This work is part of two statewide "h'ghway housekeeping" programs revealed Dec. 15 by the Texas Highway Department. Totaling \$40 million, the programs are keyed to safety features and proper upkeep of the State's highway

The two safety-and-betterment programs will be evenly divided financially throughout the State with \$20 million to be spent on the U. S. and State Highway System and \$20 million earmarked for the Farm-and Ranch-to-Market Road

The 1,075 items involved in the two programs, covering a total of 224 counties, will all be done during the next calendar year. A total of 2,799 miles of U.S. and State Highways and 3,694 miles of ed in the work list. Highways are due for improvements such as surface widening, bridge widening and replacement, base strengthening, and pacing of shoulders.






