and issues licenses.

License and Weight Service—Charged with regulating truck traffic relating to their weight and registration.

Rangers—Assist local enforcement agencies with their criminal enforcement problems.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Service—Charged with the inspection of motor vehicles registered in state.

Narcotics Section—Statewide operations against problem of illegal narcotic traffic in the state.

Safety Section—Charged with conducting safety programs in state to create interest and support in the matters of public safety.

Communications Section—Establishes statewide communications to relay messages pertaining to police activities within the state.

Robbery and Assault Charges Face Three Men

Three Abilene men face charges of robbery and assault in connection with the holdup of a Cisco man Tuesday afternoon.

Charges were filed in Cisco Justice Court against Clifford Strickland, Alvin T. Thumblison and Walter Minor Tuesday night. The trio was later transferred to county jail in Eastland.

The three men are charged with taking \$2 in cash from Richard Bacon of Cisco. They were arrested south of Albany Tuesday afternoon. Bacon said he was picked up by the men in Dallas and robbed of the \$2, a wrist watch and a sweater a few miles east of Ranger. He said the men drove him to his home in Cisco and demanded he write them a check for more money. Instead Bacon phoned police, but the men escaped before officers arrived.

College Teacher Tells of Visit in Red Germany

A Ranger College government professor who went behind the Iron Curtain this past summer despite advice from her own government not to do so, spoke to Eastland Lions Tuesday.

Mrs. Alla Ray Morris told Lions that after seeing first hand communism in action she believes America faces a trying test.

Mrs. Morris told of visiting East Berlin and West Berlin and spoke of the vast difference of the two sectors of the city. She urged Lions to do what they could to preserve the American way of life and commended them for starting their meeting with a pledge of allegiance.

She described East Germans as people who had lost their will to fight back.

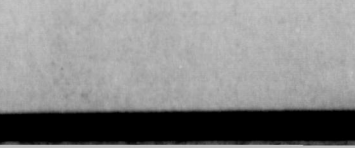
Mrs. Jarrett was 95 years old at the time of her death. In her younger days she was a frequent visitor in Olden.

Mistrial Is Ruled

Juror's Phone Call Halts Case In 91st Court

A juror's phone call cost Eastland County and the State of Texas several hundred dollars this week. The call resulted in a mistrial in the case titled the State of Texas vs. Billy Joe Dolberry, assault to rape.

The case ended abruptly when 91st District Court Judge Turner Collier suddenly called three witnesses to the stand Wednesday morning to testify they witnessed a juror making a phone call. The witnesses were Sheriff Lee Horn, Deputy Sheriff John Willingham and District Clerk Roy Lane. Lane actually testified he saw more than one juror make a call.

When the action came the trial was near an end. Both the State and the Defense had rested their cases and the jury was ready to hear final arguments and the charge.

Judge Collier told the jurors that some of them had disobeyed his warning that they were to stay together as a jury. He said it was his opinion that since the jury had separated there was nothing left for him to do but declare a mistrial.

The Judge told a reporter for this newspaper that he took the action on his own after hearing reports of the alleged phone calls. A reporter also witnessed three jurors separated from the others following a court recess Tuesday afternoon.

District Attorney Earl Conner and Defense Attorney Frank Sparks said the trial will probably be reset in about 60 days.

Both the defendant and the Eastland woman he is charged with assaulting with intent to rape took the stand Tuesday.

Dolberry testified he had spent most of one day in November with the woman while she drove him over much of Eastland, Comanche and Mills Counties. He said that he and the woman had been "kissing around" all day and that suddenly at his mother's home in Gorman she "threw a fit."

He denied having assaulted her in any fashion.

The woman testified she grabbed her on the arm and made a threat. She refused to say what he told her, but wrote the phrase on a piece of paper and passed it to the jurors.

The State introduced testimony showing the woman had a bruised arm and Dolberry's ex-wife testified that Dolberry was not passionate when he had been drinking.

The woman and Dolberry agreed she demanded \$40 taxi fare and he didn't have the money to pay her. Dolberry said he had \$80 when the day began but it disappeared.

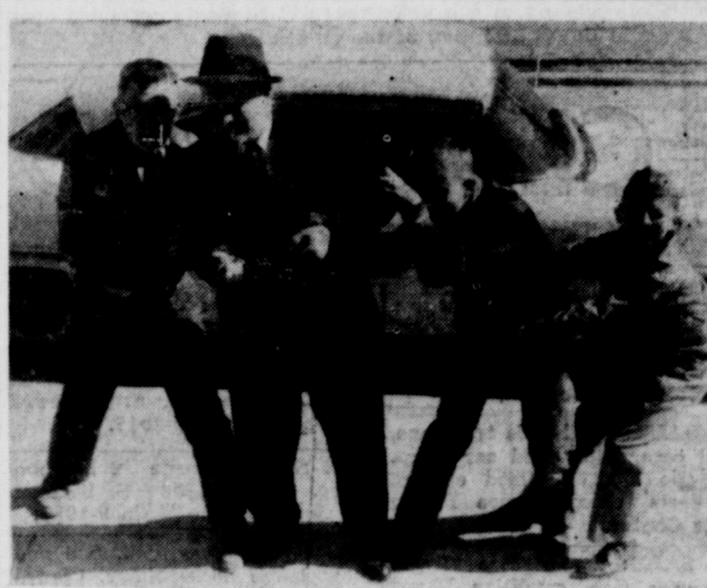
"Holding flood water above flood prevention structures is only a part of the water conservation story," an SCS spokesman said. "A dam is more than a pile of dirt. The man in town, the man on whose place the structure is located as well as the man who owns bottomland below the structure are interested in its success. Water management begins with land management to include the application of a good sound soil and water conservation program on each farm or ranch in the watershed."

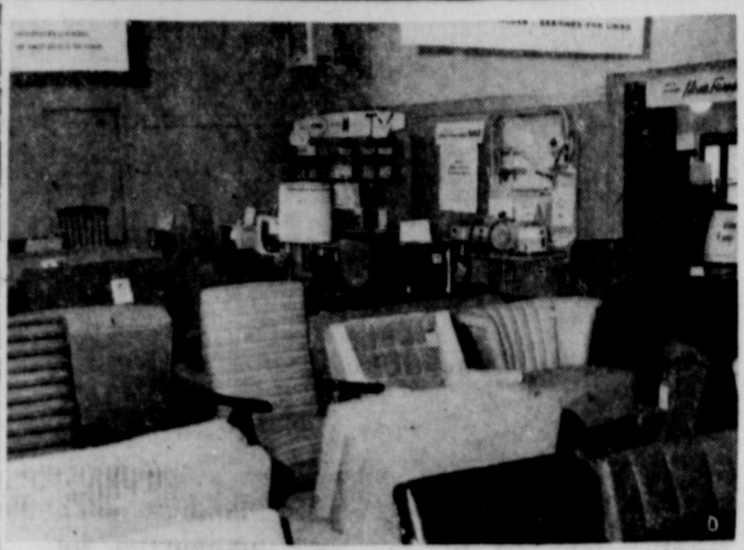
