ment Projects For Highways Listed

Commissioner of Transportation and Public Safety, during 1961, announced District Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood.

He said a total of 24.7 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of R. P. Haun, Jr., Senior Resident Engineer, of Eastland.

This work is part of two statewide "highway housekeeping" programs revealed Dec. 15 by the Texas Highway Department. Totaling \$40 million, the programs are keyed to safety features and proper upkeep of the State's highway systems.

The two safety-and-betterment programs will be evenly divided financially throughout the State with \$20 million to be spent on the U. S. and State Highway System and \$20 million earmarked for the Farm-and-Ranch-to-Market Road System.

The 1,075 items involved in the two programs, covering a total of 224 counties, will all be done during the next calendar year. A total of 2,799 miles of U. S. and State Highways and 3,694 miles of Farm-to-Market Roads are included in the work list. Highways are due for improvements such as surface widening, bridge widening and replacement, base strengthening, and pacing of shoulders.

District Engineer Pritchard said a total of 274 miles in this highway district would be involved, at a total cost of \$1,120,000.00.

The following projects will take place in this county:

Following is a list of improvements to be made in Eastland County:

U. S. Hwy. 80 from FM 2461 to Ranger, 2.1 miles to be reconditioned and resurfaced at a cost of \$110,000.

FM 2461 from US 80 South to FM 570, 3.6 miles, to be seal coated at a cost of \$4,700.

FM 569 from Nimrod South to State 36, 14.4 miles, to be seal coated at a cost of \$18,700.

FM 1864 from FM 569 to Calhoun County Line, 4.6 miles, to be seal coated at a cost of \$6,000.

An entry of Comanche pecans took the judges eyes in the fifth annual Eastland County Pecan Show Thursday and C. D. Simmons of Gorman walked off with the grand championship of the show.

Simmons was represented the winning blue ribbon and trophy by Donna Jane Pugh of Eastland, this year's County pecan queen. The trophy was made available by the National Pecan Sheller Association of Chicago for the best improved variety.

Bill Wright of Cisco took reserve honors with an entry of Burketts.

Also receiving a trophy from the National Shellers organization was Henry A. Hageman of Cisco, exhibitor of the first place unnamed seedling variety.

L. D. Romberg developed the winning entry at the Brownwood pecan experiment station. It is a cross between the Burkett and Success.

Judges for the show were B. G. Hancock and Dr. Benton Storey, horticulturist of Texas A&M. Judging was based on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality, weight, attractiveness and other factors.

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Mavericks Told Football Is Still Second to Education

"Education comes first." That's the advice Darrell Tully, former at the annual Quarterback Club gridiron banquet held Thursday night in the high school gymnasium.

Tully, immediate past president of the Texas Coaches Association, warned high school and junior high school football boys that "... you can't play all of your life."

He said there was plenty of time for fun and play after studies, but education should come first.

"And I'm not just talking to football players, either," he said.

Governor Speaks At Industrial Meet Thursday

H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, attended a Texas Industrial Commission meeting held in Abilene Thursday.

Governor Price Daniel addressed the group that included members of the state legislature, officials of communities in this area, Chamber of Commerce representatives, commissioners, and advisory board members of the Industrial Commission.

The industrial future of Texas was pictured as one of the bright spots of the nation by Governor Daniel. In explaining the function of the Texas Industrial Commission, he said the purpose was threefold: to bring new industry to the state; to encourage the expansion of existing industry; and to promote the development of natural resources to the fullest extent.

E. B. Germany, chairman of the Industrial Commission, pointed out that hundreds of letters have been exchanged during the past year with numerous special reports and authentic data sent to industrial prospects. His progress report showed 628 new plants coming into the Lone Star State and 788 plant expansions since 1958, with 458 new plants announced as ready to move to Texas some time in the future.

Chairman Germany described the Texas Industrial Commission as a clearing-house of industrial information and pledged full cooperation with local and regional Chambers of Commerce, city officials, and any other civic group with the common goal of the industrial development of the state.

John Ben Shepperd, who serves as chairman of the advisory board to the Commission, and Fred Husbands, director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce also spoke to the group of business and civic leaders. The four regional Chamber of Commerce directors in the state act as counselors to the Industrial Commission.

Members of the team who were honored were Bill McCleskey, Bill Moylan, James Lewis, Ray Dendy, Tony Jordan Bill Jones, Mickey Garner and Jerry Chaney, all seniors; Gayle Chaney, Mike Graham, Lyndall Garrett, John

Shoemaker, John Stroud and Jack Whitten, all juniors; Tommy Beck, Gary Culpepper, Larry Howle, J. D. Ables and Dickie Byars, all sophomores; and Bary Graham, Jimmy Moylan and Mike Jones, all freshmen. Managers were Mike Perry and Jimmy Wright.

That means that the Mavericks of 1960 will have just 14 returning squadmen.

Members of the Junior High A and B teams were also introduced.

Films of a Spring Branch game were also shown.

President of the Quarterback Club is Everett Plowman, R. F. Haun is vice president and Elton Ables is treasurer.

Tully was introduced by Wendell Siebert, superintendent of schools and a longtime friend. As Siebert began his introduction Tully passed him a note which Siebert read to the crowd. The note warned Siebert to be careful in his introduction "... because I know a lot on you too."

Siebert praised Mrs. G. L. Wingate and the other women who prepared the meal, Hugh Brown and the FFA boys who set up all of the tables and chairs in the gym and members of the Home Economics class who served.

Coach Carrol Shelton introduced members of his coaching staff, Don Dendy, Joe Edd Ingram and Jimmy Hughes, and the Mavericks of 1960.

Shelton said of his Mavs, "It took a lot of courage for these boys to participate. Most of the time it would have been all easier for them to do something else."

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Tully, coach of Class AAAA Spring Branch in Houston, was a backfield star for the Mavericks back in the early 1930's. He later made the Little All-American team while playing for East Texas State College and went on to play professional football for the Detroit Lions.

As a coach the former Mav has made a name for himself in Texas high school circles. He has coached in Dallas, Galveston and Houston, and this past year his team was co-champions of their district. Spring Branch gave up just 57 points during the entire season.

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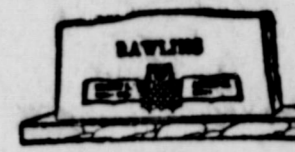
